When the city of Salem can have an administration with its destinies for two years guided by such superb financial geniuses as Frank Davey, E. H. Flagg and H. J. Bigger, what is the use of flogging around with Populists like C. P. Bishop and Dr. Cusick?

As a matter of fact, there is no danger that even with the use of the machine the streets would be put in perfect order with the road taxes available, and nothing left for the poor laborer to do; while the use of the machine makes it pleasant for those who are obliged to travel the streets. There will be plenty of money left for the shoveler to work on. Mr. Flagg's denunciation in the Republican convention of "this devilish idea of economy" does not touch this matter, for the city is saved no expense and the laboring man deprived of no wages. It simply permits the streets to be put in better condition with the funds available.

C. P. Bishop is a fearless republican, and as faithful to his party as he is loyal to his city--and he has not been a life-long office holder, either.

D. W. Gibson is a steadfast republican and serves his party with the same devotion he does the constituency that placed him in charge of police affairs in Salem. He is a trained police agent and has forgotten more of this business than his opponent ever knew.

John Moir is one of the best qualified treasurers Salem ever had, and no man on earth can beat him for integrity and capacity, not even J. W. Bickford.

What's the matter with N. J. Judah? A citizen of ten years standing in Salem, he has as many years of private and public service here that is unimpeachable. It was unwise for the managers after the late "straight" republican convention of Salem, to go into session unprepared with candidates committed to the honor of selection. It showed palpable weakness, for the assured candidacy of strong men is a powerful card in politics, much stronger than the dubious assurance of unprepared and unwilling leaders.

Another Outrage in the Line of Flagg's "Devilish Idea of Economy."

Under the "Address Issued to Voters," in Friday's Statesman, appears this: One Republican leader said that many workmen, who are dissatisfied with the present administration's method of work, in the matter of cleaning the streets alone, will support the Republican ticket, irrespective of politics. This gentleman said that the employment of a four-horse scraper had aroused considerable adverse comment, as the cost of the work was fully as much as that of a dozen men would have been, with no better results, and that had men with shovels been employed, a number of families would have profited thereby, and would have earned Thanksgiving dinner. This, he said, was a sample of the complaint heard.

An attempt is being made to show that the city council committed some kind of a heinous crime against the laboring men of the city by using the city's road scraper on the streets a few days ago.

This attempted howl is somewhat below par with the Boxers' objections to the introduction of railroads in China. The railroad in China may throw some one out of employment; but the use of the road scraper on State and Commercial streets did not cause any laboring man to lose an hour's employment, but only enabled the street commissioner to do more work on the streets with the funds and the labor at his command.

The scraper was used to clear the mud out of the way for the depositing of a strip of gravel and to smooth down this strip of gravel on Commercial street and on State street from Commercial to Twelfth. Four horses and two men did more work with it in one day than forty men with shovels could have done, and did it better. Had hand power only been available the work simply could not have been done at this time, for the reason that neither funds nor labor enough were available.

The two men and four horses were working out road taxes, the same as were the men and horses hauling gravel or shoveling mud, and the only difference made by hitching to the road scraper was that fifteen or twenty times as much work was accomplished.

The road machine was purchased by a former administration at an expense of some \$400. It is an excellent machine and does good work. If any one can point out what benefit would accrue to the laboring man or anyone else by letting the machine rust out in a house while mud lies in the street, he should trot out his reasons.

GRAND OPENING GRAND OPERA HOUSE

A Great Artistic and Financial Success.

Description of Its Beauties and List of Persons Present on the Opening Night.

If the opening night of the Grand Opera House proves a pattern of the nights which are to come, no one will ever have reason for anything but congratulation that the beautiful little play-house has been built.

When the curtain rose it is safe to say that all were delighted with the new line of the drama.

There is not a seat in the house that does not command a good view of every part of the stage, and the acoustic properties are all that the most sanguine could expect.

In these respects it is so far superior to the old shack in which the theatre goers of Salem have passed so many comfortless hours, that no comparison can be made; nor is it necessary.

The arrangement of the many incandescent lights illuminates the house with a soft radiance which is very effective. Perhaps the only criticism heard of the plan of the house was that the gallery; hangs rather low. However, one can see and hear distinctly everything that occurs on the stage, so that criticism should not be severe.

The color in which the interior is finished is most pleasing to the eye and the effect is rich and restful. The decorations are quiet and tasteful, and the whole scheme is delightfully harmonious.

It was hard to realize that but a few days ago this interior was a raw, rough and ragged mass of new lumber and scaffolding. The contractors and every one connected with the institution have been rushing the work with tireless energy night and day, and have accomplished wonders.

While the curtain was a little late in rising there was no further delay of any kind and everything went off without a hitch.

This speaks highly for the managerial ability of Mr. Cordray and the perfection of his arrangements. The troupe and the scenery did not arrive until 6:30 p. m., and the scenery did not reach the stage until shortly before the time for the opening of the performance. Yet the curtain rose only 7 minutes late.

The Journal heartily congratulates the people of Salem and the Odd Fellows in particular. The Odd Fellows may well feel proud of their achievement and they are entitled to the hearty thanks of the whole community for their enterprise in providing such a beautiful and up-to-date home of the drama, and place for public gatherings.

Of the Grand Opera Company and Sousa's play of "El Capitan" only praises can be spoken.

The music is of the kind which can be appreciated by all, and the company contains the best aggregation of good voices that have been heard in Salem in many a day.

The leading parts were all well taken. J. W. Kingsley as El Capitan sustained the title role with inimitable drollery, and Frank Deason as the Chamberlain was very funny. Jos. H. Smith as a Peruvian gentleman sang in superb voice, and in a love song in the second act simply brought down the house.

Kate Michelson as Isabel also established herself in favor. The equal of her voice is seldom heard here. A duet between this lady and Deason in the third act was exceptionally fine and brought a deserved encore.

The chorus singing was superb and the audience showed its appreciation generously. The curtain tableau at the end of the second act was inspiring.

Manager Cordray made no mistake in opening the new house with this excellent company. Mr. Cordray's orchestra from Portland fully sustained its reputation as the leading organization of its kind in the Northwest.

The costumes were exceptionally rich and handsome and seemed to all be entirely new.

The programs were very neat. The first cover showed on a tinted background the title of the new theater, "Grand Opera House," and the name of John F. Cordray, M. G. R., with pretty and tasteful figures emblematic of the drama, choruses, etc. It contained the announcement of the plays for the two opening nights and the matinee, of coming attractions, together with the manager's greeting to the Salem public, and the rules of the house. It was put out by Mr. Henry Pape, the job printer, and the typographical and press work was very creditable.
