SHIPPING SUBSIDY

To Be Displaced on the Calendar.

ALLISON DEALS IT A BLOW

Republican Senators Disclose Opposition to the Special Session.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The Senate today resumed consideration of the shipping bill.

The announcement by Allison that he would call up the District of Columbia appropriation bill Monday indicated that he would displace the Shipping bill with appropriation bills. This is what the opponents of the Shipping bill desire. Opposition to an extra session of Congress is becoming very pronounced among the Republican Senators.

Gallinger presented a resolution providing for a joint committee of the Senate and House to make inquiry into the question of special session legislation. Gallinger expressed the opinion that the scope of congressional action in such matters had been overstepped entirely. Referred to committee on pensions.

The House entered upon consideration of private bills.

The bill for a Pension court of appeals met with a reverse in the House committee on Invalid Pensions today, where a motion to report it was defeated. A sub-committee was then named to perfect a department bill, providing for pension appeals.

The bill to regulate the coming of Chinese persons into this country was passed.

At a Cabinet meeting today it developed that the plenipotentiaries of the powers are not making as rapid progress toward a settlement as was hoped, and many disturbing questions have arisen in consequence.

Whether our forces in China should be increased, and the question whether it would be necessary to make arrangements for more permanent quarters for those now there were among questions touched upon.

UNION PACIFIC

Said to Be Buying Southern Pacific.

WRECK ON THE FORMER LINE

Broken Rail Throws a Passenger Train in the Ditch.

New York, Feb. 1.—Reports are current from Wall Street, that the Union Pacific railroad has acquired control of the Southern Pacific railroad company. Acting Vice President Gates of the Southern Pacific says he knows nothing about the report. It is said the Harriam interests in the Union Pacific have bought the Huntington holding in Southern Pacific.

DENVER, Col., Feb. 1.—A number of persons were injured in a wreck of the Union Pacific passenger train which occurred 5 miles east of Hardin, Col., this morning.

A broken rail may be the cause of the wreck. The engine and mail car passed over it safely, but the baggage car went into the ditch, followed by two passenger coaches. The Pullman was partly overturned. Twenty passengers were badly shaken up and bruised, but Conductor Atkinson has reported that none are seriously injured.

GERMAN STEAMER WRECKED IN CHINA

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The German steamer Sui Hsingang has been totally wrecked in the rapids of the Yang Tze, sixty miles above Ichang, China. The captain was lost, passengers and remainder of crew saved.

LEADING BOER GENERAL CAPTURED

LONDON, Feb. 1.—A dispatch from Pretoria announces that Pretorius, one of the leading Boers, has surrendered. Pretorius states, however that the Boers are determined as ever to fight.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—John P. Mann, alleged defaulting clerk of the Continental bank, committed suicide today by shooting himself.

Wabash Gas Contracts



GERMAN DEMANDS

For Military Losses are Exorbitant.

FOREIGN RELATIONS WIDELY DISCUSSED

The Chinese Minister Protests Against Exclusion From Our Country.

HONG KONG, Jan. 31.—It is reported from Canton that the German consul there has demanded an indemnity of \$100,000 for each man wounded in the recent outrage on the West River and \$50,000 for other damages.

Piracy is increasing to such proportions that the consuls have demanded better protection for the water ways. The viceroy replied to their demands that he was doing all that was possible, but that the consuls are not satisfied. It is not unusual for a dozen outrages to be reported from the river in one day.

Bids For The Maine.

N., captain of the port of Havana.

Puget Sound Iron.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 1.—The Puget Sound Iron Co., which owns vast ore deposits in Texas Island, in the Gulf of Georgia, on the Pacific Coast, began to-day to develop its properties. The ore deposit is stated to be one of the richest in America. Officials of the company claim there are 10,000,000 tons in sight.

QUEEN'S FUNERAL

Naval Display of Royal Splendor.

COFFIN TAKEN TO PORTSMOUTH

Details of the Procession of Royal Yachts and Personages.

COWES, Feb. 1.—With a grand display of naval pomp and power the body of Queen Victoria was borne this afternoon from Osborne House to Portsmouth. Not since Admiral Cervera's ships lit up the Cuban coast with self-consuming fires, has anything been seen which in tragic splendor approached the naval spectacle today.

Over the still waters, between the roll of six pounders, came the strains of Chopin's and Beethoven's funeral marches. Following the naval funeral procession was the royal yacht Alberta. Half screened by an awning on the poop, the royal coffin was placed on a crimson barge with curtains drawn back, leaving free to view the magnificent easket and robes.

In the wake of the coffin, came the royal yacht Victoria and Albert, with King Edward and Queen Alexandra, and the English royal family; the royal yacht Osborne, with other royal personages, the imperial yacht, Hohenzollern with the Emperor William, Duke and Duchess of Connaught and others. The Alberta, with attendant escort, steamed along the deep channel between the coast of the Isle of Wight and a single line of battle ships and cruisers.

The minute guns were fired by all the ships in the Solent and at Cowes in a commission where the Alberta led the pier. Each ship ceased firing immediately after the tail of the procession had passed her.

After the procession had passed the majestic forms and ships in Portsmouth harbor commenced firing until the Alberta was alongside the wharf. When the Alberta was alongside the wharf, the royal body will be taken ashore at Portsmouth and thence conveyed to London and Windsor for the last tributes to the Queen.

The funeral started from Osborne 1:40 p. m. She coffin reached the Alberta at 2:25. Silent, silent crowds witnessed the progress of procession to the pier. After the body had been embarked on the Alberta, King Edward boarded the royal yacht and the procession started. Previous to the removal of the Queen's remains the Bishop of Winchester held a service in "chapelle ardente."


