SALEM WOMAN'S CLUB PERFECTS ORGANIZATION

Elects Officers and Prepares for the First Rally With State Federation.

By the efforts of a few public-spirited ladies a woman's club has been organized at Salem and the auspices are favorable to a long and useful career.

At the meeting Saturday afternoon the permanent officers were elected in accordance with the nominations by the committee, viz: Mrs. T. T. Goer, president; Mrs. R. S. Bean, vice-president; Miss Joannette Meredith, secretary; Mrs. R. J. Hendricks, treasurer; and Mrs. J. F. Calbreath, Mrs. W. A. Cusick and Mrs. Gertrude Dibble compose the board of directors. The club meets on the second and fourth Saturdays in each month, for the present at Mrs. C. P. Bishop's residence, but when the active work begins next October arrangements will be made for club rooms.

Mrs. C. B. Wade of Pendleton, president of the state federation, will be here soon and will give a paper lecture on the subject of woman's club, the date for which will be announced later. This lecture will be public, but the regular meetings of the club are private and each member is allowed to take only two visitors a year, the same visitor not to be allowed twice, but members who have friends visiting them are permitted to bring them to the club. The membership fee and dues are very moderate, below the average usually required, being only \$1.50 initiation and 25 cents quarterly but allowance is made for associate members, to have the same privileges as active members on the payment of \$2.50 a year, and they are not required to do active work.

At present the club has over twenty members and more have expressed their intention to join and the interest taken reaches the height of enthusiasm. The president is the wife of Governor Geer, an Austrian and school teacher by profession, a club woman of literary and artistic tastes. A lady of broad views and tolerant disposition, she possesses the traits necessary for a president. Mrs. Bean is the wife of Oregon's Chief Justice and also a woman of liberal views and progressive ideas on all matters affecting the interests of men and women.

The officers are all women of culture, and native Oregonians and who have been nearly all their lives identified with the capital city, and deeply imbued with local interests. They will surely find plenty to interest themselves, and their organization is an added co-operative influence that will help the development of society in general.

First Rummage Sale. The Senior Guild of the Episcopalian church will present a novelty to Salem folk on Saturday next by conducting a "rummage sale." They will prob-

ably secure the empty room on the corner of State and Commercial streets where the N. D. O. recently gave their exhibit. These sales are popular elsewhere but this is the first ever given in this city. Anyone having articles which they do not use but which would be of value to others, such as furniture, bric-a-brac, dishes, books, fancy work, etc., will be conferring a favor to others as well as themselves probably, by presenting them to the guild. STATE SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

Circular from Superintendents of the Salem Schools.

Supts. of Salem Sunday Schools have issued a card to the Sunday school workers of Salem:

"We are on the eve of a great convention, a convention which will mean much to all who are connected with our Sunday schools, of whatever denomination, and in any capacity, whether of floors, teachers or members.

Fellow-workers, this is an opportunity of a lifetime, of having in our very midst the greatest convention of Sunday school workers ever held in this state, with the possible exception of the one at Portland last year, to which Salem sent about seventy-five delegates.

We will have in our city and in our homes 200 or more of the officers and teachers of the Sunday schools of Oregon, outside of Salem.

At this convention there will be held discussions which will bring out the most successful methods of conducting the Sunday school in all the departments: methods proved efficient by experience. There will be brought out in these discussions many suggestions of special interest to our teachers, primary, intermediate and senior.

We will have with us Mr. C. D. Meigs, of Indianapolis, the "Prince of Sunday School Workers," who is ranked second to none in the United States.

Some 30 delegates from other localities will come distances some as great as 200 or 300 miles at considerable expense. Cannot we, who live but a few blocks from the convention, so arrange our plans, if it means a sacrifice, that we, in whose hands is entrusted the Sunday school work of this community, that we may be able to attend the day sessions of the convention as well as the evening sessions, that we may be better prepared for the great work in which we are engaged?

Let us remember that we of Salem are all members of, and not visitors to this convention.

New Oregon Laws in Effect May 25.

Inquiry has been made concerning the date upon which the acts of the last Legislature containing no emergency clauses will take effect. The constitution provides that no act shall take effect until 90 days from the close of the session unless the emergency shall be declared. It is the general opinion that the 90 days must have fully passed before the acts take effect and that they become laws on the 25th day. The Legislature adjourned on February 23, leaving five days in that month, 31 in March, 30 in April and 24 in May to complete the 90 days. According to this, the acts will be in effect on the morning of May 25.
