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SHORT EDITORIALS

FOR BUSY PEOPLE

C. H. Markham of the S. P. Co., sends us a copy of "Abroad," a journal published for information of immigrants by Rod. Falk, general European agent who has offices in London, Antwerp, Rotterdam, Hamburg and Liverpool. It contains three pages about Oregon and as many about California. Mr. Falk's office is at 40, Leathenhall St., E. C. London, and we are interested to learn that this monthly is given the widest possible circulation where it can be expected to do the most good. It is not known that any large number of people come direct from Europe to Oregon, though there are some direct immigrants no doubt. We would like to hear from Mr. Falk whether he sends any people directly to Oregon, and we hereby invite him to send The Journal a communication on the question. Some of the immigration to Oregon and Washington has come from the eastern and middle states but most of it from states this side the Mississippi river. Because Oregon has done so much to advertise the state at New Orleans, St. Louis, Omaha, Chicago and Buffalo, and kept a paid secretary of a state board of immigration all of last year and is receiving so little immigration it has made a great many people suspicious of these world's fair appropriations. One corporation can do more more to advertise the state than all the politicians and political grafts that can be invented. It is of interest to know that Mr. Markham's department is getting out a second edition of the Oregon folder-map, and has also commenced work on a pamphlet designed to promote the dairy interests of Oregon. All this is good work and it is a pity Oregon has not had a man like Markham at the head of her transportation interests since years. If we had the hundreds of thousands of money that has been appropriated to advertise the state we might have kept our state up with Washington instead of falling one congress behind, and having to take the leave of immigration as we are now doing and nobody can deny it. People better face the truth and do what is necessary to enhance these unfavorable and unjust conditions. Let all take hold in the right spirit and these conditions of embargo can be changed but not till we fight for a change.

There is another meeting tonight on the question of raising enough revenue to keep the city from running behind in its revenues. Without fault of the city government, there is a deficit of about \$4000. How shall it be raised? It can be done in part by restoring the valuations that the city lost by reduction of assessment. It is certain that if all the property were given in according to law there would be revenue and to spare. But the law permits every property owner to make any bargain with the assessor that his conscience will permit and hence no just valuation can be had. The Journal's list of business houses is not complete and in some respects defective. For instance, the Woolen Mills are given in at \$120 for stock. The manager informs us they pay on \$20,500 stock of goods and material, notes and accounts and machinery and personal property. The Yachukuma Tea store paying on \$2000 was also omitted. These are only minor details however and the two bodies of citizens who are at work on the problem will find some solution. Tilmon Ford closed his remarks Saturday night with the suggestion that a collection be taken and more money would be subscribed than if an occupation tax were levied. All joking aside, the list of lawyers and their personal property shows that one firm owns about the only law heavy in town. This is not true, as

HAWAIIAN LEGISLATURE

PASSES ONE BILL

And First Half of Session Has Expired.

Episcopal Church of the Islands Rent With Discord.

HONOLULU, March 27.—Although in session for more than half of its allotted time, Honolulu's first legislature has sent but one measure to the governor for his signature, that providing funds for its expenses. Endless argument over petty matters take up all of its time. Seventy bills have been introduced covering a wide range of subjects, provoking a great deal of discussion, but no action. Several times the relations between the senate and house have been strained, each branch holding that it was not treated with proper deference, and some of the more hot-headed members of the senate got so far as to talk of abolishing the house by resolution on account of alleged discourtesies, but the storm blew over with mutual explanations. This morning Dr. Russell, president of the senate, resigned his chair, but the senate refused to accept his resignation. He gave as a reason that he was disgusted with the endless bickering, and wished to get on the floor so that he could push a few bills through. The most important measure recently introduced is a bill to raise required revenue by taxing sugar producers \$10 a ton for all sugar made on the islands.

The ranks of the Episcopal church in the islands are torn with dissent. The row is caused because of an Anglican Bishop in an American field, the Rev. John Usherson, at the head of Episcopal congregation in full spiritual fellowship with the American body, but more or less at odds with Bishop of Honolulu, has been holding services at St. Clement's chapel for a considerable time and as an I. defensible church worker has been welcomed. Bishop Willis refuses however to admit the church to his diocese, as the deeds to the property were made out to the "Episcopal Church at Large" instead of the diocese ownership. The donors took this action temporarily, intending to alter the deed when they found what change in the statute of the church would follow annexation and Bishop Willis expected with draws. But the Bishop doesn't intend to withdraw, and has issued a statement to the effect that the Anglican church no longer regards the Rev. John Usherson as a member of its ecclesiastical body, but holds him as the "founder of a new sect 'the Episcopal Church at Large'." Regarding this excommunication, the Bishop says "This organization is not a branch of the Anglican or any other church, and has no recognition here or anywhere else. It was thought by parties who organized the association that I would be displaced when annexation occurred, and my place filled by an American Bishop from whom they hoped to gain favor. What will be the ultimate outcome? Why they will simply have to stop lying, that's all. They will surely settle this disturbance, and when it is settled, the Anglican church and its arrangements will be in no wise affected." Mr. Usherson states that the Bishop has played a trick worthy of the sharpest barter, and that there was not the remotest idea of founding a new sect or schism, and that his Lordship must have known it. He further says: "I deny the Bishop's charges in total. St. Clement's is loyal to the church, and also to the lawful authority of the Bishop. The Bishop is jealous of every one who works in the Church. As no one as anyone else does good work, he gets cross and wants to fight."
