J. J. Dalrymple: We want to put every man in their back, and more like them.

A. N. Gilbert: I approve of the most favorable things that can be said of this administration.

C. L. Daily: I don't see how it can be bettered. It is simply a case of introducing practical business sense in place of politics.

Gid Steiner: "We should put through a straight citizen's ticket just as it is."

J. Conner: "I want to see the whole thing continued with one addition—better streets."

Thomas, Watt & Co.: "Well satisfied. Reduction of expenses, care nothing about party."

J. M. Wallace: "Should be continued without contest."

S. L. Hayden: "Continue the present policies."

John Gray: "This council has been too economical."

M. Klingler: "We cannot well do better."

Squire Farrar: "Let them all try it again if they will serve."

J. M. Payne: "Most decidedly; every one of them."

John Krause: "A new set of men could not do any better."

John Bayne: "They have done very well."

F. G. Haas: "Satisfied; see no reason why a change should be made."

Ladd & Bosh: Let us continue it by all means. It is not a matter that admits of question. When they came in power we were running in debt about \$1000 a month. That has been stopped and there has been liberal saving besides. It would be business madness to return to the old order of things.

CHEMAWA AND SALEM FOOTBALL

Review of the Game Saturday by One of the Indian Boys of Chemawa.

The Salem Athletic Club and the Chemawa Indian School came together in their first football encounter Saturday afternoon. The day was an ideal one for a football six up and the large number of spectators present were not disappointed in their expectations of seeing a good fast game.

The game was also in good condition as far as soundness was concerned and enabled both teams to do good lively work.

Salem has a good strong team and will unquestionably come out at the large end of the horn at the close of the season, but one thing they must cultivate and that is a more keen desire for good clean ball. This latter feeling is just as essential to the success of a team as the best training and physical strength.

In their game with the Indian boys Saturday they began too rough and reckless and as a result before the close of the game the Indian boys began to retaliate.

We trust in the future Salem will cultivate temper as well as strength and tact. The Chemawa team this season is very light—lighter than it has ever been before in football history. The average weight is slightly over 150 lbs. and when this weight was pitted against 170 lbs. it was not a wonder that they were defeated. They have also been without a coach and understand the game only from their experience in meeting other teams. But notwithstanding their lack of weight and slender knowledge of the game it must be admitted that they put up a good game. Their snappy work in tackling and interference aroused the admiration of those present.

The game was called at 3:00 o'clock. Chemawa won the toss and defended the north goal. The ball was kicked off by Captain Neafus and the two teams then faced each other for a series of line tucks and end rushes. Bishop of Salem made a fine end run of thirty yards before he was downed. The ball was then advanced to the 10 yard line before Chemawa braced up and held them for three downs. Chemawa then took the ball but instead of putting it out of danger, which they should have done, tried to advance it and lost it on downs. Salem then forced it over the line for a touchdown. By a series of line tucks and muck plays they carried the ball over again just as time was called, making the score in the first half 10-0 in their favor.

The last half was played with several new men in the Salem team. Saunders went in at right end and his playing was hard and fierce. Salem punted the ball several times and Chemawa returned it on several occasions. Long runs were not so frequent and Salem seemed to rely on strength to advance the ball. The half ended with the score 20-0 in Salem's favor. The Chemawa team was in good shape at the close of the game while several of the Salemites carried over spots as a result of the fierce tackling of their wiry opponents.

She was a woman of very old and long constitution having been sick but very little during her entire life. Her last illness was of about one week's duration. She was born in Maryland and from there moved to Ohio. On December 24, 1857 she was married to Martin S. Long, who died on July 14 1895. The remains were laid to rest in the Silverton cemetery.
