SOME CHINESE SMUGGLED IN

Across the Canadian Boundary Are Arrested

Emigrants Received and Obtain Employment in New York

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Detectives of the Jersey City police department have arrested two Chinamen in the Pennsylvania Railroad Station in Jersey City for the alleged violation of the Chinese exclusion law. The prisoners who said they were Ching Tang and Yin Wah were passengers on the Lehigh Valley express train from Buffalo. They had berths in the Pullman sleeping car. They were taken before United States Commissioner Romaine and were held to await examination.

It is alleged that they were smuggled across the border and were to go to a place in New York where Chinese immigrants are received and obtain employment. Chief of the Jersey City Police Murphy received information that Chinamen were being smuggled into New York by the wholesale, as many as 10 a day some times arriving over the Lehigh Valley road. The Pennsylvania railroad station was watched and it was noticed that each morning Chinamen arrived from Buffalo there would be a Chinaman in the station. He would make an almost imperceptible sign and the new arrivals would follow him to New York.

The New York Chinaman would hold no conversation with the others. The arrests just made are the result of these investigations. The prisoners had their clothes covered with mud, which the police believe confirms the theory that they were smuggled across the boundary in boats.

KENTUCKY FIEND TO BE LYNCHED

Mob Watching For William Gibson -- Intend to Burn Him at the Stake

CAVETTLEBURG, Ky., Dec. 6.—William Gibson, the man who has long been sought for torturing and killing his daughter, was captured yesterday at Irwin Hill, Carter county, and was brought to the house of Sheriff Davis, who resides about two miles outside the city, after dark. County Judge L. T. Everett made an order removing the prisoner for safe keeping to Mayville. Deputy Sheriff William Gieger and Jailer I. S. Hurd left the city for Russell, Ky., where they will take the train to Mayville.

Further along the line the train was boarded and the coach searched but no sign of the prisoner was found by the searchers. At various points crowds are collected waiting for the news of the capture of the prisoner by the mob and it is certain that if he should be taken he will be burned alive. It is thought the officers having heard of the stationing of the mob at some small village and are now in hiding.

MAYVILLE, Ky., Dec. 6.—John Gibson who is charged with murdering his infant stepdaughter by forcing a red hot poker down her throat, was placed in jail here today for safe keeping.

MORE WORK OF ANTHONY COMSTOCK

Arrest of a New York Photographer For Improper Use of Main

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—While a big Broadway crowd watched the proceedings last evening a patrol wagon carted away 10,000 films and negatives of the American Electroscopic Company as well as the proprietor, John J. Alexandra of Brooklyn. It was the second time he had been arrested during the day the federal authorities having first put him under apprehension. He was taken in to custody at the instance of Anthony Comstock. The ten thousand films and negatives are alleged to be in part improper.

The federal authorities arrested Alexandra during the day on a charge of sending improper matter through the mail. He was taken before Commissioner Shields where he waived examination and he was held in \$1000 bail which he immediately furnished. The police claim young men would go to the rooms and pose for the pictures.

ADULTERATED MOLASSES

Very Profitable to the Grocery Trade

Said to Be Very Little Demand for the Pure Article in the Trade

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—The Herald prints the following: Immediate action will be taken by the Board of Health to discover if adulterated molasses is being sold in this city. This movement is the result of an agitation in behalf of pure molasses that is now going on in New Orleans.

According to the latest reports of the departments of Agriculture in Washington a great part of the molasses output is adulterated with glucose, sorghum and other agents. At the office of Henry R. Hobart & Company, wholesale dealers, it was said that there is comparatively little demand for the pure molasses. "We sell the 'mixed' article to nearly all our customers," said one of the firms. "Of course we have the pure molasses but there is comparatively little demand for it." The mixed is simply a preparation of 50 per cent glucose and molasses. It is harmless and most consumers do not know the difference. In my opinion fully 95 per cent of the molasses that is sold here is adulterated. Only the highly colored or bleached article is harmful. We do not handle it. The reason the retailers prefer the mixed molasses is that there is more profit in it.

MORGAN WILL SUCCEED MOODY.

EAST NORTHFIELD, Mass., Dec. 6.—W. R. Moody has reached home after a visit to London in the course of which he secured the consent of Rev. G. Campbell Morgan to assist in the Northfield work. Mr. Moody says that such an arrangement was planned by Dwight L. Moody before his death, and that Mr. Morgan will come to this country in the early summer. He will make his home in East Northfield and will attend the Northfield conference, beginning his special Northfield extension work in the early autumn.

This work has been carried on by Mr. Meyer, Mr. Morgan and Mr. H. W. Pope in previous years and consists mainly in holding conventions for a week or ten days duration in various cities, seeking thereby to awaken a deeper interest in bible study and greater fellowship among Christian workers.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—The proposed trip of the Columbia University football team to California, which was to have taken place during the Christmas holidays, has been abandoned.

VALPARAISO, Chile, Dec. 6.—The Cabinet has resigned. Marianne Sanchez, Secretary of the Interior has retired on account of bad health.
