and Rev. Head of the S. R. Union, of
Salem were present. Rev. Shipp read
a paper on 20th century outlook, and
there was general discussion.

A good New Year's resolution: "Never turn turtle."

The Farmers' Congress is the only congress of its kind. The other congress is a lawyers' congress.

McBride's boat railway at The Dalles is about as wild a scheme as his shipment of reindeer to Alaska, or Mitchell's railroad to Mars.

True in Quarantine.

San Francisco, Jan. 7.—J. J. Kinyoun the Federal quarantine officer at this port, appeared to-day in the United States Circuit Court to answer the charge of having neglected in the exercise of his office as quarantine officer to issue and deliver to the Occidental and Oriental Steamship Company a practice of such kind and nature as would enable the steamship company to deliver to the complainant goods of the value of \$2,000.

The complainant is Wong Chung a large importer and the action of the quarantine officer has resulted almost in the suspension of his business. This is not the only time he has suffered unbecomingly at the hands of Kinyoun and he will have the Circuit Court pass on his latter action.

The suit is for the issuance of a writ of mandamus compelling the quarantine officer to show cause why he should not perform his duty and grant practice and then to compel the steamship company to preserve the shipment until such time as the Court shall pass on the extreme Kinyoun may offer why he will not pass the goods. The steamship company now has the goods but threatens to throw them overboard.

The shipment which is valued at \$2,000, consists of dried meats, fish, vegetables and other stuff sold in provision stores kept by Chinese.

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
