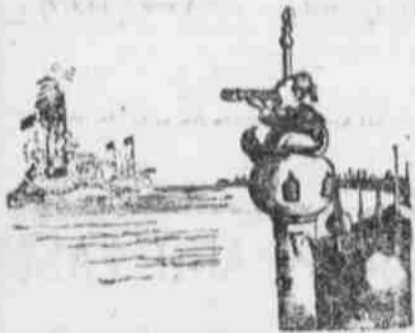

## AMERICAN TREATY

A Hard Blow for Great Britain

### THE ENGLISH PRESS IS A UNIT

In Declaring the Treaty (Published Elsewhere) is Not Acceptable

LONDON, Dec. 21.—Nearly all of the morning papers have editorials on the action of the United States Senate in connection with the Hay-Pauncefote treaty. They express regret rather than surprise at the secession of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty and unanimously declare that it will be impossible for Great Britain to accept the amended treaty.

"The United States has struck us a hard blow," says the Daily News, "at the fundamental principle of the faith among nations, at its own reputation and at the very constitution of the great republic."

"We are thankful," says the Daily Chronicle, "that the senate stopped short of amendments obviously designed to wreck the whole proceedings. We believe that a compromise is still possible as the resources of diplomacy are not yet exhausted."

There is a strongly evident desire to do everything reasonable as the Daily Chronicle suggests to meet the views of the Americans in all the continents.

Several papers however consider it out of the question that the British Government should for a minute accept or discuss the amended treaty.

The Standard argues on this basis while recognizing in the fullest manner that President McKinley has labored earnestly to combine American aspirations with delicate regard for international obligations."

"Time is on the side of a friendly and satisfactory settlement. No harm will be done to the whole transaction if left as it is until March when we may hope the new Senate may meet the question in a fresh spirit."

The Daily Telegraph, which thinks it is a matter for compromise, says: "Our existing treaty rights cannot be superseded in the summary manner some Senators seem to imagine, but nobody in England desires to thwart the legitimate wishes of the American people by a too rigorous insistence on our claims and privileges. The mere fact that a ratification of the amended treaty is desired in America would naturally lead us to review our own position and to attempt to find some middle way of amicable arrangement."

## DISCUSS CLEVELAND

And His Talk About the Democratic Party

### IT WAS WORDY AND UNSATISFYING

Sterling Morton Wants a Re-alignment Not Haunted By the Past

New York, Dec. 21.—The Herald publishes the following comment on ex-President Grover Cleveland's statement in regard to the Democratic party.

J. Sterling Morton—"I fully concur in the opinions of Mr. Cleveland as to the cause of the defeat of the Democratic party in 1896 and also as to the reasons for its bitterly accentuated and vehemently emphasized wallowing in 1900. Until all the heresies of Bryanarchy are renounced by the Democracy it will remain a minority. I should prefer a realignment of American voters under a new name which its opponents could taunt with no past."

Representative De Armond of Missouri—"I think the former President is correct in his conclusion that it is not necessary for the party to put itself for reorganization purposes into the hands of some of those who deserted it. When he informs us at what time in its history the rank and file of the Democratic party were consulted more fully than in 1896 and 1900 we shall know better how to estimate his opinions of his own deliberations."

Hilary A. Herbert, who was President Cleveland's secretary of the navy,—"I endorse the article heartily, excepting in so far as it may be a criticism of the Democratic party in supporting Greeley on the Liberal Republican platform of 1872. If Mr. Cleveland had meant to say that the Greeley movement was, taken as a whole, unwise, I should put in my emphatic dissent. The times in 1875 were abnormal. The Southern states were in the throes of carpet bagger misrule. For the southern people it is a question of life and death. The south turned to Greeley in its distress and he became in fact the candidate of the southern rather than of the northern Democracy. The effect of this support was to open the eyes of the northern voters and in the next election came the tidal wave of 1874."

"Still, Mr. Cleveland is right in saying that the rank and file of the democrats could not be brought into line to support an old antagonist. Taken altogether, there is no answering Mr. Cleveland's arguments."

John Dewitt Warner—"My idea is that Democrats can best unite the party by taking every opportunity to work against the Republican party. I agree with Mr. Cleveland that it is not so much the organization of the party that is necessary as the return to old principles, the first of which I believe is to make decided stand on behalf of the people against any fresh attempt by the syndicate that exploit McKinley to loot the American people for its benefit."

Edward M. Shepard—"I will merely say that I welcome any utterance of Mr. Cleveland; it will do good. As to the criticism, that he does not sufficiently point out what steps should be taken by the Democracy in the direction of reorganization, I would say that I suppose Mr. Cleveland wants to set people thinking right before they take action."

Howard R. Bayne—"We all realize the facts as they have been set forth by Mr. Cleveland and many persons have said substantially the same thing before. I do not think that among Democrats there can be any difference of opinion as to the necessity of reorganization. Mr. Cleveland's reconciliation scheme all gold Democrats will concur in, but if it may be permitted to criticize certain parts of his article I should say that they are too general to be of any practical benefit in the reorganization of the party."

OSMAN PASHA TO FREE THE KURDS  
LONDON, Dec. 21.—General Osman Pasha, who led the Kurd rising in 1873, told a representative of the Daily Mail yesterday that he would leave London today (Friday) to head another rising to free Turkestan from Turkish rule.

"I hope for English sympathy," he said, "if not for more material support in the struggle against the despotic Turks, who, dominated by Russia, have compelled the brave, warlike Kurds to act the part of assassins toward their brother Armenians."

## OUTLOOK BLACKER

Than Any Time Since Boer War Began

### LOWER HOUSE OF GERMAN LEGISLATURE

Was a Tie On Resolution for Arbitration Between England and Transvaal

New York, Dec. 21.—A dispatch to the World from London says: Midnight—The outlook in South Africa is regarded as blacker than at any time before or since the Boer war began. Persistent reports are circulating in the political clubs of a widespread rebellion in Cape Colony. This is believed to be the cause of Lord Salisbury's gloomy speech on Tuesday.

The situation is regarded with deep alarm as it is feared that Lord Kitchener's supplies are in danger of being cut off. Lord Kitchener is said to have sent a dispatch demanding 3000 more mounted men for the security of British positions in South Africa. No practical scheme for providing these reinforcements has yet been framed by the War Office.

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 21.—The situation in the northern districts of Cape Colony is more serious. Fully two thousand Boers have invaded that section. Grave fears are entertained that Dutch sympathizers will join the rebellion and that this will spread. Although there is no fear as to the ultimate result, the lack of a sufficient number of mounted troops is felt by the British. The enormous waste of horses in South Africa was never fully appreciated until now.

DAKESBURY, Dec. 21.—By the President casting his vote, the second chamber of the legislature today defeated a motion to instruct representatives in the German Reichstag to propose assembling of the foreign affairs committee with the object of initiating a proposal of arbitration between Great Britain and the Transvaal. Representatives of the Government left the house before debate on the motion.

### CHOW CHOW FROM THE WIRES

Dr. Richard A. Wise, member of house from Norfolk, Va., is dead.

Wires are down in all directions and news is difficult to get.

Mrs. Wm. P. Frye, wife of president pro tem of the Senate, died suddenly today at Washington.

A destructive storm raged all night on the British channel. Stories of wrecks and damage are coming from all directions, but the fatalities are few.

The senate committee on territories today heard arguments by Governor Murphy and delegate Wilson in support of the bill for the admission of Arizona as a state.

The Senate has adjourned to Jan. 3. When the House met today there were less than 100 members on floor. A majority had already departed for home to spend holiday recess.

A big unknown schooner is reported from Philadelphia as ashore on Hen and Chickens shoal, just below Cape Henlopen. Wind is so fierce that life savers are unable to send assistance to the crew.

## DREYFUS VICTIMS

One Arrested and Another Reported Starving.

### THE GOVERNMENT IS SUSTAINED

By a Vote of Confidence in Return for Nationalist Attack.

PARIS, Dec. 21.—The Chamber of Deputies today by a vote of 309 to 192 decided to postpone M. Lascie's motion to interpellate the Government on the Major Guignot incident, until all further orders of the day were disposed of, thus shelving the nationalist attack indefinitely and giving the Government a vote of confidence.

PARIS, Dec. 21.—Major Guignot, who figured in the Dreyfus court martial at Rennes, has been arrested and imprisoned in Fort Mont Valerien, where he is awaiting trial by court martial on two charges. The first is a charge of grave offenses against discipline in writing directly without authorization to the Council, M. Waldeck-Lousseau, according to having told the Chamber of Deputies an untruth when he said that Major had approved the interpretation officially placed upon the famous Pannizzardi telegram.

The second charge is being guilty of disclosing a confidential document, namely, the statement signed by Major Guignot and General Chamoin, which was read in the Chamber by Joseph Lascie formulating some reservations concerning the Pannizzardi dispatch.

## TURKISH OUTRAGES

Massacres of Christians Growing Worse

### HAIKUK ISLAM KILLS TWO HUNDRED

And the Outrages of His Followers Beggar Description

New York, Dec. 21.—A dispatch to the Journal and Advertiser from Vienna says: Further reports of Turkish massacres of Christians show that their instigator is a Mohammedan named Haikuk Islam who brags of having slaughtered 200 Christians with his own hand. The Turkish authorities have shown utter indifference to the massacres and the outrages perpetrated on Christians are beyond description.

At Ditch men were crucified on trees with stakes driven through their hands and feet. Women were attacked and then mutilated. Children were murdered by mutilation before their parents' eyes. Women were maltreated at Grunau before the eyes of their husbands, fathers and brothers and then carried to the bondage of harems. Men were done to death slowly by various means, their limbs cut off successively and children were thrown into the river.

The funds tortured the Christians at Riharitz by slicing flesh from all parts of their bodies before killing them. A Greek Orthodox priest was tied in a sack and pitched into the river at Genovita. The Serbian Consul at Mitrovitza estimates that 1100 persons have been killed and 400 women attacked and placed in harems.

## AUTONOMY PARTY IS

Growing Stronger in the Philippine Islands

### MANY INSURGENTS KILLED AND TAKEN

Natives Preparing a Bill of Rights and Ask Five Representatives

MANILA, Dec. 21.—Every mountain trail in General Young's district, north of the Abra and between the coast and Dolores, has been followed up by the American scouts this month. A similar movement has taken place in the Provinces of Union, Benguet, La Panto and the part of South Ilo Ilo which lies south of the Abra river. Fifteen insurgents have been killed and more than a 100 captured. The villages were always abandoned before the arrival of the Americans, but many buildings that have been used as barracks have been destroyed.

The leaders of the projected autonomy party have again visited the Philippine Commission and the platform proposed was discussed privately and in an informal way. The commissioners advise the elimination of a few minor features. Personally they approve the movement as a forward step in the direction of the ultimate measure of self-government which the commission has already been instructed to endeavor to bring about. The plan of the party is to form United States territories involving candidature for ultimate statehood. The platform declares in favor of a Senate and a House of Representatives elected from the districts of the archipelago according to population. In preparing a bill of rights the United States Constitution is utilized with the exception of the features of trial by jury.

According to the plan, the Governor General appointed by the president, would have the power to veto excepting in case of a two-thirds vote of the legislature. The legislature would choose five delegates to the United States Congress.

The platform opposes the sale of the Philippines without the consent of the legislature. It contains little regarding judiciary or local affairs.

General Bates reports that a detachment of the Fourth United States cavalry, assisted by a gunboat attacked the town of Pantangan and dispersed the armed occupants, killing 90.
