## KITCHENER'S RECONCENTRADO

### General MacArthur May Be Obligated to Resort to it in the End.

#### HARSH MEASURES TO BE ADOPTED TO BRING THEM TO TIME

#### First Big Fight Will Be Over the Hay-Pauncefote Treaty Made Necessary By the Desire of Our Government to Build the Nicaragua Canal.

New York, Nov. 19.—Forbearance has ceased to be a military virtue in the Philippines according to news that comes from the War Department. Lord Kitchener's plan of operation in South Africa, harsh though it appears to be, appeals to officials of the War Department, and during the coming campaign in the Philippines no mercy is to be extended to those in active rebellion or who give aid and comfort to the insurgents.

The Administration, according to high officials, has become weary of the long drawn out war. It has been conciliatory in dealing with the insurgents and the efforts to accomplish peace by this means have met with contempt. It is now proposed to give them a taste of real war, and though the innocent may suffer, it is only by this means it is believed that the guilty can be reached.

There is reason to believe that General MacArthur contemplates devoting his principal attention at first to the northern part of Luzon. Aguinaldo is believed to be in the mountains of Bergant.

Colonel Ernest Gillington, U. S. A., Inspector-General in the Philippines, has arrived here. He has been in Germany since May, but will soon resume his official duties.

Referring to the state of affairs in the islands he said that the backbone of the rebellion has been broken for some time and the only trouble now is to bring bushwhackers

and malcontents to bay. "As to how long that will take I do not know."

Plans are being made by the Administration to press with vigor for the ratification by the Senate of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty in its original form as the first step towards constructing an isthmian canal.

This action is likely to precipitate one of the memorable contests of the coming session of congress. Opposition to the treaty is based on the fact that it provides that no fortifications shall be erected on the canal. The Hepburn bill which has passed the House provides for the construction and protection by the Secretary of War of a Nicaragua Canal.

In addition Senator Davis has brought before the Senate for the committee on foreign relations an amendment that nothing in the treaty shall restrict measures which the United States may find necessary for the defense of the United States.

The Davis amendment was copied from the tenth clause of the Constantinople treaty securing the neutrality of the Suez Canal.

## MARRIES DUKE OF MANCHESTER

### Strange Story of a Cincinnati Millionaire and His Daughter.

#### BRIDE'S FLYING TRIP TO PARIS RECEIVED WITH JOY IN IRELAND

#### But Mr. Zimmerman of Cincinnati Says His Daughter is on Mid-Ocean and Was Not Even Engaged to the Duke.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The Duke of Manchester and Miss Helene Zimmerman were quietly married in this city on Monday. The announcement was authorized last night by Miss Effie Evans, an aunt of the bride, Miss Zimmerman, the daughter of Eugene Zimmerman, a Cincinnati millionaire.

The marriage was a very quiet affair. It was solemnized at Mar-ybone Parish Church by the resident canon, the Misses Evans, aunts of the bride gave her away while Ernest Lamet, a wealthy young club man, and Bonet Phillips, a son of the former Lord Mayor, acted as best men.

Following the wedding breakfast, the Duke returned to his own home in Portman Square, and the bride took a train to Paris to dispose of the apartment occupied during the summer. The couple had planned to sail for America last Saturday and keep the announcement secret until they reached mid-ocean.

This arrangement was spoiled by the bride's delayed arrival from Paris and having another week to spend here the Duke telegraphed the manager of his estate to prepare to receive himself and wife, and Miss Evans, he took the train on Saturday evening for Dublin. When his home was reached the entire neighborhood was in festive attire.

This celebration led to making public the story of the wedding. It is said

Zimmerman, father of Miss Helene when told of his daughter's reported marriage said:

"You cannot make my denial too explicit for there is absolutely no truth in the report. There has been no marriage. If there was I certainly would have heard of it and not a word have I received. Why! My daughter is on the ocean at this minute on the steamship Campania and which is expected to arrive at New York on Wednesday. She will be accompanied by her aunt, Miss Evans and by no one else. Now that she has sailed to this country will you tell me how she could have been married."

It was suggested that the marriage took place last Wednesday and if true it might be possible for her to still sail on a fast steamer that is not due in New York until a week after the ceremony. "Well I said that there had been no marriage and I know what I am saying," replied Mr. Zimmerman with some show of annoyance. "Is your daughter engaged to the Duke of Manchester?" was asked. "No," said Mr. Zimmerman. "There is no engagement. They are acquainted with each other but I know there is no engagement. My daughter will come directly to Cincinnati on her arrival at New York."

### GERMANS GETTING TO LIKE WHISKEY

New York, Nov. 19.—A special to the World from Washington says: Germany is rapidly becoming a nation of whiskey drinkers according to the report of Commissioners of Internal Revenue, Wilson. More distilled spirits are exported from this country to Germany than to any foreign country. The Germans apparently are partial to bourbon whiskey in preference to rye. During the year ending June 30, 1900, 415,489 gallons of bourbon and 137,578 gallons of rye whiskey were sent to the German Empire.

Africa, boys more from from the United States and leads the least in the exportation of that article, having been supplied with 357,709 gallons. England ranks next in the consumption of American rye with 303,534 gallons. Very little whiskey distilled in the United States is sent to England. The report shows that the subjects of the Queen bought only 787 gallons of bourbon and 2,852 of rye.

The only countries which did not buy any American whiskey were Japan, Spain and Venezuela.

The Philippine Islands are beginning to use the American product, as 11,254 gallons of bourbon and 3,822 gallons of rye were shipped there during the last fiscal year.

Japan, Canada, Central America, Mexico and China were the largest users of alcohol.

## VERY BAD CONDITIONS

### Reported By Refugees From China Who Have Just Arrived.

#### ONLY NON-CHRISTIANS ARE SAFE—CHINESE DESTROYING RUSSIAN RAILROADS

#### A German Officer Pays a High Compliment to the Efficiency of the American Battery in the Bombardment of Peking.

CANTON, O., Nov. 19.—Refugees arrived here report that anti-Christian riots have broken out in the Province Kiang Si. Non-Christians are wearing badges and all persons not so decorated are in danger of death. The Viceroy of the province has appointed a deputy to settle the French claims at Shun Tak, and French gunboats will accompany the latter with a view of enforcing his orders.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 18.—Despatches from Vladivostok say the Chinese have destroyed 300 miles of the Southern Manchurian railroad. Damage is estimated at ten million rubles.

Washington, Nov. 19.—Some disparaging criticism upon the American field gun, as exhibited in the Chinese negotiations, led Adj. General Corbin to address the following inquiry to General Chaffee:

"It is asserted that our light artillery guns did not meet with required service, compared with those of other armies. What are the facts?"

Following response was received: "Our battery was better than that of any other army in the campaign. The German battery in some features was superior to ours. Our battery was highly praised, particularly by General Lieuvitch, who said he felt like taking off his hat whenever he saw it. No battery was so effective as ours in the attacks on Peking."

### PORTO RICO ELECTIONS QUIET

SAN JUAN PORTO RICO, Nov. 13.—The Porto Rico elections passed off without the riots and disturbances predicted. The day following, when Republicans were celebrating the victory in Federal towns there were a few clashes between parties, and a few men were killed and much ammunition was wasted. But as a whole Porto may go down on record as conducting a remarkably quiet election considering that it was the first time her people had voted without the presence of soldiers and police at the polls.

In round numbers the total vote on the island was 53,000. Only 150 Federal votes were counted. The leaders of the Federal party had ordered their followers to appear at the polls and the order was generally obeyed. It was an election in name merely as only one party voted. As the result Mr. Fedele rick Degetan was sent to Washington as commissioner to Congress and the 35 members of the House of Delegates are all Republicans. In fact, the entire legislature is now of one party.

Each of the seven districts of the island sent five delegates to the House.

There is a great deal of speculation as to what the Federal party here intend to do. Had they voted the election it is asserted would have been very close as a year ago they carried the island by a majority of 6000 votes. For reasons not generally understood they refrained from voting.

They had claimed that they had not a fair chance to register that the Republican party was favored in the appointing of election judges that they were raised registration and that the districts were gerrymandered. Those in touch with the party leaders believe that an attempt may be made in the courts to nullify the election on the grounds that it was not a legal contest.

## AN ENORMOUS DEFAULTER

### Robbs the German National Bank of Newport, Ky. of \$200,000.

#### THERE WAS NO RUN ON THE BANK AS THE FELLOW MADE A CLEAN SWEEP

#### A Broker on Wall Wall Street Who Has High Washington Connections Goes to the Ground—Appearance of Blue Monday in Finances.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Controller of the currency, Daws, has appointed Oliver P. Tucker national bank examiner, temporary receiver of the German National bank of Newport, Ky.

"This bank is closed by order of the Comptroller of the Currency" was the notice that appeared on the doors of this bank today. There were none of the usual scenes accompanying a run on a bank by the depositors. The alleged default of assistant-cashier Frank M. Brown, to the amount of about \$200,000 was a fact so overwhelming that no depositor was foolish enough to suppose any good could be accomplished by attempting to get money from the bank today. The discovery was made in a comparison of Brown's individual ledger with the cashier's daily checking up. Here it was found that Brown had been forcing balances from day to day until a total of \$192,000 had been withdrawn from the funds of the bank.

The bank was a depository of nine building associations, as well as about 1500 individuals and firms. There are no indications of an accomplice, or of any one knowing about Brown's departure or destination.

New York, Nov. 19.—The suspension of J. Fletcher Shera was announced on stock exchange today. Shera is said to have important Washington connections.

Grand Duke Vladimir, of Russia, is being considered as Regent, as physicians announce that the Czar's illness may be prolonged.

### SETTLEMENT OF A NAVAL DISPUTE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The Navy department was advised some time ago that trouble has arisen between Captain McCalla, commanding the Newark and Lieut. Commander John C. Colwell, executive officer of the ship. The department left the matter to Admiral Remy, who has appointed a court of inquiry, which will determine the merits of the dispute.
