GOULD ARMED FAMILY REBELS

Enjoined From Distributing the Income Defeat Government Troops in Venezuela

OF THE COUNTESS DE CASTELLANE PROMINENT PERSONS ORDERED SHOT

Movement to Erect a Monument to the Late Queen of England. A Battle in Which Several Hundred Persons Are Reported Killed

New York, Jan. 28.—Justice Beach today handed down a decision continuing the temporary injunction restraining Geo. J. Edwin, Howard and Helen Gould, as trustees of their father, from their father, from paying over the income to their sister, the Countess De Castellane, pending trial of the action brought by a London dealer against the Count and Countess De Castellane for paintings and bric-a-brac furnished them.

New York, Jan. 28.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London says: A movement, which is, however, without official encouragement, is on foot to erect a great monument to Queen Victoria in London. Already a sign comes from India that such a proposal would be likely to meet the spontaneous wishes of the subjects of the crown in far away climes.

The suggestion that May 24, the Queen's birthday shall be kept forever as a public holiday also finds favor. This is all the more desirable, as King Edward's birthday falls on Nov. 9, a period of the year wholly inopportune to the enjoyment of brilliant pageantry, such as that of trooping of the colors, which is undoubtedly the prettiest display of the season.

FILIPINO MILITIA WILL BE ORGANIZED.

New York, Jan. 28.—After the passage of the army reorganization bill, Secretary Root will call permission to Major-General MacArthur to organization of Filipino infantry and cavalry, says the Washington correspondents of the Herald.

This action will be taken upon the recommendation of the Taft commission. The commission says that while the American soldiers are unsurpassed in war they don't make the best policemen in the Philippines. Native troops in the main, the commission believes should be officered by Americans.

NORTHERN PACIFIC TO SHORTEN ROUTE

TACOMA, Jan. 28.—To save four hours time between St. Paul and Tacoma, the Northern Pacific railroad will this year expend \$2,000,000 on the construction of the Lind-Elliensburg cut-off in this state. It will be nearly 100 miles long and will shorten the main line about 60 miles, avoiding the present long southward detour between Spokane and Ellensburg.

NEW BOUNTY BILL WILL BE OPPOSED

Legislators Are Not All of One Opinion

Butt Would Make The Counties Liable For Full Payment Instead of One-third

Considerable opposition is developing to the proposed new law relating to the payment of scalp bounties and there will be a spirited fight on in the House when it comes up for passage. The latter will be fathered by Representative Roberts, of Wasco, and in place of a special tax the bounties will be paid out of general funds, two-thirds from the state treasury and the remaining one-third from county funds. The provision Mr. Roberts explains will increase the vigilance of the county officials in preventing scalps being brought into the state and bounties collected.

Mr. Roberts disapproves the idea that any serious opposition will develop. Referring to the measure he said to a Journal reporter: "There is every reason why the bill should pass. It is equitable and necessary. The provision for partial payment by the counties will prevent scalps being smuggled into the state and will save time in settlement."

DETAILS OF SALEM'S NEW POSTOFFICE

Plans Providing Frontage on Court St. to be Changed.

A. Campbell, of the Campbell Building company, of Chicago, was Saturday in Portland for the purpose of selecting the quality of stone to be used in building the new Postoffice at Salem. When seen at the Perkins Mr. Campbell said he had three coast quarries to choose from—Ashland and Yaquina Bay in this state, and Tule, in Washington. "All three furnish fine sandstone," Mr. Campbell said. "The Supervising architect at Washington will decide between the three on samples I will send this week. The color of each is a light grey, and there appears to be so little difference between them that it would take an expert to decide which is which."

Salem's new post-office will occupy the block bounded by State, Church, Court and Cottage streets, and its front elevation on the architect's plans shows a very neat two story basement building, with an inclined roof of tin. The site, Mr. Campbell said, cost \$6000, and the government has appropriated \$100,000 for the building. The block upon which it is to be built is opposite the court-house. The basement will be of brick and the first floor fireproof, with in brick floors and marble staircase. The second floor is to be finished in white oak. Vermont marble will be used in the building, except in a few rooms, which will be finished in Tennessee marble.

VENEZUELA'S CLAIM IS CONTESTED

New York, Jan. 28.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: It is learned now that the claim of Venezuela to Pato Island, from which the Venezuelan gunboat Angosto took several British subjects, is contested by Great Britain and that the question of the nation to which that island belongs has never been settled. Great Britain, if she insists on her sovereignty over the island can declare the act of the gunboat an act of war and demand instant reparation. American interests, it is officially said, are well protected. The Lancaster being at La Guayra and the Scorpion at Port of Spain, which is at the mouth of the Orinoco.
