FATAL ACCIDENT TO BERT BROWN

Bert Brown, aged 26 years, died at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Brown in Highland, at 5 o'clock Sunday afternoon from the effects of an injury received on the previous Friday while felling trees near Detroit.

The accident which terminated fatally, occurred at 11 o'clock last Friday morning. Brown was in the employ of the Enterprise Lumber Company and with a gang of workmen, was engaged in cutting timber. In falling, one of the trees deviated from its natural course and swung about, the butt end struck Brown in the region of the stomach. The injured man was brought to Salem Saturday morning but the injuries proved fatal, resulting in his death Sunday afternoon.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon in the United Evangelical church of which the deceased was a member. Rev. H. L. Pratt, the pastor, officiated and remains were given burial in the City View Cemetery.

PUBLIC DUTIES

Have Doubled Years on Lord Salisbury

A NEW PREMIER TO BE NAMED

And Probably it Will Not be the Hon. Joseph Chamberlain

New York, April 1.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London says: There were alarming bulletins at several of the clubs yesterday respecting the health of the Prime Minister with forecasts of his resignation and retirement from public life before the end of April. While these announcements were premature and caused needless anxiety, there had been no concealment of the truth at Westminster for several months that Lord Salisbury was aging rapidly and he was not likely to remain in office after the new reign had fairly opened. Even before his present indisposition it had been evident that his health was failing and that he was looking jaded and worn.

The Queen's death and the public business in connection with the opening scenes and ceremonials of the new reign have prevented a journey to the Riviera which might have invigorated him and possibly it may be too late for him to take advantage of a respite from official duties. It has been an open secret that the Prime Minister was weary of public life and anxious to retire after the general elections but was dissuaded by urgent requests from the court. His inclinations prompted retirement when the King ascended the throne but he was again forced to make a personal sacrifice and wait for a more convenient season.

Those who have heard his recent speeches have been impressed with his listless manner, lack of animation and his increasing feebleness. Members of Parliament have been predicting since January his resignation before the close of the present session. It has been noticeable that the King has spared him needless attendance at court and accepted the services of Mr. Balfour many times when the Prime Minister would naturally have been in consultation with him. Even if the current reports of Lord Salisbury's falling health are exaggerated there is little reason to doubt that there will be a NEW PRIME MINISTER before midsummer. PROBABLY MR. BALFOUR in preference to the Duke of Devonshire or Mr. Chamberlain. There were no notable callers at Arlington Street yesterday and official bulletins do not yet admit the case is serious.

Charles D. Pierce, representative in New York of the Boers of the Orange Free State, has issued an appeal to Americans in which he analyzes the British terms of peace and applauds the Boers refusal to accept them. He charges bad faith on the part of the British Government in offering to grant amnesty and declares Lord Kitchener is trying to make a Benedict Arnold of General Botha by treating with him as an individual rather than as a representative of the Boer Republic. "They promise enfranchisement after a period of military rule as a crown colony," he continues, "but enfranchisement will be indefinitely prolonged."

He likens the acts of their army to the cruelty of the Turks in Armenia, and adds: "LET US NOW WITH THE AMERICAN PEOPLE TO DECIDE whether the war is to be one of extermination and the Boers appeal to them for their mediation."

A Good Day. The services in the First Presbyterian church yesterday were of a deeply interesting character. Among the musical selections was a solo by Mrs. F. A. Wiggins which was rendered with soul stirring effect. After a brief sermon to the boys and girls of the congregation the pastor announced that at the annual congregational meeting recently held, P. H. Raymond had been re-elected elder for the term of three years. Also that F. A. Wiggins and

Clair Howe were elected for the same period. The pastor then propounded the constitutional questions, and there two brethren were set apart and ordained by prayer to the office of Rolling Elders. Mr. Raymond was then called forward and the three brethren were duly installed.

Ten applicants were received to church membership, two by certificate, eight on confession of their faith. There were five adult baptisms.

THE LIMEKILN LAWMAKERS Territorial Legislature of Hawaii Acting Funny. How the Ex-Queen Received the Mystic Shriners Very Graciously.

Honolulu Special to The Scripps-Blades News Association. HONOLULU, March 23.—The "Limekiln Legislature" as the first attempt of Hawaiians to govern themselves is derisively styled by political opponents, has not as yet succeeded in passing a single one of the many bills introduced. The bill appropriating money to defray the legislative expenses passed both houses, but because the senate returned it to the house three pages requesting that the spelling of the word "fourty" be corrected to read "forty," the house took umbrage, and threw it out. The expenses were provided for by joint resolution. The session is replete with humorous incidents. One of them occurred last Saturday, when the British admiral with his aide dressed in the gorgeous livery of the Royal Navy visited the capitol building. At the instance of Governor Dole the government band stationed in the old coronation bandstand struck up "God Save the King" as his excellency alighted from the carriage.

As the strains of the old familiar tune floated in upon the argumentative solons, a hush fell upon the assemblage. Representative Makekau solemnly arose to the occasion and to his feet. He called the speakers attention to the fact that the band was playing "America" and as good American citizens the house should as a body rise to its feet as a tribute of respect to the national air. The suggestion was deemed good by the speaker who requested the members to cease their deliberations, and show their respect for their country. The music ceased as soon as the guests entered the front parlors where they were received by Gov. Dole. Later the party visited the house, but were not seen by the speaker. As the admiral emerged from the building, the band again struck up, and the speaker again ordered the representatives to arise, stating that the house would show the same respect at all times.

Representative Beckley objected stating that it was played in honor of the British officers, and he didn't see why a good American had to make a monkey of himself by jumping up and down every time the band played "God Save the King" for a foreign dunkey. The speaker unwittingly did not see the point, when Beckley stated that if this nonsense was kept up every time the band played in the capitol grounds, that he would introduce a bill prohibiting the band from playing within a mile. The house seeing its folly called for order, and the crisis was at an end.

Governor Dole has several times snubbed the legislature. Yesterday he returned a resolution passed by the house requesting original or copies of records and papers of nature relative to transactions of the executive department since the time of annexation, stating that he declined to accede to the request in its present sweeping form but would on request furnish information regarding subjects necessary to legislative work. Secretary Cooper also rebuked the house and refused to comply with its resolutions stating that the request was discourteous and unpropitious in form, and not the usual manner of seeking information from the executive officer.

New York, April 1.—S. J. Robinson, managing director of W. Jessop & Sons, Limited, of Brightside Works, Sheffield, England, arrived here on Monday for the purpose of determining as to the location of the plant which the English concern proposes erecting in the United States.

The Jessop Company, which is capitalized at \$2,000,000 operated one of the oldest established industrial plants in Europe, it being founded as far back as 1774. It manufactures crucible steel chiefly. The Sheffield works undertake a number of large contracts for the British Government and give employment to 1500 hands.

In an interview last night, Mr. Robinson said: "We are going to build a plant on this side principally with a view TO ESCAPE THE TARIFF OF SOME \$50 A TON which the United States Government imposes on crucible steel entering this country. Having works here will enable us to extend us to extend our important business connections in America. While it is somewhat premature to state what particular additional new lines we intend to enter into the manufacture of, I will say that we shall make a feature of the steel specialties which the Dingley tariff precludes us from manufacturing in England and shipping into the United States. "Another reason for our present step is that we are under a distinct disadvantage on the other side owing to the high price of fuel. On last year's business we had to declare a reduced dividend on that score, notwithstanding our books having shown the largest turn-over in the history of the company."

"As to the precise location of the plant, I am not yet in a position to say anything definite, but it may be taken for granted that our new works will be in the vicinity of Pittsburgh. W. F. Wagner, our general agent in the United States and myself will leave for that city within the next few days for the purpose of going into the question of a suitable site."

Mr. Robinson thinks but lightly of the idea of any serious competition arising from American exports of coal into Great Britain. He says that fuel prices on the other side must soon fall. "It must be remembered," he continued, "that TWO YEARS AGO COAL WAS SELLING AT 100 PER CENT LOWER than existing quotations. Moreover, the railroad freight rates from seaboard to British industrial centers would I think considerably tend to kill the possibilities of American coal in England. While I do not share the intensely gloomy view which some persons indulge in as regards present and future business conditions in Great Britain, I cannot but admit that things look serious and would not be at all surprised to learn that many of the iron and steel plants on the other side are now executing orders at a loss."
