CONSOLIDATING THE REVENUES

A Bill That May Make It Possible for the City Tax

To be Reduced.—Respects in Which it becomes an Ordinance It Makes Changes in the System of Collecting Licenses.

A new revenue bill was introduced in the Salem city council and advanced to second reading, that will consolidate two or three old ordinances into one.

It is a bill for an ordinance to license tax and regulate certain callings and occupations within the city of Salem, Oregon, prescribing the character of said licenses and the manner of issuing and collecting the same; fixing penalties and restrictions in relation thereto, and repealing all ordinances in conflict with it. The text of the ordinance is as follows:

"Be it ordained by the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon:

"Sec. 1.—It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to prosecute or carry on any calling or occupation within the city of Salem, Oregon, for which the terms of this ordinance require the payment of a license, until such person or persons shall have secured and paid for the license so prescribed for said calling or occupation, as hereinafter set forth:

"Sec. 2.—Each, and all, person or persons, required by this ordinance to pay for and secure a license for his or their calling or occupation shall, before engaging in the same, pay to the recorder of the city of Salem, Oregon, the sum or sums prescribed and fixed, herein, as license fees, and upon the payment of said license fees prescribed in this ordinance, he or they shall receive from the said recorder of said city, a license to conduct the said calling or occupation so paid for, which said license shall show the name of the person or persons to whom the same is issued, the nature of the calling or occupation licensed, the amount paid as license fee therefor, and the term for which said license is issued, and all licenses issued under the terms of this ordinance shall date from the day of payment of said license fee and shall be of force and effect for the day, week, month, three months, six months or year, next following the date of said payment, unless sooner revoked by the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon.

"Sec. 3.—The following callings or occupations conducted or maintained within the city of Salem, Oregon, are hereby required to be and are, licensed in the following sums and for the following terms:

"1.—The proprietor, manager or agent of each and every circus or menagerie exhibiting in the city of Salem, Oregon, shall pay the following license fees: For a one-year circus, \$50 per day; for a two-year circus, \$75 per day; for a three-year circus, \$100 per day; and for each and every side show \$5 per day; for every dog, horse or pony show exhibiting under a tent, \$15 per day, and for every menagerie of animals exhibiting under a tent, \$10 per day.

"2.—The proprietor, manager or agent of any theatre, or theatrical show, concert, special exhibition, entertainment or amusement venture, conducted in a public theatre, hall or tent, in this city, shall pay a license fee of \$120 per year, \$75 for six months; \$45 dollars for three months; \$15 for one month; \$10 for one week, and \$5 for one day; provided that any such theatrical show, concert, exhibition, entertainment or amusement venture, given by home or local talent for a specific and public charity, or for the benefit of a resident citizen of Salem, Oregon who is known to be in actual need of such assistance from illness, loss, damage or other stress of person or estate, shall be exempt from the operation of this subdivision of section three hereof.

"3.—The proprietor, manager or agent of any public game or amusement such as 'flying horses' or 'merry-go-round,' 'cane game,' 'spindle wheel,' 'wheel of fortune,' 'whip game,' or 'ball throwing,' or 'ring throwing' game, or game similar thereto, and not here specifically designated, shall pay a license fee of \$30 for three months, \$25 for one month, \$15 for one week, and \$5 for one day.

"4.—The owner, keeper or agent of any billiard table or pool table or other table upon which any game is played in this city, whether said game or games are played by the habitues or customers of said public place for pay, cost or charge, or for amusement only and free of cost or charge shall pay a license fee of \$10 per year for each and every table so kept and provided that no greater sum than \$50 shall be collected for the tables in any one room in such public place.

"5.—The proprietor, manager or agent of any bowling alley, or shooting gallery, in this city, shall pay a license fee of \$25, for one year, and \$15 for six months; provided that no license shall issue in this behalf for a less period than six months.

"6.—The proprietor, manager or agent of any hotel or boarding house in the city of Salem, Oregon, employing one or more runners or solicitors for hotel, shall pay a license fee of \$3 per quarter or three months, for each and every runner or solicitor so employed.

"7.—Peddlers passing from place to place in the city of Salem, Oregon, on foot, and not trying their wares, shall pay a license fee of \$75 for one year; \$50 for six months; \$25 for three months; \$15 for one month; \$5 for one week, and \$1 for one day. Peddlers passing from place to place in the city of Salem, by vehicle drawn by one or more animals, and not trying their wares, shall pay a license fee of \$100 for one year; \$75 for six months; \$50 for three months; \$25 for one month; \$10 for one week, and \$2 for one day; provided that all peddlers, on foot or in vehicle, are hereby declared to be hawkers and subject to hawkers' license, if they cry their

wares by voice or bell or any other public noise. And provided, further, that persons peddling newspapers, bibles and religious tracts, and farmers, gardeners and dairymen peddling the products of their own farms, gardens and dairies, shall not be deemed to be peddlers under this ordinance.

"8.—Bill posters shall pay a license fee of \$20 for one year and \$10 for six months, and no license shall issue in this behalf for a less period than six months. The party in whose name a bill poster license shall be issued hereunder, shall have the right to employ two assistants to perform labor only, and no license in this behalf shall issue to a firm or company. A bill poster under this ordinance, is hereby declared to be a person who, for hire, pastes, hangs, suspends or mounts any advertisements or in any other way places, tins matter, in picture, type, or sign, upon any bill board, building, dead wall, fence, post, or other place or object within the public view; and it is hereby made unlawful for a bill poster, or his employees, to so display such advertising matter upon the private property of another without the express permission of the owner of said property.

"9.—The proprietor, manager or agent of any portable and transient photograph gallery set up in this city, shall pay a license fee of \$50 for one year; \$35 for six months, and no license shall issue in this behalf for a period less than six months.

"10.—Each palmist, fortune teller, clairvoyant, medium, astrologer, marriage manipulator, mind reader, hypnotist, or other person conducting a business similar thereto and not here specifically designated, shall pay a license fee of \$15 for one week, or \$3 for one day.

"Sec. 4.—Any person, or persons, violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof be fined the recorder of said city, be fined a sum not less than \$10 nor more than \$100, or by imprisonment in the city jail for a period not less than five days nor more than 20 days, or shall suffer the revocation of the license held by him or them, said revocation of said license by said recorder to be ratified by the common council of said city, at the regular meeting of said body next after said revocation.

"Sec. 5.—Ordinances Nos. 292 and 340, of the City of Salem, Oregon, are hereby repealed, and all other ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the terms of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

CASTORIA

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International Maritime Conference.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—The American delegates to the International Maritime Conference of 1889-90, who were continued by act of Congress a few years ago as a board to wind up some matters which the Conference itself did not succeed in finishing, met here today. This board consists of Rear Admiral S. R. Franklin and Rear Admiral Sampson of the Navy; S. T. Kimball, General Superintendent of the Life Saving Service; Junge Goodrich, of the N. Y. Supreme Court; Clement A. Garison, President of the International Navigation Company, and Capt. Shackford, of New York. Eugene T. Chamberlain, Chief of the Bureau of Navigation of the Treasury Department, acts as secretary of the board.

No agreement was reached by the late conference as to the lights to be carried on fishing vessels, which is of much importance to the fishing interests of Germany, Holland, Great Britain and other nations which have considerable fleets in the German Ocean, the English Channel, etc. As the nations interested did not reach an agreement England has prepared a code of her own. If the nations concerned adopt the English proposals the new rules will be promulgated if Congress authorizes it to be done.

Elections in Newfoundland.

St. John's, N. F., Nov. 5.—The general elections of Newfoundland are progressing today. Mr. Bond, the premier, and Mr. Reid, the owner of a very large part of the colony, have looked arms, and a bitter fight is going on, the contest being keen and close. Mr. Morine, representing Mr. Reid, and leading the opposition, maintains the integrity of the Reid contract as binding on the colony, while Premier Bond proposes to modify it by reclaiming the fee—simple of the railway for the colony, and by handing back the telegraph lines to the government. Both the railroads and the telegraph were taken by Mr. Reid to work after the government had sunk money on them. He

Bids for New Cruisers.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—The plans for the new cruisers were distributed today, and the bids are to be opened December 7. The maximum time allowed for completion is 30 months for each vessel.

Of the six armored cruisers for which bids are asked, three are to be sheathed, and the others unsheathed. The Navy Department reserves the right to adopt either form of construction. The limit of cost of three of the ships authorized by Congress is \$4,000,000 each, and of three others \$4,250,000 each. The main batteries will consist of four 8-inch breech-loading rifles of 45 calibre length, and fourteen 6-inch breech loading rapid-fire rifles of 50 calibre length. The secondary batteries will consist of eighteen 3-inch breech-loading rifles, twelve 3-pounder guns, four 1-pounder automatic guns; four 1-pounder single shot guns; two 3-inch field guns, two machine guns, six automatic guns and two submerged torpedo tubes.

The World's Shipping.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The statistics just collated as to the world's shipping show that there are now 28,422 vessels, with the enormous tonnage of 29,043,728. Great Britain is in the lead with 10,838 vessels with a tonnage of 14,261,254, so that she shows nearly 50 per cent of the vessels. The British ships show a larger tonnage than any other nation. The United States comes next, but is less than one-third of England's vessels and one fifth in tonnage, having 3,135 vessels with a tonnage of 2,750,721. Germany is next in tonnage, Norway follows with France next.
