SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 28.—The production this week for the first time on the Pacific Coast of Wagner's Nibelungen Ring by the Maurice Grau Opera Company, has proved to be a notable musical event. "Das Rheingold" the prelude to the great trilogy was presented on Monday night to an enthusiastic audience that filled the Grand Opera House. Last night "Die Walkure" was given with a cast including Van Dyk, Biepham, Blase, Gadeki, Schumann-Heink, Nordica, Scheff, Homer, Oltzka, Baumeister, Maryll and Bridewell. The curtain was announced to rise at 7:30 p. m., but before that hour there were 3000 people in the house and not an inch of standing room remained. Scores were turned away from the doors. Walter Damrosch conducted the performance which was staged with the wealth of detail that characterized the New York production. The conductor and singers received many curtain calls.
