MARION COUNTY POTATO CASE

Supreme Court Affirms Appeal of Mitchell vs. La Follett.

Chief Justice Bean of the Oregon Supreme court today affirmed the above-named case. It seems that in 1898, McKinley Mitchell contracted with Alex. La Follett for a lot of potatoes to be delivered at the river, and sued to recover \$100 damages, \$20 money advanced, and \$56.25 for sacks. This suit was won in the Gervais justice court. Upon appeal to the circuit court La Follett contended that Mitchell had agreed verbally to receive them as his farm, but refused to pay for and take them, and finally refused to receive them. The circuit court reversed the case and is now sustained by the supreme court.

PROGRAMS ON CHRISTMAS DAY

What Salem Business Houses and Offices Will Do.

Observance of the Day at State Institutions, Churches and Schools.

On Christmas day all public offices, banks, etc., will be closed all day, as well as shops, and factories.
Most of the stores will close at noon, and some few all day, including the New York Racket store. Grocery stores, music stores, book stores, clothing, and dry goods houses will all close some time during the forenoon. Jewelry will keep open only as long as trade compels.
The barber shops will probably close about 12 o'clock, and the saloons at 12 o'clock p. m., more or less.
The post office will be open for the delivery of mail and registered letters from 1 to 2 o'clock, but no money order business will be transacted.

Recognized By a Gathering At Her Home City

Promotion of Purity, Prohibition and Love of Abstinence.

CHICAGO, Dec. 24.—A special program was carried out at Emmanuel Methodist church in Evanston last night in commemoration of the twenty-sixth anniversary of the commencement of a general temperance crusade throughout the United States.
The speakers of the evening were Mrs. L. M. N. Stevens, president, and Miss Anna Gordon, vice-president of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union. Mrs. Stevens said in part:
"There may be some who do not agree with us in our ideas of prohibition, but I believe that there are but very few that are not within the W. C. T. U. has now become one of the greatest societies both at the home and abroad that exists today."

BRYAN WILL BREAK SILENCE

CHICAGO, Dec. 24.—The Chronicle says: William Jennings Bryan will answer ex-President Cleveland's criticism of the Democratic party at the annual banquet of the W. J. Bryan League of Chicago on the anniversary of the battle of New Orleans January 8. The affair will take place at the Sherman House. It will be Bryan's first public speech since his second defeat for the Presidency. Announcement was made last evening at the meeting of the County Democracy by Robert E. Burke of the acceptance by Mr. Bryan of an invitation to speak on Jackson day. Mr. Bryan's subject is "Democracy." Besides Bryan, the other speakers who have accepted are ex-Governor W. J. Stone of Missouri, Congressman Carmack of Tennessee and Mr. Burke says it is probable that Governor Beckham of Kentucky will be the fourth orator.

INDIAN OUTBREAK FEARED IN ALASKA

SEATTLE, Dec. 24.—Advice have been received have been received from Sitka, Alaska, stating that that town is in a state of suppressed excitement, fearing an outbreak of Indians. The United States marine stationed there are under arms and the Marshal and deputies are taking every precaution to protect the whites in case of an outbreak. The aspect of affairs is very serious at Sitka, as the Indians are by far the stronger, numerically. There are 55 marines commanded by Captain Pendleton at Sitka.

COLLAPSED FROM SHOCK OF SHOOTING

HALLIDAYSBURG, Pa., Dec. 24.—Miss Junonia Rohrbach, employe of Auditor's office War Department, has been brought home in a quite stage of nervous collapse that is likely to prove fatal. Miss Rohrbach was near the desk of Frank H. Morris when MacDonald entered the office and shot him. The shock of this tragedy was too much for the young woman's nerves.

GOVERNOR PINGREE CITED FOR CONTEMPT

LANSING, Mich., Dec. 24.—On petition of the members of the Ingham county bar Judge Wiest of Ingham county court today ordered Governor Pingree to appear next Saturday and show a cause why he should not be punished for contempt. Action is based on an interview published in Detroit Tribune in which Governor bitterly attacked Judge Wiest and prosecutor Tatfill.
