SUIT OF INTERVENTION AGAINST GILBERT BROS.

Begun By Depositors Who Represent a Large Amount.

CLAIM THAT THE LATE WM.

COSPER WAS A PARTNER

In the Banking Business and That His Estate in the Hands of the Executor is Properly to Be Made Part of the Assets of Which He Had an Interest.

A petition was filed this afternoon at three o'clock in Department No. 2, of the circuit court of Marion county, before Judge Boise, in a suit in intervention in the litigation over the Gilbert Bros. bank suspension in which Wm. Spayd, M. L. Jones, and Jas. Winstanley are plaintiffs.

The suit is brought for these plaintiffs by McNary & McNary, who set forth that their clients are depositors to the amount of about \$7000, and they intervene to make the late Wm. Cosper a party defendant and co-defendant with Gilbert Bros. The petition deals only in general allegations, upon which foundation McNary & McNary expect to introduce a mass of testimony to sustain their pleadings.

They allege in substance that Gilbert Bros. and Cosper were partners in the business of banking and brokerage, that Cosper was furnishing the capital on which the business was conducted and had such an interest therein that it constituted a partnership in the firm of Gilbert Bros.

Intervenor ask that their claims be paid out of the general assets of the bank and out of the property of Wm. Cosper now in the hands of the administrator. If they succeed in establishing their claims it will probably result in the depositors being paid in full and will put quite a different face upon the situation so far as all the creditors are concerned. One of the plaintiffs in the action was seen by a reporter this evening and he said they expected to be able to prove their case so completely as to save themselves and the rest of the depositors. They did not care to go into details but it was evident from remarks made that they were able to add a great deal to the assets, and did not care whether Gilbert Bros. or the Cosper heirs were benefited by their actions or not. It will not be a case of turning state's evidence, but as a res it of this suit it is expected that all depositors will get dollar for dollar and the Gilbert Bros. will be able to resume business.

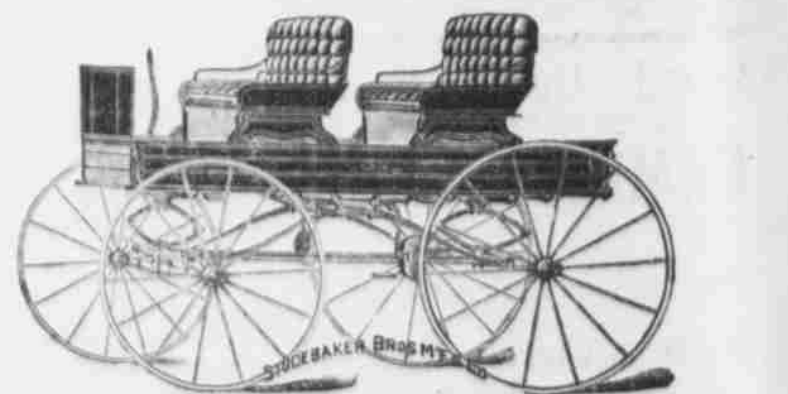
