EX-SENATOR CORBETT--

NEW POSSESSIONS

Believes the Constitution Ex-tends Sovereignty

Stands for Justice and Human-ity in Our Dealings with the Island Populations

It is strange that those papers and those people who stand by the administration, right or wrong, are so fearful that the United States Supreme Court will de-clare that the Constitution applies ex proprio vigore, to our new possessions, the Philippines and Porto Rico, and that those people should be granted the right of citizenship and the privileges and immunities arising under the Con-stitution. Why this fear. They may be citizens and enjoy the privileges of the Constitution and still not be admit-ted as states, so that their influence would be felt in the councils of the na-tion, until such time when they shall have become used to the working of a Republican form of government and fit-ted for full membership in the nation. It may be many years before that time arrives, meanwhile give them the larg-est measure of home rule consistent with their own welfare; make them feel and know that the United States desires to treat them as men and that their full measure of home rule de-pends upon their good conduct. There is a powerful influence, now working to fit them for citizenship, stronger than the cannon or sword, the public school system. Thousands of the Filipino youth are now enrolled in the public school, and are learning to be good citi-zens and to love the stars and stripes. When they grow up our language will be their language, our flag their flag, and we may confidently hope they will make good citizens. The danger that any num-ber of Filipinos would come to this country, if declared citizens is too re-mote to be feared. It is certainly more in consonance with the ideas of our government to proceed upon the theory that we are fitting all the people of ter-ritory belonging to the United States for citizenship rather than for a condition of vassalage. Senator Corbett would said in writing of this subject: "These people are sufficiently intelligent to know and judge whether they are treated with the same even-handed jus-tice as all other portions of the country, and the sooner they know this the sooner they will lay down their arms. When they are allowed a representative in congress, to plead their case, even without a vote, as other territories are allowed, they will enlighten their com-munity of the justice and equity with which their representative and their in-terests are treated at the National cap-ital. In the practical solution of this question, it must be done in a states-manlike, just and equitable manner, making the load equally light for all to bear."

PRESIDENT FULTON IN HIS OWN DEFENCE

People Living Away From Sa-lem May Accept His Statement.

State Senator C. W. Fulton, president of the Oregon upper house, speaking concerning the charges that he was un-fair in committee appointments, says: "Yes, I know some persons are trying to make it appear that I have been un-fair in my committee appointments. I fully understand the source and purpose of the charge, but the public is not inter-ested in that. It is charged that never before was a ways and means committee appointed without the opposite political party being represented thereon. Yet, at the session of 1898 and the session of 1899, every member of the senate com-mittee on ways and means was a republi-can. It is complained that in commit-tee assignment I have treated Senator Howe, my opponent, ungenerously. Senator Howe makes no such charge. On the contrary, he has stated to me that he is well pleased with his commit-tee assignments. And surely he will be, for he has been most liberally treated. He is chairman of two of the most important committees of the sen-ate, namely, the committee on counties and the committee on revision of laws, while he is a member of three other committees, namely, commerce and nav-igation, claims, and game. Only three members of the senate are on five com-mittees, and he is one of the three. Every committee of which he is a mem-ber is an important committee. The revision of laws committee is an excep-tionally important one, ranking next to the judiciary and ways and means com-mittees. The committee on counties and the committee on commerce and navigation are both exceptionally im-portant committees. As I have said, Senator Howe knows he has been treated well, and makes no complaint. I only make this statement in order that his friends may know the truth. Senator Howe is a warm personal friend of mine and a gentleman for whom I entertain the most high regard.

"As further evidence of the untruth of the charge that only senators who supported me were appointed to leading committees, I might instance the assign-ments of several who opposed me, but I do not think I would be justified in men-tioning individuals further, excepting that it is well known that Senator W. Tyler Smith, Senator Howe's colleague, earnestly supported my opponent, and very properly, as they are both from the same county. Yet if you will look over the committee assignments, you will see that Senator Smith is chairman of the committee on roads and highways, one of the leading committees, and is a mem-ber of three other committees, while some of my most active supporters are on but three committees.

"It has been published, and, there-fore, I may mention the fact that Sen-ator Steiwer supported Senator Howe, yet he is chairman of the committee on public roads, and is a member of the committee on assessment and taxation, enrolled bills and revision of law.

"The best position cannot, of course, be given to all, but as presiding officer I can and will treat all with equal courtesy and consideration, and with perfect fairness."

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SALEM LUTHERAN CHURCH DEDICATED

The new German Lutheran Evangel-ical Church, was dedicated last Sunday to the cause of Christ and Christian religion in the most impressive liturgical rites of that denomination.

The morning services began at 10:50 o'clock a. m., and were well attended. Rev. A. Krause, of Portland, delivered a sermon in German. At 2 o'clock p. m., Rev. E. Mack, of Oregon City, de-livered a sermon in English. Rev. A. Eberle, the local pastor, officiated be-fore the altar during both services.

Last Spring Rev. A. Eberle accepted the call to become their pastor, and work was at once begun to erect a place of worship, which was completed in Aug-ust. This church was burned to the ground shortly after its completion.
