FARMERS' CONGRESS

to corn. Now we have found that we need about one acre of corn per cow; that is, she will consume about that.

Commencing about the roaster ear stage, so filling until the glaze stage for the Silo, until your vetch sowing the spring following, about one acre of corn, and as we have 10 cows, we will need 5 acres more, making 10 in all. Also we will need to sow in the early spring, 5 acres of peas and oats at intervals; say the 5 acres divided into three sowings, two weeks apart.

If you find any of your feed is going to waste at any time on account of too much, cut it into the Silo, and then it is safe. By analysis, we find in the glaze stage corn ear and stock contains its strongest nutritive power, hence at that stage it should be placed into the Silo to secure the best results. For feed we have found in the valley grown, the germ is not as strong as seed from Southern Oregon, or our Northern, Middle-western states. We like the large yellow dent, as we have been more successful with it.

In planting, the ground must be thoroughly plowed, harrowed and pulverized. We usually plant one way, harrowing and smoothing either by roller or clod-masher, until the corn is large enough to plow, plowing shallow and thoroughly.

Now silage of any description, does not make what we call a balanced ration for a dairy cow, it being deficient in protein element.

Corn Silage contains about one per cent of clover and vetch about two per cent of protein element.

You see it is impossible for a cow to consume sufficient silage to get the required amount of protein, one to six or one to five; what I mean is one of protein to five or six of carbohydrates and fat; then you must not expect to get results from silage by piling a great mass of silage before a cow giving milk, if you do you will be deceived.

It takes a great amount of good, hard studying, judgment and experience to obtain good results from what we call feeding for profit.

Mr. Thielson read an excellent paper on "Roads," in which he advocated more uniform work, and especially recommended wide tread wagon. He stated in the discussion that gravel roads properly compacted with a roller would last three times as long. He favored building only good roads, but was opposed to bonding. He thought a road ought to be graded a foot deep with the little apertures thoroughly filled with sand, and packed. This kind of a road on thoroughly drained ground ought to last many years. Mr. Weeks, Judge Davidson, Mr. Grover, W. H. Egan, and others took part in the discussion, all bringing out good points. Mr. Grover, who is one of the heavy taxpayers of Washington County, favors the bonding system. Dr. Willycomb concurred in this. Mr. Egan wisely advocated that a man be employed in each district to go over the roads during the winter and let off the water as well as repairing where needed. Judge Davidson deprecated the bonding system.

Judge T. L. Davidson read a short paper on "Does it pay to raise French Pink and Dog Ears?" He gave a neat historical sketch of the early fowls, native and imported, and showed that farmers were getting poorer from year to year as a result not alone of taxes, but of weeds as well. He gave some advice on killing weeds, and established an axiom that killing the seed is the only way to have clean land. He advocated rotation of crops as the best general method of killing weeds.

Geo. Weeks spoke of the awful loss of Canada thistles on Padua River. Another gentleman said that the first of these thistles were found where some years ago Chinamen had their camps, and thought that possibly these were not the Canada thistle, but some Asiatic importation. One gentleman said the only way to kill the thistle is to dig it up and sift the soil. Mr. J. B. Farly stated that Angora goats will kill off the thistles if fenced up closely where the post grows. He also stated that common weeds were easily killed off by a crop of field peas.

The Evening Session.
Dr. Jas. Whitehouse of Corvallis, was the first speaker, treating the subject of dairying, in which he is much interested, having assisted in establishing several dairies throughout the state during the past year. He anticipates a great future for dairying in this state and even prophesies the time when creamery butter will be shipped from here in carload lots.
