UNITED STATES ACCUSED OF LACKING TACT

Published Facts About the Operations of the Gold Standard.

IN JAPAN THAT SET THE OLD WORLD POWERS IN UPROAR

Rush of Tourists to the Yankeland of the Orient Continues and the Hotels of Yokohama Continue to Be Taxed to Their Full Capacity.

YOKOHAMA, May 18, via San Francisco, June 6.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) There is much feeling in official and political circles occasioned by the publication of consular General Bellow's letter to the American Government concerning the state of Japan's finances. However, the facts therein stated, the conclusion is to be drawn from them by foreign governments and the commercial world are wholly unfounded as the government finances of this country are really in the soundest possible condition.

It is felt that just at this juncture where so much depends on keeping Russia in check it becomes an act on the part of the American Government wholly lacking in tact, if not directly unfriendly to make public such a communication for which there was no necessity and practically no occasion. It is quite evident, at all events, that western people can have no conception of the tension of nerves which mark the situation here in the east or the imminent danger of a sudden break which will involve the whole world in a gigantic war.

The Oregon after a stay of a little over a week in our harbor, weighed anchor for home on the 16th. She has been a most welcome guest during her two week's visit here, attracting the greatest admiration as an ideal warship, nothing approaching her having been seen in these waters.

The recently announced addition to their fleet of Pacific liners by the Northern Pacific Company gives great satisfaction and the prospects that one of the great German lines will soon be running to San Francisco makes the outlook for mail almost as frequent as the out-let for Atlantic lines. The rush of tourists continues and the hotels are crowded to repletion.

New York, June 6.—A special to the Herald from Washington says: Chile is distinctly the victor in the discussion which has arisen over the question of arbitration to be considered at the coming Pan-American Congress. The administration has virtually decided not to agree to any suggestions put forward by Peru or her allies removing the limitation placed by the executive committee of the Bureau of American Republics on the subject of arbitration. That principle under the decision of the committee, can only apply to future questions. Furthermore, even if Peru and Bolivia decline to participate the Congress will be held without them.

It is the earnest wish of the President that all the republics be represented at the Congress. It has been pointed out to Peru that it is distinctly her interest to take part, that to stay away would be to deprive her of the sympathy with some of her sister states have extended to her.

While the United States would like to see an early settlement of the Tona Arica controversy it cannot take sides and it cannot afford to permit the question to be dragged into the Congress and perhaps wreck the meeting.

BERLIN, June 6.—The Tagblatt prints a special from New Guinea containing a full account of the massacre of members of the first German South Sea expedition on the cannibal island of St. Matthias. They were all killed and eaten save Dr. Henrich.

Insane Ohio Boy Commits Crimes.
COLUMBUS, June 6.—Leroy Grove, 16 years old, stabbed his sister, aged 24, killing her instantly. He then strangled a 13 year-old brother to death, and firing the barn, ran in and shot himself through the temple. His charred body was recovered. It is supposed that he was insane.

A Vessel Floated over the Sands

Death Penalty in Washington.
TACOMA, June 6.—Judge Snell today refused to issue a death warrant for the execution of Eben L. Boyce, wife

MOST PEOPLE LOPSIDED.
Differences Between the Legs, Eyes and Ears of Men and Women.
The two sides of a person's face are never alike. The eyes are out of line in two cases out of five, and one eye is stronger than the other in seven persons out of ten. The right ear is also, as a rule, higher than the left. Only one person in 15 has perfect eyes, the largest percentage of defects prevailing among fair haired people. Short sight is more common in town than among country folk, and of all people the Germans have the largest proportion of shortsighted persons. The crystalline lens of the eye is the one portion of the human body which continues to increase with the attainment of maturity.

The smallest interval of sound can be better distinguished with one ear than with both. The nails of two fingers never grow with the same rapidity, that of the middle finger growing the fastest, while that of the thumb grows the slowest.

In 54 cases out of 100 the left leg is shorter than the right. The bones of an average human male skeleton weigh 20 pounds, those of a woman are six pounds lighter.

That sturdy member, the tongue of a woman, is also smaller than that of a man, given a man and a woman of equal size and weight. It may be appalling to reflect, but it is nevertheless true, that the muscles of the human jaw exert a force of over 500 pounds. The symmetry which is the sole intelligible ground for our idea of beauty, the proportion between the upper and lower half of the human body, exists in nearly all males, but is never found in the female. American limbs are more symmetrical than those of any other people. The rocking chair, according to an English scientist, is responsible for the exercise which increases the beauty of the lower limbs. The push which the toes give to keep the chair in motion, repeated and repeated, makes the instep high, the calf round and full, and it makes the ankle delicate and slender.—Exchange.

When Irving Forgot Himself.
Ben Webster, an English actor, told a good story of how he held his own when Sir Henry Irving happened to be absentminded. In the "Lyons Mail" there is a touching scene between Le-quesnes played by Irving and his daughter Lucy, of which Dider (Mr. Ben Webster) is a perfectly silent witness.

One night Sir Henry, instead of making his long speech, appealed in trembling tones to Mr. Webster: "Speak to her, Dider; speak to her!" Dider was dumfounded. There was an awful pause. Irving, quite unconscious of his own mistake, looked wrathfully at the young actor, but Mr. Webster, equal to the occasion, gave way to a burst of tears and exclaimed, "I cannot; you know I cannot speak!" and turned his back on the audience.

Then Sir Henry picked up his lines with a start, and it was observed that Dider's shoulders shook with emotion! —Louisville Courier-Journal.
