PLANS FOR BEAUTIFYING THE AMERICAN WOMAN.

EXPORTS AND IMPORTS

The commercial record of the United States in the calendar year 1900 will surpass that of any preceding year both in exports and in the excess of exports over imports, or "favorable balance of trade," as this excess is usually termed, the imports will be slightly below those of one or two preceding years, and when considered in their relation to population show a smaller importation for each individual than at almost any other period in many years. Basing the estimate for the year upon the eleven months' actual figures already received by the Treasury Bureau of Statistics, it seems probable that the exports of the calendar year 1900 will reach about \$1,470,000,000, and the imports \$850,000,000, making the excess of exports or favorable balance of trade \$620,000,000, a sum greater by \$25,000,000 than that of any preceding year. It is only since 1873 that the exports have with any regularity exceeded the imports, or produced the favorable balance of trade which has almost continuously characterized our commerce during the last quarter of a century. Yet it remained for the closing year of the century to present not only the highest record of excess of exports over imports, or favorable balance of trade, in the history of our commerce.

Considering the exports alone, it may be said that for the calendar year 1900 they will be double those of the calendar year 1888, three times those of 1872, four times those of 1869, and five times as much as in 1862. On the import side the figures are less imposing. They will aggregate for the year about \$850,000,000, against \$840,000,000 in the calendar year 1892, when they reached the high-water mark of the century's imports.

THE ARGUMENT FOR HIGH SCHOOLS

Presented by Professor Resler of Eugene.

At the Albany State Teachers Association that has Adjourned.

ALBANY, Friday, Dec. 28.—The first paper of the morning was on "The Relation of the Elementary Schools to the High Schools" by E. D. Resler of Eugene schools. He said the American school system is the result of the evolution of a number of distinct separate schools. The kindergarten, the elementary school, the academy, the college and university.

Practically they are separate. Theoretically they are united into a whole and the state has assumed control of 15,850,000 pupils 300,000 teachers, and 90 per cent are in the elementary and high schools.

In towns and cities where boys and girls are not needed so much in work of making a living, every effort should be made to get all possible into high schools. In Eugene 25 per cent of the elementary pupils are in the high school. The elementary school taught its few branches more thoroughly perhaps. The present teacher has more branches to keep up, as music, drawing, physical culture, etc., and sacrifices thoroughness to a wider outlook upon the world.

The wide awake teacher does not omit to instruct his pupils how to get the most out of both text-books as well as reference books. Nearly all who pass the Eighth grade want to enter the Ninth grade. Unless the Eighth grade teacher has a special training and has sufficient time to do so he cannot properly teach Ninth grade studies.

The business of the high school teacher is to show the pupil how to study and how best to use his information. He must deal with subjects rather than with books. As a rule, the high school teacher needs to review a considerable part of some of the elementary school studies, notably arithmetic, grammar and history.

In the discussion of this subject Supt. Ackerman said this is educationally the most important subject in Oregon today. Let us not lose sight of essentials. It matters not about the name. Many a boy is in the high school in our village and country schools today and does not know it. It is in the air. We hear it every where. The people demand it and they are going to have it.

There seems to be no other subject before the Association that absorbs so much attention and upon which the sentiment seems so unanimous as this one of high schools. In the country consolidation of districts for this purpose is recommended. Prof. Justus Burnham, Principle of the Cochrane School of Portland, read the most thoughtful paper of the Association on Apperception. Prof. Burnham is a master in this line. It is the unanimous testimony of all who heard it, that its equal has never been heard before an institution in Oregon on a psychological subject.

Prest, Campbell presented the subject of Manual training in Grammar grades in a clear and forcible way, showing samples of work done. Miss Minette Magers of Salem schools followed with a paper on the same subject in the primary grade, which showed a clear understanding of her subject and elicited universal commendation from all present.

The lecture in the evening at the Methodist church by Dr. H. W. Kellogg on "That Boy We Teach," was a grand effort, the most inspiring of the Association. Man is the grandest thing in the world and the greatest mission is to teach boys and girls to be men and women. The needs of the twentieth century are greater than any that has preceded. The preparation to meet these needs must be correspondingly great. The majority of the world's leaders in every branch of human activity are college-bred men.

The audience were simply spell bound by his pictures of the twentieth century in which the boys of today are to take a part. A SALEM TEACHER.
