INNOCENT TAMMANY

The Victim of a Blackmail-
ing Combine.

MEN WHO PURCHASE 'SPECIAL PRIVILEGES'

Get Off While the Public is
Horrorified Over Dives and
Gambling Dens.

New York, Jan. 8.—The charges that
members of Tammany hall and New
York City officials have been collecting
"blood money" from gambling houses
and other disreputable places of the city
is officially denied by the Tammany
committee of five.

Lewis Nixon, who is chairman of the
committee has made public a statement
in which he says:

"There is an organization of men
known as the 'Combine,' that is organized
for systematic blackmail, and they
cloak the workings by pretending to be
paying Tammany hall the money they
collect for the protection they are sup-
posed to furnish in its name."

Frank Moss, ex-president of the Board
of Police Commissioners, speaking last
night at the Universal Thought Salon
blamed the men who buy special privi-
leges for municipal misrule in New York.
He said among other things: "This un-
animous pointing to poor Senator Sul-
livan, Martin Engel, Percy Nagle and
Devery is suspicious that all the news-
papers agree in attacking vice."

It is suspicious that Tammany itself
points to the particular vice of gam-
bling and disorderly houses. I am in-
clined to look behind and see what
greater evil is shielded. The men who
might start an organization to overthrow
Tammany are themselves guilty of doing
practically the same thing. The men
who have been building up this system
of corruption know that the men who
were in control in New York life were
buying privileges and were fattening
upon the fruits of special purchase privi-
leges.

Devery is barren enough, but he is a more
creative, a more product. The commis-
sioners are as guilty as Devery, yet
they talk of taking one of them to be the
single head of the department. He is
the very man who broke faith with a
chief with whom he had no faith to find,
to put Mr. Devery where he is at the
believe of politicians and gamblers.
There has been all this discussion about
vice, but he has done nothing. There
has never been a single trial, but he is
not the ultimate criminal. He is the
creature of a system.

"Crokers is certainly an object against
which we have to turn our batteries but
I don't know that he is the worst one.
There are men in New York who are great
financial powers and who have been
furnishing the brains for Tammany hall
for years and profiting by it and they
have been using the rough man who is
the nominal head to control the masses
and they have given him the rough man's
price."

Mr. Moss described the enormous
value of the subway as an illustration
of the special privileges which he said
a certain few men were interested in,
and he said that it was to protect them
in the enjoyment of that monopoly that
they maintained Tammany and through
Tammany prevented a construction of
the pipe galleries which would carry
wires in competition with the subway.

"This is the condition, yet the mis-
erable public is amused over dives and
gambling dens and the holders of special
privileges slyly say we'll see if we can
get the reformers to put in nomination
for mayor some men who want to interfere
with our special privileges."

"One of the biggest builders in New
York said to me: 'I'd love to tell you my
experience it would turn the city
upside down.'"

"Why don't you tell me?" I said. "O,
it would end me," was the reply. "What
white-livered men we are in New York.
I have seen men turned pale when I
suggested that they speak out. Though
vice is bad it is not the worst thing. If
it was not for corruption in business life
there would not be so much in politics.
One can be a railroad wrecker or an ab-
sorber of corporations and be considered
respectable. The strife that is now on
will go on until a force of men who have
patriotism and civic pride will redeem
the city."

FARMERS' CONGRESS

Oregon's Sons of Toil in
Conclave.

ANGORA GOATS, SILOS AND WEEDS CONSIDERED

Able Papers and Intelligent
Discussions are Pre-
sented.

At the second annual meeting of the
Oregon Farmers' Congress yesterday
afternoon about a hundred people were
present, including a few ladies. Presi-
dent Wehring presided.

In the absence of M. L. Jones, who
was to have spoken on "The Farmers'
Congress," a paper was read by H. M.
Williamson on "The Introduction of the
Angora Goat into the United States."

The paper had been carefully prepared,
and provoked some valuable discussion.
The consensus of opinion seemed to be
that the goat is a valuable part of our
live stock. All with the speaker agreed
that as few as possible should be shipped
from our state. It was developed that
the goat is not only profitable for meat
but equally so as a destroyer of
brush, and as a clearer of land.

When Geo. W. Weeks was called for
to read his paper on "The Silo," that
gentleman could not resist the tempta-
tion to say a word for the cow as a
competitor with the goat as a brush
eater and browser. He stated that
thoroughly fed cattle become voracious
browsers.

How to build and How to Fill a Silo.
On this topic Geo. W. Weeks, the well-
known Marion county dairyman said:

"If the writer had no such contrivance
and had his present experience, he
would proceed in the following manner:
He would ascertain the number of stock
to be fed; he would for example, take
ten head of matured cattle, weight about
1000 pounds, and had no pasture to
speak of, would give five acres of land in
a high state of cultivation about Septem-
ber 15th; would plow, harrow and pul-
verize, get the drill and sow two bushels
of vetch mixed with three quarts of rye,
to the acre. During the winter season
he would figure thus—one foot in diam-
eter for each matured head gives us ten
feet in diameter.

Now, as pressure is what we wish,
the higher the silo, the more the weight or
pressure.

Now to balance a ratio, we wish
to feed about 40 pounds of silo for 365 days.
The animal will consume over 7 1/2 tons
of silo. We need about 70 ton silo ca-
pacity, as we are going to fill it twice
during the season, half or over will be
about right. Ten feet in diameter, 30
feet high gives 47 tons capacity, about
right for 10 head of matured animals,
allowed for settling. Seventy staves
2x6, x 30 feet, gives 2100 feet, the amount
of lumber required for your silo. As
your silo is to be air-tight it is necessary
that you see to it that the lumber is free
from knots and pitch seams.

Build your silo inside of barn if possible
if not enclose it after it is built; take
a narrow strip of lumber 10 feet long,
bore a small hole in the center, run an
iron rod through the piece and into
the ground, into the center of your
contemplated silo; dig a
trench about one foot wide, six inches
inside and six inches outside of piece
two feet deep or more if you think rats
will burrow deeper, and fill with small
rock and gravel to the surface; then
build concrete wall about 8 inches from
surface for the staves to rest on. Build
your scaffold, and commence setting up
staves, moving stick in the bottom at
every stave, so as to compete your circle.

Large size staves spread apart and
driven into the staves both top and bot-
tom, and also in center.

Ascertain where you want your doors,
and saw leveling deep enough so as to
admit your saw into when washed, saw-
ing out three staves or more after your
silo is completed. We have three doors
in our 26 foot silo.

For horse you can use either the com-
mon round, 1 use one half inch for the
rod silo or the Page wire fencing. The
rods are used by having rods extended
half way around, with a six inch thread
run through a two by four canting
flatwise, drawing them up until
your staves become tight.

The first year there is not much dan-
ger of drawing your hoops too tight,
on account of your lumber not being
thoroughly seasoned, but the second year
there is danger of drawing your hoops
too tight, and the first hoop almost at
the bottom, the second about two feet
from the first, the third about three
feet from the second, increasing the
space.

If the season has been favorable, you
can commence selling your vetch, or
in other words, cutting and hauling it
to the barn to the stock, about the
first or middle of May or before.
The first of June, according to the season.
Procure an engine and cutter, the
Ohio is my preference as far as my ex-
perience has extended, they having a
blower attached for clearing silage in-
to the silo. Cut your vetch with the
dower, and if too green, let it wilt, rake
it into a row, and get it into the silo
as soon as possible. We had no low
wagons, with common racks. When
you place a bunch or feed full on the
wagon and never disturb it until it is
placed on the cutter table, no loader is
necessary.

The next day plow your vetch ground,
and pulverize it thoroughly, and plant it
continues on third page.
