BUSINESS CONDITIONS AT SALEM ARE BOUND TO BE FAVORABLE.

While grain was a failure in western Oregon the past year, there is plenty of hay and feed for stock. The fall has been mild and favorable for all kinds of cattle. The potato crop is turning out well and there has been plenty of time to save it. With the good prices that have been obtained for prunes and hops the producers as well as the wage workers who make these crops are in much better shape than they have been for years. There are good indications of fair prices for hops and prunes next year, but there is nothing certain about anything these days. Still we have reason to expect fair prices will prevail for wool and all kinds of stock.

Indications are that the terrible competition between trusts cannot be altogether eliminated and while some things the producer has to buy may be higher we may reasonably expect that all around merchandise will be lower. So we can fairly say that the outlook for the producer and consumer is encouraging. Entirely local to Salem, we have reasons to believe this city will get greater prosperity and make more material advance than it has for years. The session of the legislature always puts a large amount of money into circulation. A great deal of money held in warrants and scores of direct appropriations are turned loose and cause money to circulate freely.

The erection of the government building at Salem this year will employ a great amount of labor here. The further improvement of Wilson avenue may be undertaken if a free library bill passes the legislature as is proposed. Some kind of a bill should also be framed by the present city administration by the sprinkling, care and repair of streets about the county and state property within the city could be equally divided between the city, county and state governments. These are matters that need intelligent attention.

The fine piece of boulevard built out past the penitentiary, and the mile of boulevard built towards the Reform school by convict labor under the Looney bill shows what can be done. An united effort should be made this coming year to build a passable street from the city to the Asylum. That avenue is a disgrace to the county and state government, as well as an eyesore and reflection on those who own property and reside on that street. May we not hope that with a more favorable outlook and better conditions prevailing that street may be elevated out of its present condition as a chronic medieval rock-pile. Surely such bright men as our County Judge and State officials could make a record for themselves on that avenue. All this is in the way of hopeful suggestion and without the taint of faultfinding or criticism.

IT IS ALMOST UNANIMOUS

Citizens, Business Men and Tax Payers Endorse.

The Present Non-Partisan Administration of the Business Affairs of the City of Salem.

Some Expressions.
Dr. W. A. Cusick: We have entered into this movement as a business proposition, and all political considerations were eliminated. It has succeeded well, and all our officers have fulfilled their pledges so faithfully that I believe that every taxpayer has received great benefit from the administration. I am unqualifiedly in favor of a continuance of the same regime.

Ladd & Bush: Let us continue it by all means. It is not a matter that admits of question. When they came in power we were running in debt about \$1000 a month. That has been stopped and there has been liberal saving besides. It would be business madness to return to the old order of things.

Werner Breyman: "I am well pleased with the whole work, and would like to have the same class of business men returned. In addition would like to see a little more and better street improvement."

G. W. Johnson: "Heartily in favor of the present regime, and don't believe we could better it."

John Q. Wilson: Think our present financial management is correct and should be sustained.

J. Q. Barnes: The present administration has conducted affairs in such a manner as to justify their continuance in power. The management of the city's finances has been unexcelled, and should be continued.

Gilbert Bros.: Let us retain the present administration by all means. There has been no "job," and only the best interests of the city have been considered.

A. N. Gilbert: I approve of the most favorable things that can be said of this administration.

C. L. Daily: I don't see how it can be bettered. It is simply a case of introducing practical business sense in place of politics.

W. F. Boothby: I favor keeping the present set of officers in for as long a time as they will do as they have the past two years.

Eugene Breyman: The administration has been good for the taxpayers and the welfare of the city, and I want to see it continued.

R. P. Boies: The record will show that city affairs managed as a part of a political machine has been a dismal failure, and managing it as at present, with politics left out and business put in, has been a decided success. I want to see the present business method continued.

W. W. Skinner: I favor continuing the present program of economy and good city government.

E. C. Cross: Hope it will be continued in its present efficient form, as I believe it is the first time in a score of years that the city hasn't run behind.
