### PROCEEDINGS OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY

#### Routine Acts of Both Houses Now in Session.

##### Senate—Monday Afternoon.

Message from Governor was read relative to the Portage Railway at The Dalles recommending improvements and sale of a tract of four acres.

Messages from House announced the appointment of the following members to represent that body at the joint investigating committee:

Books of the State Treasurer—Carter, Wick, Thompson, of Multnomah County.

Secretary of State's Office—Carter, Vincent, McKee, McCallister and Schuman.

Hills were introduced as follows:

S. B. No. 55 by Brownell, of Clackamas—To provide for a convention to prepare a new constitution for the State of Oregon, providing for the election of delegates thereto and appropriate prize \$20,000 to pay the necessary expenses thereof.

Kelly—To amend section 2770 Code, relating to boundaries.

May—To add the State Historical Society with an appropriation of \$5,000.

Joseph—Amending land laws.

A message from the House called the recall of S. B. No. 19, relating to the Indian War Veterans. The clerk was instructed to deliver the bill.

S. C. H. No. 8, by Brownell—Providing for the observance on February 4th, of the 100th anniversary of John Marshall, by appropriate exercises in the House of Representatives in Salem in connection a message was read from the Governor recommending the observance of this anniversary. The resolution was adopted.

Smith of Baker—Amending sections 2005 and 2009 relating to the meetings of the board of regents of the State University.

Looney—Providing for the election of an Oregon Dairy and Food Commissioner, fixing his salary and providing for the election of a Deputy.

Itman—Amending section relating to members of the circuit court of Multnomah County.

Hays—relating to primary elections.

Daly—providing for selection and sale of swamp lands.

Brownell—relating to a part of Columbia River for protection of salmon.

Shelley—amending section relating to venison of beaver.

Brownell—prohibiting the catching of salmon in point nets.

Week—amending section 7730 of Hill's Code.

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Smith of Marion—to amend common school law.

McCracken—to provide horse shoers to be licensed.

The bill for chartering the city of Astoria was, under suspension of the rules, read second and third time, and was left as first thing to be considered Tuesday.

Adjourned.

Journal "X-RAYS"

Astoria News: A few days ago Hon. John Hahn made the statement to a reporter of The Daily News that he would not vote for the election to the United States Senate of any man who would attempt to use money to further his candidacy.

Mr. Hahn will now have an opportunity of showing his sincerity. If he desires he can readily be furnished with evidence that two members of the legislature have been offered \$2500 each for their assistance in sending the old man to the Senate.

The best of it is that the offer was made to each in the presence of the other, and there will be no chance to refute the testimony if it is presented.

Judge J. C. Fullerton, besides receiving Oregon's highest electoral vote also received Hon. T. L. Ford's vote, and though justly entitled to carry the office of the state to Washington, will give the vote of the state to Washington.

The other two electors, Paxton and Furnish, who received the smallest vote, insist on going to all hazards, and the former named a gentleman graciously consented to their going. There is nothing small and narrow in the makeup of Messrs. Fullerton and Ford—Robbing Plunderers.

Give the devil his due. Ford didn't wish to go under the circumstances as he had other fish to fry. Fullerton doesn't care to go as one of three, as two's company and three's a crowd.

Speaker Reed has fairly recognized the opposition on committees. Hahn, Clifton gets Statistics and Immigration, Heintzinger, Citizens, gets Medicine and Pharmacy, Vincent, a Unionist, gets Alcoholic traffic; Thompson, Clifton, gets Cities and Towns; Bud Meallister gets on Ways and Means; Whitney is on Judiciary; Railways and Transportation.

Mr. Fulton's high-toned Astoria champion, the Daily News, prints this: "There is only one possible situation which could result in the election of any one else. If Corbett succeeds in buying the necessary number of votes, he will be elected, but, if his candidacy fails, as now seems certain, Oregon will be represented in the United States Senate by C. W. Fulton or John H. Mitchell, with the chances decidedly in favor of Mr. Fulton."

The legislative committee clerk scandal is not compassed by the general law enacted at the last session of the legislature. The members of the legislature now get around the law by referring business not to standing committees, but to special, "with power to employ such clerical aid as may be necessary." The number of these "jointers" seems to be unlimited.

D. M. C. Gault over his signature says: Mr. Holter, of the CAPITAL JOURNAL charges that the Independent is Congressman Tongue's personal organ. This I want to deny in the most emphatic manner.

## SECRETARY DUNBAR'S BIENNIAL REPORT

### Improvements in the Methods of Keeping State Accounts—Valuable Suggestions on Increasing State Revenues.

The biennial report of Secretary of State Dunbar was given to the public Monday. It contains a list of all the federal, state and county officers of Oregon, a complete financial statement of the condition of each separate fund, a review of the state's public debt, and an estimate of state expenses for the next two years, as well as showing the estimates for two preceding biennial terms.

Mr. Dunbar also shows the creation and disposition of the public revenue and total valuations and taxes raised for thirteen years. The figures show that the total revenues for the two years following the legislature of 1895 was \$76,838 less than for the one year 1892, when the state revenues reached \$1,121,845.

The vital part of Mr. Dunbar's excellent report is summed up in his discussion of the sources from which the public revenues are derived in Oregon. On this important subject we shall copy Mr. Dunbar's words and commend his full report to the careful examination of the legislature:

"I shall not attempt to present here any suggestions concerning our present system of assessment and taxation, bringing this subject to your attention hereafter in this report, but will offer some suggestions relative to raising the necessary revenue for state purposes other than by a direct property tax, although there is perhaps no problem as difficult of satisfactory solution as to the best method of raising the public revenues."

"In some states there is no general property tax whatever, the revenues being raised entirely by specific or indirect taxation; but in this state, real and personal property bear largely the burden of all local taxation, and the aim should be to provide revenue for the use of the state from other sources so far as practicable."

"It is a self-evident fact that this state must increase its revenues from year to year, even under the most economical administration of affairs. The rapid growth of population, as well as its commercial and industrial development, make necessary the enlargement of its list of state officers, as well as its educational, charitable, and penal institutions, and all of these must be maintained."

"Now and increasing demands for many purposes that doubtless inure to the benefit of the state, but which are not strictly current expenses, are made at each biennial session of the legislature, and we are now informed almost daily through the press that appropriations will be asked for the improvement of the public service and the development of the resources of the state, aggregating large sums. It seems, therefore, that the most important subject, and the one most worthy of your careful consideration, is the question of the revenue of the state; and before any appropriation is made, the sources from which it is to be met should be carefully considered, as well as its composition."

"In attempting to suggest ways and means for increasing our revenue, other than by direct taxation, it is but natural to refer to the systems of raising revenue in other states. An examination of the statistics and reports of the different states shows that in nearly all of them, and chiefly in the larger ones, much of the revenue is raised by licenses, fees and taxes imposed upon corporations, corporations franchises and inheritances."

"The second installment of mail boxes for the rural delivery was received yesterday at the postoffice, numbering twenty-seven dozen in all. There with the ones previously received will nearly complete the list on several routes and the remainder are expected soon, so it will be possible for the delivery to begin on Feb. 1st. About fifteen hundred boxes have been ordered."
