IT IS ALMOST UNANIMOUS

Citizens, Business Men and Tax Payers Endorse.

The Present Non-Partisan Administration of the Business Affairs of the City of Salem.

The public sentiment in favor of continuing the present city officials and board of aldermen in power is stronger than ever before. A large number of citizens have been interviewed and are unqualifiedly in favor of the existing order of things. It is understood the men who have served in the citizens' administration are willing to stand for a re-election on December 3d provided they are invited to do so by the citizens, and the sentiment in favor of such action is almost unanimous.

Some Expressions.
Dr. W. A. Cusick: We have entered into this movement as a business proposition, and all political considerations were eliminated. It has succeeded well, and all our officers have fulfilled their pledges so faithfully that I believe that every taxpayer has received great benefit from the administration. I am unqualifiedly in favor of a continuance of the same regime.

Ladd & Bush: Let us continue it by all means. It is not a matter that admits of question. When they came in power we were running in debt about \$1000 a month. That has been stopped and there has been liberal saving besides. It would be business madness to return to the old order of things.
R. P. Boise: The record will show that city affairs managed as a part of a political machine has been a dismal failure, and managing it as at present, with politics left out and business put in, has been a decided success. I want to see the present business method continued.

A. N. Moores: Exceedingly well satisfied with the present order of things. Hope to see the same lines pursued in the future, as we now begin to see daylight from the slough of despond into which we were plunged in the past.

John Savage, Jr.: Think we ought to let well enough alone. I am opposed, as a Republican, to the partisan ideas expressed in the Telegram article. In city matters we should drop all political considerations.

Werner Breyman: "I am well pleased with the whole work, and would like to have the same class of business men returned. In addition would like to see a little more and better street improvement."

J. Q. Barnes: The present administration has conducted affairs in such a manner as to justify their continuance in power. Its management of the city's finances has been unexcelled, and should be continued.

Gilbert Bros: Let us retain the present administration by all means. There have been no "jobs," and only the best interests of the city have been considered.

E. C. Cross: Hope it will be continued in its present efficient form, as I believe it is the first time in a score of years that the city hasn't run behind.

Eugene Breyman: The administration has been good for the taxpayers and the welfare of the city, and I want to see it continued.

Joseph Meyers: Like the management very much. But it is an outrage that we do not have at least one or two more policemen.

C. L. Daily: I don't see how it can be bettered. It is simply a case of introducing practical business sense in place of politics.

Geo. J. Pearce: Would like to see every man of the present non-partisan city administration continued, and their methods as well.

W. F. Boothby: I favor keeping the present set of officers in for as long a time as they will do as they have the past two years.

J. H. Albert: Well satisfied with the present administration and favor a continuance of their non-partisan conduct of city affairs.

F. A. Higgins: It is by far the best administration the city has had to my knowledge. By all means let us continue it.

T. Holverson: I am strongly in favor of giving the present administration a second term. We couldn't better ourselves.

D. J. Fry: This administration ought to suit anybody. Especially taxpayers. Hope to see it continued.

D. F. Wagner: It is all right in all respects and there are no objections to a continuance of the same.

W. H. Holmes: Best city government we have had in twenty years, and we had better stick to it.
Damon Bros.: It would be the height of folly to make a change. We are doing well enough.

J. Conner: "I want to see the whole thing continued with one addition—better streets."

A. M. Humphrey: Fully satisfied and feel that for once we are working on safe lines.

G. W. Putman: It has been a great improvement and will gladly support it again.

J. J. Dalrymple: We want to put every man of them back, and more like them.

H. Poble: It's all right to date. Give us more of the same kind of work.

J. I. Thompson: Its first rate. Don't want changed as long as I live.

H. Stapleton: Am in favor of continuing the present administration.

Walter Morley: I am thoroughly in favor of the present methods.

F. W. Hollis & Co.: It has been all right as far as I can see.

J. B. F. Tutthill: Voted for it before and will do it again.
E. S. Lamport: Want things to stay just as they are.

Guy M. Powers: The only way we will ever get out of debt will be by continuing the present administration.
John Q. Wilson: Think our present financial management is correct and should be sustained.

G. W. Johnson: "Heartily in favor of the present regime, and don't believe we could better it."
W. W. Skinner: I favor continuing the present program of economy and good city government.

A. N. Gilbert: I approve of the most favorable things that can be said of this administration.

H. A. Johnson: The present administration has been good enough for me.
Gil Steiner: "We should put through a straight citizen's ticket just as it is." Branson & Ragan: Think it is all right and hope to see it continued.

J. Purvine: I voted for and I don't know how we could improve on it.
F. A. Turner: I helped put them there and I am not sorry for it.

E. F. Osburn: Can't speak too highly of the men and their work.
M. Bredemeir: It suits me very well.
