TODAY'S NEWS SUMMARIZED.

Oklahoma demands immediate admission as a state. Boers attack Boksburg mines, damage million and a half. Mrs. Nation continues Crusade against saloons at Topeka. Tin can manufacturers form trust capitalized at fifty millions. Business in Great Britain will be suspended Saturday for Queen's burial. New York W. C. T. ALLCITIES IN PHILIPPINES

Are to Have Civil Government.

MILITARY TREASURER OF THE CUBANS

Is to Be Succeeded by a Home Secretary of Finance.

MANILA, Jan. 31.—The act organizing municipal governments in the Philippines was passed by the United States Commission today, after adoption of amendments including provisions disqualifying from voting and holding office any person who after April 1st, in arms against, or aiding those opposing United States authority. Power to revise election irregularities is transferred from the Governor of the province to the election judges. The President's symbol of office is designated as a gold headed tassel cane. The Provincial government bill has been completed. Public consideration will begin tomorrow. Soon after this enactment the United States commissioners will visit Luzon Provinces and witness organization of provincial government elections. Later they will visit the Southern Islands.

New York, Jan. 31.—A special to the World from Washington says: Captain E. E. Ladd will be relieved from duty as treasurer of Cuba within a few days when the secretary of finance for Cuba will become custodian of the funds of the island.

"This is in pursuance of the policy recently begun to gradually transfer the government of Cuba from military to civil hands. It is said authoritatively that the proposed change is not due to dissatisfaction with Capt. Ladd. On the contrary, his work is highly commended.

Deputy Sheriff John Estes went to Jefferson today on official business. Amos Strong left this morning for Douglas county, where he has mining interests.

DESTROY MINES

Boers Doing Immense Damage in Africa.

PEACE ENVOYS REPORTED SHOT

The Permanent Court of Arbitration Now Nearly Complete.

Cape Town Jan. 31.—The boer attack on the Boksburg mines resulted in damage amounting to £300,000. The commissioners at Kroonstadt report that Andries Wessels, one of the peace envoys, was shot at Klipfote on January 28th, by order of General De Wet. Morgon Deal, another of the Boer peace envoys, and who accompanied Wessels was shot near Lindley Jan. 10th.

New York, Jan. 31.—A special to the Tribune from Washington says: The permanent court of arbitration provided for by the convention signed at the Hague on July 29, 1899, is now ready to consider any international dispute that may be presented.

Easily the highest tribunal in the world, with the most numerous and eminent bench of any court ever projected, this single fruition of the Czar's peace conference has just been completely organized for business and the state department has officially issued the roster of its membership, including its secretaries.

Fifteen nations, embracing all the maritime powers, have appointed their members, and only a few countries comparatively insignificant as international factors are unrepresented. These are Bulgaria, Montenegro, Persia, Siam and Switzerland.

ROYALTY ARRIVES

Squadrons of Warships are Assembling.

QUEEN'S REMAINS IN THE COFFIN

British Minister to Germany Called Home on Political Mission.

COWES, Jan. 31.—Prince Henry of Prussia and staff landed here today. A squadron of German warships commanded by Prince Henry reached Spithead this morning and took up positions opposite Plymouth. The foreign warships and the British fleet are rapidly assuming the appearance of completeness. It is expected all of them will be assembled this evening at their allotted moorings. The Isle of Wight is fast filling with visitors. The coffin of Queen Victoria was finally soldered this morning and enclosed in an outer casket.

LONDON, Jan. 31.—A special train this morning brought to the Charing Cross station a number of members of royal families upon the continent here for the purpose of attending the funeral of Queen Victoria. Among those who arrived were the Crown Prince of Sweden, Prince John George of Saxony, the Prince of Saxe-Altenburg, Prince Waldemar of Prussia and Princess of Schumburg-Lippe, and their respective suites. They were conducted in royal carriages to Buckingham Palace and the various hotels.

The members of the German embassy met the Princes from Germany, but none of the members of the British Royal family was present at the station. His Majesty, King Edward VII. was represented at the station, however, by Col. Campbell, one of his grooms in waiting.

LONDON, Jan. 31.—Lady Rachel Charlotte Fitzgerald, eldest daughter of the Earl of Bunsby, died this morning.

BERLIN, Jan. 31.—The British ambassador, Sir Frauk C. Lascelles, has suddenly gone to England. It is believed here that the Ambassador's departure has a political significance.

REBELS DEFEATED

Leading Venezuelan Revolutionists Captured

RIVAL ASPHALT COMPANY WARS

Are to Be Fought Out in the Courts Before There is a War.

WILLIAMSTADT, Island of Curacao, Jan. 31.—Advices from Venezuela confirm reports of severe fighting, probably last Tuesday, at Auga Fria, in which revolutionists were completely defeated. It is asserted the leaders of the revolution were subsequently made prisoners.

New York, Jan. 31.—A special to the Times from Washington says: The State Department is inclined to discredit the report from Port of Spain to the effect that 25 Americans, deserted by their negro employes, are holding out against a band of attacking revolutionists. It is pointed out that if it were true, Minister Loomis would certainly have notified the department.

It is stated in the dispatch that Mr. Loomis was aware of the report, and while inclined to consider it exaggerated, had promised to inform the department. This would be his duty, but he has not done it, and the department is, therefore, skeptical of the report.

The story which was sent in some time ago, and on the strength of which the navy department sent the Scorpion to the scene of alleged hostilities, did not come from Minister Loomis. Since then the department has hesitated to credit reports that do not come from Minister Loomis.

Minister Loomis has acquainted the state department with the fact that the Venezuelan government is willing and anxious to have the merits of the rival asphalt concessions left to the determination of the Venezuelan courts. The department has decided that this is the proper course to pursue, and has so informed the minister.

It is true that there has been no lack of insinuations touching the integrity of the Venezuelan judicial tribunals, but the State Department does not feel itself obliged to do more than following the well established practice in such cases and refraining from intervention until it shall become absolutely evident that there has been a denial of justice. Therefore the asphalt companies must make their fight before the Venezuelan courts, to be, in with, it least.

TIN CAN TRUST

Formed With Capital of \$50,000,000.

DETROIT STREET RAILWAY SYSTEM

Has Been Acquired By Syndicate of New York Capitalists.

New York, Jan. 31.—The Journal of Commerce says: It is learned on excellent authority that the negotiations for a consolidation of the leading tin can manufacturing interests of the country which have been in progress for many months have reached a point where their successful completion is practically certain at a very early date. Options on the various properties run until April 1, but from present indications the deal may be closed up several weeks before that date.

The capitalization of the new company apparently is as much of a secret as ever. This question rests almost entirely in the hands of Judge W. H. Moore, the promoter. However, there seems to be an expectation in some quarters that it will be about \$50,000,000. The Company will naturally be closely allied with the American Tinplate Company and through it with the so called "Moore steel companies. The new consolidation, it is understood will take in nearly every can manufacturer of importance in the country. Companies in Chicago, this city, Hoopston, Ind., Baltimore, Toledo, Detroit, Indianapolis and the Pacific Coast are understood to have given options.

New York, Jan. 31.—The Tribune says: Henry A. Everett, of Cleveland, Ohio, a prominent lawyer at the Hotel Netherland, is at the head of a syndicate which has purchased the street railway system of Detroit, of which R. T. Wilson, of this city, was the principal owner. The formal transfer of the property is understood to have been made yesterday (Wednesday) at the office of Davies, Stone & Auerbach. Mr. Auerbach, of that firm, acted as counsel in the transaction.

Mr. Everett said that company organized to purchase the Detroit Street Railway system is capitalized at \$25,000,000, of which \$12,500,000 is in stock and \$11,000,000 is in bonds. The stock is now selling at 85. Yesterday it declared its first quarterly premium of 1 percent. The company has \$40,000 in its treasury. Mr. Everett is president of the North Ohio traction Company. He came to this city in company with J. R. Nutt to meet financiers of New York and Philadelphia and close up the deal for the control of the Detroit system.

BIG SALE OF THE DAILY THOROUGHBREDS

New York, Jan. 31.—The great Daily estate sale of thoroughbreds has drawn to Madison Square Garden to-day a great throng of horsemen. These thoroughbreds are from the late Marcus Daly's Bitter Root Stock Farm, at Hamilton, Mont., and are sold under the hammer by the Fasig Tipton Horse Auction Company. This is the largest sale held in the Garden since August Belmont's immense breeding was sold ten years ago. The sale will occupy three days. A number of foreign buyers are here, being especially interested in the great Hanover horse, Hamburg. Even in Australia interest in the future of Hamburg is felt. The entire number of thoroughbreds to be sold is announced to be 191. In the catalogue, eight royally bred stallions, ninety-eight of the choicest breed that money and care could collect, and all supposed to be in foal; twelve race-horses in training that will be each three years old at the time they are sold, and sixty-six of them two years old in the coming Spring are named to be sold. The stallions are, first of all the mighty Hamburg, by Hanover-Lady Reel, now five years old; Tammany, by the English Derby winner, Froquois, and himself a great race horse; Ogden, winner of a sensational Futurity; Inverness, an imported horse of fashionable English blood; Isidor and Bashampton, both imported and both high-class race horses; The Pepper and Bate. Of themares, thirty-one were bred to Hamburg, these including the dams of Banockburn, Motley, Isador Chucornac and First Mate and having among them such individuals as Cassopia, Cassalia, Meriden and Silyonate. Fourteen others were bred to Ogden, fourteen to Isidor, twenty-six to Bathampton, ten to The Pepper, and others to St. Angelo, Scottish Chieftain and the Musket horse, or Traction. The coming three-year-olds in training and the coming two-year-olds are a splendidly bred lot of horses, and of great promise. These represent a cost to Mr. Daly of nearly \$1,000,000. What they will bring is problematic, for conditions now are different from those attending the Belmont sale, when the world's record was established. There are many horsemen, however, who believe that these figures that have had first place for ten years will be eclipsed.

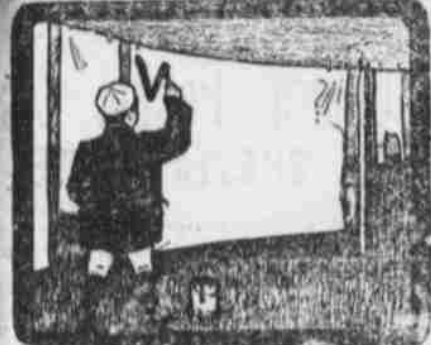
