CUBA IS FOREIGN

Neely Postoffice Frauds to Be Tried There

A HAWAIIAN TARIFF CASE

Also the Porto Rico Controversy Argued Before the Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—The United States Supreme Court today rendered a decision in Neely extradition case. The Court held that Neely was subject to extradition, and must be surrendered to Cuban authorities.

The Court held that Cuba is foreign territory. The decision was based upon act of 1890, which was held to be constitutional.

The supreme court resumed hearing in case of Charles Huus, vs. New York & Porto Rico Steamship Company and Senator Lindsay continued his argument began Friday. He quoted from decisions of the court to establish his contention that the term "foreign port" could be used in its broadest sense and that in early acts the trade between the Atlantic and Pacific coasts was so considered as between foreign ports.

Also that the trade did consider a port foreign unless the clearance of the vessel coming to this country was given by an officer in a customs collection district established by congress and exercising his functions under the law of the United States. San Juan, he argued, was never made a domestic port of the United States and must be considered a foreign port until congress includes it in one of the collection districts of the United States.

When the hearing had been completed in the other cases involving the inclusion of the United States with the insular possession of the case of George W. Crossman et al, appellants vs. the United States was called. This case is one covering the entry of goods from Hawaii, consisting of whiskey, brandy and jam at the custom house at New York April 25, 1900, and is the only Hawaiian case in the list. Duty was assessed under the provisions of the Dingley law.

The importers protested against the collection of duty on the ground that the Hawaiian islands were a part of the United States, that the provision of the annexation resolution which continued the customs law of the republic of Hawaii in force until congress should legislate, was unconstitutional.

Council then cited a treasury decision on April 17, 1900, holding that Porto Rico was not a foreign country within the meaning of the drawback clause of the Dingley law and asked why Hawaii should have been considered a foreign country at that time.

The decision of the supreme court of Hawaii, to the effect that the constitution of the United States had been in force in the islands since August 12, 1893 was cited and the argument closed thus: "May congress in legislating for territory which it has annexed as a part of the territory of the United States, disregard the fundamental limitations upon its power written in the organic law to which congress owes its existence? If it may not, that judgment cannot stand."

MANILA, Jan. 14.—Representatives of the Central Catholics argued the adoption of amendments providing for employment exclusively of the principal native and Catholic teachers and for permitting religious teaching in the schools.

To Receive Further Honors in London

ENGLISH FEELING TOWARD DEWET

British Naval Progress Nothing to Boast of the Past Year

LONDON, Jan. 14.—Lord Roberts has written a letter to the Lord Mayor of London postponing the city's reception and expressing the opinion that in the present unhappy circumstances in South Africa there should be no further feting for some time. His lordship's decision applies to all similar proposed functions.

BATHURST, West Africa, Jan. 14.—A British punitive expedition arrived at Bumbutan on the 11th and completely routed the rebels. Sixty were killed, sixty wounded and two hundred captured. British casualties, six West Indians wounded.

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London says: For many months past the average Englishman has had a warm corner in his heart for DeWet. The pluck and intrepidity of the dashing free stater and the wonderful manner which he is carrying on a losing fight against our overwhelming odds appeals to the finer instincts of the people of this country who are sportsmen in the best sense of the term.

As a matter of fact, very little interest is taken in any engagement in which DeWet is not directly or indirectly engaged, and not even a budget of alarming messages from Cape Town about the invasion of the colony cause anything like the excitement which attends the news of a raid on the British lines, whether successful or otherwise by the commandant of the Boer forces in the Orange river colony. It is by no means improbable, however, that a revulsion of feeling will be induced in England at all events, toward the redoubtable enemy of the British Empire by Gen. Kitchener's latest dispatch.

Flogging as a mode of punishment is distinctly odd to the code of civilized warfare, and the British commander's announcement, that by DeWet's orders three agents of the peace committee have been flogged in a Boer laager near Lindley, is sure to call forth some hostile comment, which will not be any less bitter because one of the victims of this instance of petty tyranny, who was, indeed shot after being flogged, was a subject of Queen Victoria.

The announcement which is made by the Post that the scheme for raising colonial police forces has been abandoned for the present can not, in the light of recent events, cause much surprise. The rate of pay were not considered tempting enough by the people in South Africa and of 10,000 men who applied in the United Kingdom to join the force only five hundred or so were selected as suitable.

It will be remembered that it was announced from Pretoria early in October that 12,000 police were to be enrolled in the Transvaal and Orange Free State, under the command of General Baden-Powell. A few days later the colonial office issued an announcement to the effect that recruiting was taking place in South Africa only, but in November the government asked for recruits from the mother country, and in December they decided to incur as this number to 5,000. It has now apparently been agreed to drop the whole scheme altogether and

In order to meet the requirements of Gen. Kitchener further enlistment of yeomanry will be called for.

M'BRIDE MEN GET SENATE

The Corbett Forces Secure a Caucus Man for Speaker

The Corbett forces made an unsuccessful onslaught Sunday night to defeat Fulton for President of the senate. The McBride people simultaneously rallied to defeat Reeder for speaker and fell down. He is a caucus man and went in with the full Corbett strength at his back. Three Citizen's members entered the Republican senate caucus and thus paved the way for going into the joint senatorial caucus Mays, Hunt and Smith. Fulton had 13 of the 23 participants and Senator Howe graciously made it unanimous, though not all of Fulton's 13 will stand for McBride.

Senator McBride came to Salem Sunday and acted very much pleased at the result on preliminary organization today. Ex-Senator Corbett is expected at Salem Tuesday. He declined to arrive on the same earlier as he did not wish to influence in any manner the organization of either house.

The McBride Daily have secured the publication of the Daily Sentinel by C. B. Irvine and edited by E. H. Flagg of this city, the first number appearing this evening. It will be conducted solely in the interest of Senator McBride's re-election.

ANARCHIST MATTER

Seized by the Government at Paterson

PLOT TO KILL KING HUMBERT

Being Investigated by the Customs Department in New York

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The anarchists of Paterson, New Jersey, and elsewhere are much incensed over the seizure by the government of four packages of registered matter to La Question Sociale, an organ of the anarchists, published in that city. The packages, it is asserted, contained pamphlets and other pointed matter, which, while they preached the doctrine of anarchy, are declared to be perfectly proper, as well as legal.

When Commissioner Trimble was investigating the charge that the plot to kill King Humbert was hatched in Paterson, he questioned editor Esteve, of La Question Sociale and other avowed anarchists. They admitted that they preached the doctrine of anarchy, but denied that they were connected with Bresci or any one else. The commissioner made his report and left the city.

Since then, it is alleged by the anarchists, secret agents have visited them several times and watched the delivery of literature with suspicion.

Editor Esteve made his complaint at the last meeting of the Group of Right to Existence. He said that he could not account for the actions of the postal authorities. When the packages came to him they were preceded by the regular notice that a registered package could be found at the postoffice. He called. On each package was stamped the word "suspected."

"I requested that the packages be opened," he said, "this was done and several pamphlets and books were disclosed. They were innocent enough, lectures by Kropotkin and Malatesta, 'Patriotism and government' by Tolstoi and works of a like character. 'On the ground the packages were supposed to be liable for duty were held and the custom house authorities were notified. This is the last that I have heard from properly. It is withheld from me by no right of law or reason."

Postmaster Pollett said last evening the matter was in the hands of the customs department at Newark. When the packages were called for the post-offices connection ceased. The matter now lies with the customs authorities.
