### WHY SHOULD PENNOYER BE EXCUSED?

A Democratic paper at Portland says it would hardly look just to hold Governor Pennoyer responsible for Davis's acts as clerk of the school land board. Of course, this refers to Geo. W. Davis who was selected by Patterson and Bingham as dummy stockholder in THE JOURNAL in bringing their suit for a receiver on the charge that Hofer Bros. were not honestly accounting for the funds. They wanted an honest man in charge.

The mantle of charity should be extended to Geo. W. Davis, as no one knows the pressure that was brought to bear on him or the influences he was subjected to. That he was not strong enough to stand against them is the deplorable fact that has caused his friends and other innocent parties suffering.

But Pennoyer was governor of the Reform party and should have known what was going on and should have protected the state. His record will not excuse him, as he charged that there was fraud in the school land management.

Pennoyer's second campaign was conducted upon two issues, unseating the funds charged in his platform and speeches on the management of the state school lands and lien lands, the latter of which he had the sole charge of selecting. He was eight years chairman of that school land board and had an opportunity to learn the truth about those things charged by his party, and yet never made an examination or attempted to discover any frauds.

Why should not Pennoyer pay as well as Metcalf and McBride? He was there for the people. He was the minority party. He was there to protect the public against Republican corruption which he and his party continually charged but never uncovered. He did not do his duty. He should help repay the money that was stolen through his negligence.

Prof. W. M. Smith, the new principal of the Park school, succeeds Prof. G. A. Frontis, retired; he was last year assistant to the principal at the East school, Misses Cora Litchfield and Julia McCulloch taught in the Salem schools several years ago and were elected, together with three teachers retired. Prof. H. H. Smith, at present assistant at East school, will be succeeded by Prof. J. J. Krapps.

Mrs. Hall, Miss Marsh and Miss Stafford resigned previous to the meeting of the board.

The board made as few changes as have ever been made at an annual election. The new law that prohibits any teacher being employed who is in any way related to a member of the board made a change necessary in the East school assistant principal. Prof. Krapps was not an applicant for the position but is one of the best known educators in the county, and a man who has made his mark in the educational profession. Walter Smith is principal at Mitchell, Ore., and is one of the progressive and growing educators of the State. The selections made by the board will give general satisfaction. The record has now been established of retaining as many as possible and this will build up both the schools and the teachers. The outlook for the Salem schools is very bright but there is still a great deal of work to be done in improving the course of study, raising the standards of grade work.

Each school needs very much a small library of a few hundred volumes, and it is hoped the people in each neighborhood will follow the example of the Lincoln school, and by a co-operative effort secure a few hundred volumes of literature suitable for children of school age.

### THE PUBLIC SCHOOL SAVINGS

The Journal, Saturday printed the names of the children who were depositors in the public school savings bank. This savings system was established by the efforts of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and officially endorsed by the Board of Education of this city, who designated the bank in which the money gathered up in each of the Salem public schools each Monday morning was placed for safe keeping. The President of the school board for the past year was W. M. Obergren who was employed in the Gilbert Bros. musical instrument agency, and some of the notes at the bank now quoted as assets were no doubt cashed with public school savings. That this was all done in good faith, and that there was no intent to steal the deposits of the school children must be taken for granted. But the faith and honor of the community is morally pledged to see these deposits made good.

In all some three or four hundred children were depositors at different times in the public school savings bank. They were being educated in habits of thrift and economy that would make them good conservative citizens in time with something laid away for a rainy day. If the managers of the bank knew they were approaching a condition of insolvency and were still taking these deposits they were guilty of larceny by halves and should be prosecuted by the district attorney. It is assumed they did not know of such a condition of things existing in their bank. That will depend some on what the report of the receiver will show in the way of assets. It is certain the bank received the public school deposits up to and including Monday night, when it closed Tuesday morning.
