BURNING VESSEL

Was Sighted By a British Steamer.

MEN LEAPING FROM THE RIGGING

Save Themselves From One Element By Sinking Into the Waves.

New York, Jan. 29.—A special to the Tribune from Mobile, Ala., says: The British steamer Governor Blake, which has arrived here from Grand Cayman, brought news of the destruction of a bark by sea. Presumably the entire crew perished on the vessel, which is supposed to have been the Mary from New York.

Seamen could be seen clinging to the rigging, but the vessel was enveloped in flames and rescue was impossible.

Captain James Hunter, of the Governor Blake, says he sighted the burning vessel one hundred miles from Mobile bay. It was just at dark and for the high sea prevailing at the time that the Blake crew would have gone to the rescue.

"When we sighted the bark," said Captain Hunter, "she seemed to be a mass of flames. We were riding head-on before the storm and were in imminent danger ourselves. We made several attempts to go to the rescue, but the wind was so high and the sea so heavy that we were compelled to abandon all efforts to rescue and give our attention to saving ourselves.

"We saw members of the crew of the unfortunate bark up in the rigging making signals to us and while we were in sight two men jumped from the yard arms into the sea. We judged that nothing could save the vessel as she seemed to be afire all over."

ERA OF PEACE

Inaugurated By New British King.

WALES JOLLIES GERMAN EMPEROR

Is Popular in France and Very Sweet on Uncle-Sam.

New York, Jan. 29.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London says: The presentation of the Blue Ribbon of the Garter by King Edward to the Crown Prince of Germany was a fresh proof of the cordiality of the relations between the two royal families.

King Edward has opened his reign by emphasizing in the strongest way his personal friendship for the German emperor and this was perhaps necessary, because there was a different feeling not long ago, when William II was not personally in royal circles here.

The Queen's death has indeed brought England and Germany into the closest possible relations.

The German Emperor's conduct during the South African war opened the way for a better understanding but the popular apprehension of his devotion to the Queen was needed in order to justify what is now in the air—a virtual alliance between Germany and England, not only in China but also in Europe.

Germany is England's most formidable industrial and commercial rival in Europe, but while protecting her own protective interests she is now secured against hostile demonstration against her manufacturers in this market and "made in Germany" will no longer be a derisive outcry.

The King has always been popular in France, and the new reign opens with a better feeling between the neighbors across the channel than has existed for

many years. It may be transitory, but the King's name is one to conjure with France.

Anglo-American relations have been sweetened by the unique tributes of the President and the State Legislatures to the Queen's character and virtues.

Lord Lansdowne is reported to have consulted the King at Osborne respecting the canal treaty, but there is no definite evidence of it.

No English voice is raised against the acceptance of the amendments. The settlement of the canal controversy will be generally welcomed here. The time is not auspicious for international resentments and points of diplomatic dignity.

of the old and new friends of the firm. The stock had been moved into the new quarters by a force working day and night and all was in perfect order when the doors were thrown open to the public at 2:30 p. m. The sight seen from the street enjoyed the program of 140 feet of display windows, that were unveiled as the result of several days patient labor on the part of skilled window dressers, quite a stock of goods being required to fill these spaces given up solely to showing samples in each department and the new lines that have been added on going into the enlarged quarters.

The crowds inside soon realized that here were more expanses of merchandise than could be seen in a few minutes. The basement floor and two stories above give 18,000 feet of floor space, all well lighted, heated and ventilated. At five p. m. there was plenty of light in the basement, where the goods are received from the outside, marked and sorted up for stocking the various departments. The first floor is devoted to dry goods, clothing and women's wear entirely, including those for men and women. The ceilings are 16 feet, the floors are fitted with oak counters, shelves, and display cases for hundreds of feet known as silent salesman.

In the center is the cashier's office, reached by cash carriers from every direction. The high windows all around marked one of the best lighted stores on the Pacific coast.

The second floor contains the ready to wear goods for ladies, trunks and valises, blankets and comforts, lace curtains and draperies. A millinery department with a competent modiste in charge is soon to be added. On the floor is a cozy corner, lavatory and retiring room for ladies where they can refresh themselves, write a letter or meet a friend. On this floor also is the business office, connecting by steps with the cashier below, safe, speaking tubes, call bells and telephone.

The three floors of the new store are connected with an electric elevator of the most modern design, in charge of Capt. McCoy.

A sketch of this opening would not be complete without proper recognition of the local founder of this firm. Joseph Meyers started in business 32 years ago at Glenville, Kern county, Cal., with a \$1200 stock bought on credit with two notes, which he paid off and increased his stock to \$15000 in 11 years, coming to Salem with his family 21 years ago this month. He then became the senior member of the Old White Corner firm of J. M. Rosenberg & Co., and in 1889 took charge as sole proprietor. In 1894 he made his oldest son, Henry W. Meyers, his partner, and in 1897 Milton L. Meyers was taken into the firm, and thus it stands today. Mr. Meyers gave his son as good an education as the public schools, business college, Bishop Scott Academy and Williams university could afford, and has never regretted his investment in these lines. Adherence to three principles Mr. Meyers believes has led to his success in business—right treatment of his customers, right goods and right prices.

A Pioneer Salem Firm Moves Into Larger Quarters

History of the House and Personnel of its Force of Employes

This afternoon and evening have been a gala-day at the corner of Court and Liberty streets, the event being the opening of Joseph Meyers & sons new Salem store, which has been fitted up for the convenience of their growing trade, almost regardless of expense by the owner, E. P. McCormack, who has spent about \$20,000 rebuilding the old opera house block to meet the requirements of a more modern dry goods house. The firm concluded some time since that they had outgrown their old White Corner quarters, and with some determination and a spirit of venture moved a block west of the beaten path of trade. Court street is now to become the new retail quarter, and with the new opera house, the postoffice and court house as drawing features may revolutionize business property and values not a little.

The attraction of the new store, an orchestra this afternoon and evening, and giving away 2000 lar, a platinum-45 souvenirs, has drawn a crowded house

PROCEEDINGS OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Routine Acts of Both Houses Now in Session.

Representative Hume and Rice Have a Sparring Match Over Fish.

House, Monday afternoon.—The session was devoted to the second reading of bills and their references to committees.

Senate, Monday afternoon.—The following bills were passed after third reading:

S. B. 5, Wehring—Empowering State Board of Agriculture to issue licenses.

S. B. 15, Brownell—Relating to exemption of earnings of judgment debtors from attachment.

S. B. 49, Steiwer—Regulating carrying sheep by express, to prevent transmission of contagious diseases.

S. B. 58, Brownell—providing for state constitutional convention. Failed to pass, vote reconsidered and bill referred to committee.

Multnomah delegation's plans to have bill authorizing special tax levy in Portland, advanced under suspended rules and passed defeated by objection of Hunt, and bill will be come up in regular order.

Bill creating fund to pay bounty warrants referred to Williamson, Steiwer and Johnston, committee.

Representatives Rice and Douglas and Hume of Curry clarified for a moment in the house Tuesday and there was a brief exchange of courtesies that was decidedly lively. The provocation was a bill by Mr. Rice, placed on second reading, amending the present laws, relating to the tide lands in Curry county. The author moved that it be referred to the judiciary committee. Mr. Hume amended by substituting the Fisheries committee of which he is a member.

Mr. Rice defended his motion for reference with the statement that Mr. Hume owned every foot of tide land in Curry county and legally had a monopoly of the fishing industry there, a condition which the bill sought to relieve. Whereupon Mr. Hume arose, with fire in his eye and vigorous anger in his gestures. His Scotch blood was up.

"It is true," he said, "that I own the tide lands in Curry. But I have acquired them legitimately by purchase. The proposed bill relates to Curry and I represent
