SERVING THE MAILS TO THE PEOPLE

Uncle Sam Makes Free Rural Delivery Permanent

And Thus 21,000,000 People Will Have Mail Delivered to Their Homes

One of the most interesting features of the annual report of Postmaster General Smith is that which relates to rural free delivery of mail matter. There have been striking advances in the postal service in the past, but, in the opinion of Mr. Smith, the extension of rural free delivery during the past two years has been the most salient, significant and far-reaching feature of postal development in recent times. He thinks that to undertake the personal and free delivery of mail at the isolated farmhouses on the remote country roads marks what in this widely extended land amounts to a new departure in the postal service. It means what is the upshot of the old theory that the man should go for the mail instead of the mail going to the man.

Free delivery in rural communities was at one time thought too costly and unbusinesslike to be practicable. On these grounds the movement met with great opposition when first proposed, and even when congress authorized the experiment there was reluctance in trying it. It took time and experience to develop the more just view: first that the great body of people who live outside cities and towns are entitled to share in advanced mail facilities, even if the cost exceeds the returns; and second, that the barrier of unbalanced expense is not as formidable as was apprehended.

The postmaster general says that rural free delivery has now been sufficiently tried to measure its effects. It has stimulated social and business correspondence and in this way swelled the postal receipts. Its introduction has invariably been followed by a large increase in the circulation of the press and periodical literature. The farm has thus been brought into direct daily contact with the movements of the business world. A more accurate knowledge of ruling markets and varying prices has been diffused, and the producer, with his quicker communication and larger information, enjoys advantages never before known. Good roads have become indispensable and their improvement is the essential condition of the service. The material and measurable benefits are signal and unmistakable.

Mr. Smith thinks that rural free delivery is here to stay. It cannot be abandoned where it has been established and it cannot be maintained without being extended. Those who enjoy its advantages will not consent to surrender them, and every new route creates a demand for continuous territory for similar privileges. The government is therefore confronted with the problem of gradually extending the system over the whole area of the country where it is physically feasible where the population is not so sparse as to make it unreasonable.

The government is now carrying the postoffice to the doors of 31,000,000 of people massed in the towns and cities. The work of the future is the more complicated task of carrying the postoffice to the doors of about 21,000,000 people scattered over 1,000,000 square miles of territory. England, France and Germany make rural free delivery, their postmen going on foot. But England contains only about 50,000 square miles, and Germany but a little more. The United States is now covering with rural free delivery an area larger than England, and it has been accomplished within the past two years. By the end of the current fiscal year one-sixth of these 21,000,000 country people will be enjoying a delivery service. In July, 1899, there were 391 rural delivery routes in operation. Within the fiscal year, under an appropriation of \$450,500, this number was increased to 1,214. In July the appropriation of \$1,750,000 became available, and last month 2,914 routes had been established, which aggregated 61,979 miles in length, covering 66,842 square miles, divided among forty-four states and territories, and serving a population of 1,801,524. The number of applications for new routes were enough to double the service, and the close of the present fiscal year will see 4,300 routes in operation, with mail carried to the doors of not less than 3,500,000 people in the rural districts.

The postoffice department estimates that the rural free delivery can be extended practically over the whole country at an annual cost of less than \$14,000,000. This would really mean the delivery of mail matter at about every door in the land. This assumes that the cost shall not exceed the present rate, and, with rigorous restraint, the expenditures for this service can be restricted to fixed boundaries where the revenue will steadily increase. The postmaster general maintains that the great result of carrying the postoffice to a cost comparatively so small, is a work that is well worth undertaking.

RECOGNITION OF HARRISON R. KINCAID

After Being Abused Like A Cutpurse

When Secy. of State for Standing by Republican Bimetallism

The old saying that "bread cast upon the waters will return after many days" is sometimes verified, but usually not until after those who cast the bread have gone to that "bourn from whence no traveler ever returns." Such has been the fate of nearly all the founders of great reforms, inventions, discoveries and public benefactions, religious, political, financial, scientific, social or moral, as far back and as world-wide as the memory of man and history and tradition "runneth not to the contrary." The founder of the Christian religion, Joan of Arc, Columbus, and not all, but nearly all who have done the most good in the world, have been misrepresented, persecuted and neglected while living and hounded to death by those for whose benefit they spent their energies and devoted their lives. As this is the way the world has nearly always paid its debts, by returning evil for good to the living and building monuments for the dead, it is not so surprising, although discouraging and unpleasant to have the same rule applied to smaller benefits and less important matters in which a few hundred thousand people are interested. Large sums of money saved; records indexed and arranged for forty years; paintings and historical relics rescued from rubbish and labeled and arranged; millions of dollars disbursed, of which thousands of claims were without appropriations, on duplicate vouchers, called in by order of the court, and warrants issued in place under laws extending over a period of fifty years, either specific or implied, such as no other person in this State or the United States was ever required to do, and after a thorough and extended examination at two sessions of the Legislature not a cent was found wrong; a political and official history and register of the State, not required by law, voluntarily and gratuitously compiled from materials much of which would have been lost if not collected then, covering a period of seventy-five years; order brought out of chaos by working half of every night for nearly four years; all of which and much more of similar import was well known, far and wide, admitted by all, depicted by none.

But notwithstanding all these well known facts, the phonics commenced, the very day the commendable work ceased, to return evil for good with compound interest. Since then, ridicule, misrepresentation and falsehood have taken the place of candor, justice and truth almost without exception. So it is gratefully, but perhaps a little prematurely, as the object of so much partisan gall and vitriol is not quite dead physically, to learn that, in two years somebody has discovered some good in the least of many similar benefits—in a mere decimal fraction of the sum total—and that discovery is found in the leading editorial in the ablest Republican paper on the Pacific Coast, The Oregonian, of November 30, 1900, as follows:

"It was erroneously asserted in The Oregonian the other day that the Presidential Electors chosen November 6, will assemble at Salem on the first Wednesday of December. The prescribed time is the second Monday in January. An act of the legislature of 1861 provided for the casting of the vote at 12 o'clock noon of the first Wednesday of December; but this act was rendered inoperative by the act of Congress dated February 3, 1887, which designates the second Monday in January, leaving the place to be determined by the states. It appears that no state law has been passed in accordance with the Federal statute, and our Electoral College procedure is therefore in similar case with our constitutional restriction upon the negro—nominally in force, but abrogated by Federal enactments that take precedence. The facts in this matter are set forth in the pamphlet containing our election laws, printed by Secretary Kincaid in 1897. The little book itself, so painstakingly compiled, instructed and edited and helpfully illustrated, is a forcible reminder of the excellent service Mr. Kincaid rendered the state in this and other historical questions. The special publications of his administration, all authorized in the statutes, by the way, are indispensable adjuncts of the annals of Oregon. They should be included in every library in the state."
