CABINET MEETING

Was the Last of This Administration

WHO WILL SUCCEED GENERAL GRIGGS

Further Pacific Policy Was Outlined For the Chinese Situation

WASHINGTON, March 1.—At a cabinet meeting today, the last under this presidential term, all members presented their resignations to take effect on qualifications of their successors. Attorney-General Griggs who has decided not to remain during the coming year was among the number, and his resignation will go to Senate with others. It is believed Philander C. Knox, of Pittsburg will receive the appointment. The cabinet talked over the Cuban situation and Secretary Root read telegrams from General Wood that in his opinion the Cubans would soon become convinced that the action of congress in fixing the relations which should exist between Cuba and the United States was for their interests and would accept them without serious objection. In carrying out the policy inaugurated by the state department, when it changed the military force in China into a legation guard, the war department has sent orders to General Chaffee to still further reduce his force. It is said at the war department that arrangements have not yet been made for bringing away the troops from Peking. It is believed this subject has been done before the latter part of March. The troops are to go to Manila.

DOLLY REYNOLDS

She Was Not Killed by the Man Accused

ANOTHER HAND NOW REVEALED

His Resemblance to Doctor Kennedy is Very Striking

NEW YORK, March 1.—Attorney Moore, of the counsel of Dr. Kennedy whose second trial for the murder of Dolly Reynolds resulted in a discharge of the jury declares that he has found a man who looks like the twin brother of Dr. Kennedy and who was a personal friend of Dolly Reynolds. He said further "I am of the opinion that this man was with Dolly Reynolds at the Grand Hotel on the night of Aug. 15, 1898.

The attorney further said that he had informed District Attorney Phillips of this fact and had furnished Mr. Phillips with the man's name, asking him to send for him. He added that Mr. Phillips told him that he did not wish to interfere since he has placed the prosecution in the hands of Assistant District Attorney McIntyre and nothing was done the day she was murdered. I do not want to be understood as saying that this man killed Dolly Reynolds, but if he were to come to the front he could clear Dr. Kennedy of the charge and which he now rests.

BRITISH STEAMER IN BAD SHAPE

BERMUDA, March 1.—The British steamer Gastino, after being two days out from this port for New York, has returned for the second time with her propeller loose. The vessel sailed from Liverpool on January 19 for New York. Being blown out of her course and short of coal, she put in at St. George's for coal on February 12. After receiving a supply she proceeded on her voyage but returned with a loose propeller on the 15th instant. Repairs were made and again she proceeded on the 20th only to return again with her propeller loose a second time.

HONEST OFFICER REFUSES HIS PAY

NEW YORK, March 1.—Wm. S. Devery deputy commissioner of police, has refused to draw his salary. He declined to accept pay as chief of police from February 1 up to the day his was legislated out of office, and he has also declined to accept a cent as deputy commissioner of police from the day he was legislated out of the chiefship up to March 1. This he did in accordance with his plan to test the constitutionality of the new police law. This course was entered upon when he was sworn in as deputy commissioner of police and made a formal protest against being forced out of the chiefship.

POTTER'S CRUSADE

Anti-Vice Movement On a Broad Scale

EDUCATION AND SOCIAL REFORM

All These Bodies Now to be United in a Political Party

NEW YORK, 1.—Bishop Potter who has returned from a visit to Jeckly island, Ga., discussed briefly the most recent developments in the anti vice crusade inaugurated by him. He said that the awakening of public sentiment in New York had produced stimulating effect all over the country and that good people everywhere had been aroused to a sense of their responsibility.

"This movement differs from any other that we have seen," said the bishop. "The institutions of religion, of education and of social reform are all united in the work. One of the most hopeful signs is that the men of the labor unions are interested and have their representatives on the committee of all."

"Every previous effort at reform has been attempted by a minority, not a political party and in the present instance and among all classes there is a growing desire for better things. There can be no doubt of the strength of the sentiment that has been created in favor of radical reforms in our city. What is needed for the coming campaign is the unification of all the forces that are in favor of government. Everybody opposed to the present system should labor to that end and then there can be no failure.

UNFORTUNATE DEATH OF HOSPITAL NURSE

CHICAGO, March 1.—Mable Preston a nurse at the Michael Reese hospital and the daughter of a prominent physician in Mason City, Iowa met death in the elevator shaft on the fourth floor of the building last night. From a position on a raised platform the young woman was looking over the wire netting into the shaft to see what was delaying the car when the iron weights, weighing 700 pounds, descended on her neck, almost covering her head from the body.

PROGRESS OF CIVILIZATION

HELENA, N. Y., Mar. 1.—The big get rocking meals ever held in this state took place within a mile of the city limits last night. Three hundred persons were in attendance. The main was for \$300 with \$60 a special purse for each battle. New York and Buffalo birds contested and over \$5,000 changed hands. The main consisted of the best seven out of thirteen battles. Buffalo won seven and New York only two.

FRENCH TROOPS ARE GOING HOME

Powers May Interfere to Head Off Movements of Russians

PARIS, March 1.—It was decided that the Italians are to retain the custody of property which they seized on the ground that customs are purely a Chinese institution and have no right within the legation area. The American it only government which has announced the intention to compensate the Chinese for land required to extend legation grounds.

PARIS, Feb. 28.—General Voyron, the French commander reviewed the garrison of 40,000 French soldiers stationed here yesterday.

It is reported that ten thousand French troops will return to France in March. The Taku harbor is open and steamers are expected to arrive here shortly.

PARIS, March 1.—Sir Ernest Satow and Mr. Conger, after consulting with the missionaries, have decided to reject the Chinese proposition on the suggestion of M. Pichon, that they should act as representatives of the ministers of the powers to discuss with the Chinese plenipotentiaries the missionary question and the claims of a

LONDON, March 1.—"They are convinced, however," says the correspondent of the Morning Post, "that the Chinese are ready to agree to some arrangement for settling this matter."

"The Russians are taking advantage of the exciting situation and are pressing Li Hong Chang hard to rush through the Manchurian convention," says the Peking correspondent of the Times, writing Wednesday. "More than one power beside Japan and England has renounced with China against the negotiations that are proceeding at St. Petersburg."

"The time has come when the powers would be justified in interfering in order to prevent China negotiating with a single power, while the peace negotiations remain uncompleted."

Commenting editorially upon its Peking advice, the Times says: "The United States and Germany might perhaps be supposed to recognize the chief China's policy entails, but President McKinley at all events is sensibly bent on peace at any price."

NEBRASKA PRISON FIRE

Three Hundred Convicts Were Marched Out

BEHAVED WITH PERFECT ORDER

A Trusty Was the First Man to Discover the Fire and Give Alarm

LINCOLN, March 1.—A fire which started in the living rooms of Ward W. Davis of the state penitentiary at an early hour this morning, has destroyed the entire main building, together with the east and west cell buildings. The flames operated by the convicts are in danger as the fire is not yet under control. As soon as the fire became serious Warden Davis gave orders that the convicts over 300 in number, be taken from their cells. They were marched out in order under double guard and stationed in the prison yard. There was no attempt at mutiny or even disorder. Double guards armed with rifles were placed on the stockade walls with strict orders to allow no one to escape.

As a further precaution company F of the Nebraska National Guard was ordered out to assist in preventing an outbreak.

At 2:30 o'clock this morning, Warden Davis sent a request to the chief of the Lincoln police asking for the assistance of every available policeman. They are now on the way by special train.

A "trusty" who acts as a servant in the Warden's household was the first to give the alarm, but the flames gained headway so rapidly that a steamer, gas cart and members of the Lincoln department were sent to the scene.

From the business center of Lincoln to the penitentiary is nearly four miles and with rough roads the department was over a half hour in making the trip so that the fire had gained great headway before water from the steamer was turned on.

The present state penitentiary was built in 1876 at a cost of \$300,000.
