TREATY SITUATION

Discussed By the Press Of England

OPINIONS OF PROMINENT MEN

Fate of the Canal Depends on This Country Taking The Initiative

New York, March 13.—Speaking of the attitude of the English press on the treaty situation, a dispatch to the Tribune from London says:

"There is no note of triumph in the articles which have appeared since the rejection of the senate amendments to the canal treaty. The language is moderate and there is a general disposition to drop the subject as quickly as possible without giving offense to the Americans."

Those who have seen the text of the memorandum say that the rejection is made in terms of courtesy and dignity and are confident that the lucidity and fairness with which the British objections are urged will make a good impression in America. The text of the reply had not been seen at the American embassy yesterday, but the substance and line of argument was known and no secret was made of the satisfaction felt over the fact that the treaty had not been allowed to lapse in silence without a word from the foreign office. A courteous note with a clear statement of reasons is clearly better than silence would have been with automatic closure of the subject through expiration of the time limit. The subject is left in a form WHICH WILL ENABLE THE STATE DEPARTMENT TO TAKE IT UP ANEW at its own discretion. Meanwhile the English press is acting on the principle that the least said the soonest it is mended.

New York, March 13.—A number of members of Parliament expressed their opinion on the treaty situation to the London correspondent of the Journal and Advertiser after the rejection of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty had been brought to the attention of the House of Commons.

John Burns, expressing the industrial view, said: "However is THE DIFFERENCE between the two countries whether upon fortification or any thing else, it is NOT WORTH A DAY'S ESTABLISHMENT."
Mr. Lansley, member from Sheffield said: "No one is able to force trouble over this treaty business, although America wants to sault Sheffield with its iron and Normanham with its boots. Our Yankee friends have always talked big; it is their nature. No doubt the canal is the right thing, but just imagine a chancellor of the exchequer in these depressed times of ours asking Parliament to guarantee an advance upon an undertaking of such doubtful revenue for, after all, the Nicaragua canal is not the Suez canal and never will be from the point of view of the shrewd investor."
James O'Kelly of Roscommon said: "America is right in safeguarding her interests in a GREAT INTERNATIONAL WORK, WHOSE FATE REALLY DEPENDS UPON HER INITIATIVE."

GENERALS CONFERRING

To End the War in South Africa Soon

LAST GUN MAY HAVE BEEN FIRED

Sir Wilfred Laurier Demands a Federation Like Canada

LONDON, March 13.—It is understood that the British Cabinet at a meeting today considered negotiations proceeding between Generals Kitchener and Botha and for the mutilated instructions for Kitchener which defined on broad lines the terms on which a peace settlement might be effected.

New York, March 13.—A special to the Journal and Advertiser, from Pretoria, says: Pending the arrival of General Dewet, a general armistice has been declared. General Botha has been in conference with General Kitchener and Sir Alfred Milner for several days, and all three desire to consult Dewet.

Dewet is hurrying north through Orange river colony in obedience of Gen. Buller's summons. He passed Brandfort last night. On his arrival a conference will be held near here. There is JOY TODAY, CAUSED BY THE HOPE THAT THE LAST GUN HAS BEEN FIRED in the Boer war.

New York, March 13.—A special to the Times from Ottawa says: In the House of Commons today a resolution introduced by Mr. Borassa calling for an honorable settlement of the South African war and the discontinuance of recruiting for the Baden-Powell police in Canada was defeated by 3 for and 41 against. Those who voted for the motion were three French Canadians—Messrs. Bourassa, Monett and Alfieri.

Sir Wilfred Laurier made a powerful speech against the motion and declared that THE ONLY REAL SETTLEMENT of the South African question would be A FEDERATION LIKE CANADA under the British flag.

They also say that under Canadian law a divorce can only be obtained through the courts and if a person marry without a divorce he is liable to imprisonment for many years.

TEXAS NEGRO BURNED ALIVE

Summary Justice Meted Out to Criminals in the South

St. Louis, March 13.—A special to the Post-Dispatch from Corsicana, Texas, says:

John Henderson, Negro, who outraged and murdered Mrs. Younger several days ago, after making complete confession was burned at the stake this afternoon by a mob in the presence of 5,000 negroes. Last night officers in charge of the Negro started to take him to Fort Worth for safety. At Itasca the officers were overpowered and the Negro taken from them. Henderson was then brought here. When confronted with proof of his guilt he confessed. Several citizens made strong appeals to the multitude to let the law intervene but after it was decided to burn him news was received of rangers and troops enroute from Dallas, and hurried preparations were made to anticipate interference. A railroad train was driven into the ground in the corner of a court house lot, and boxes and wood piled around it and saturated with oil. About forty men made a rush from the jail across the street to the court house. In their midst was the negro handcuffed. Fastening the iron rail with a wire and chains, cats of oil were dashed over his clothing and dozens of lighted matches touched to the inflammable material.

ENGLAND AND RUSSIA MAY HAVE TROUBLE

LONDON, March 13.—The afternoon papers express some alarm over the friction which has arisen at Tien Tsin between the British and Russians over the piece of land alleged to have belonged to a railroad company. They think the incident proves that the harmony of the nations is liable at any moment to be disturbed.

EX-PRESIDENT HARRISON DIED THIS AFTERNOON

He Falls into a Probably Fatal Stupor at One O'clock Today.

ALL THROUGH THE NIGHT HE WAS UNABLE TO RECOGNIZE HIS ATTENDANTS

All the Experiments of the Physicians for His Relief Seems to Have Proven Unavailing.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 13.—General Harrison died this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

INDIANAPOLIS—A few minutes before one o'clock this afternoon a report came from the Harrison home that the General had sunk into a semi-comatose condition from which it was impossible to rouse him.

INDIANAPOLIS, March 13.—Last night was a long, anxious vigil to the watchers at the bedside of General Harrison and the thousands of friends and admirers of the ex president all over the country. The bulletins issued by Dr. Jameson throughout the night told but little of the hard, anxious fight that was being made against death.

The oxygen treatment, by which it was hoped to ease the patient's breathing to such an extent that the affected portion of the lungs might be relieved of the strain that deepened inflammation, was administered regularly.

General Harrison gave no signs during the night that he recognized those about him or that he was suffering greatly. This morning when the General of the city learned that the General had lived through the night, there were general expressions of relief and gratification, based on the impression that the day would bring to him recuperated energies and a possible promise of life.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 13.—At 4 a. m. the following bulletin was issued from the bedside of Gen. Harrison:

"The three physicians were working with him to sustain life. Since 1 a. m., the patient has weakened perceptibly. He is manifesting great vitality, but the heart is gradually showing the strain upon it."

INDIANAPOLIS, March 13, 6 a. m.—No material change in General Harrison's condition since 4 a. m.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 13, 7 a. m.—There is no perceptible change in General Harrison's condition. Drs. Jameson, Hadley and Dorsey have been in constant attendance throughout the night.

SAMOAN TROUBLES

Of Three Years Ago to Be Arbitrated

KING OSCAR OF SWEDEN AND NORWAY

Changed Relations Between England and Germany May Put us out of Court

New York, March 13.—Germany's responsibility for the troubles that occurred in Samoa three years ago, and resulted in the killing of American and British officers and men and the partition of the Samoan islands, will be determined by an attorney, who will be sent to Stockholm as the American representative. If the American contention should be established, Germany would have to pay damages to both Great Britain and the United States for losses sustained in Samoa.

During the Samoan troubles, Great Britain acted in concert with the United States and was disposed to hold Germany responsible. Whether, after the change in the relations, she is willing to renege the views then entertained, is a question that will be determined only when her brief is submitted.

PRESIDENT COMMUTES A DESERTER SENTENCE

WASHINGTON, March 13.—Private George Crippen, Company D, 15th Infantry, was tried by court martial at Cebu, P. I., found guilty of desertion and sentenced to be shot. The President has commuted the sentence to dishonorable discharge and confinement at hard labor for seven years.

MATRIMONY BY WAY OF BRIBERY

CHICAGO, March 13.—A special to the Record from Milwaukee Wis., says: Charles H. Rowan, the ex-matrimonial agent, has been found guilty of an attempt to bribe United States officials by a jury in the United States Court. It is claimed that he offered \$2,500 to the officials.
