A STORM BROKE UP COUNTRY DANCING PARTY

Lifted the Granary Into the Air and Broke up a Barn With It.

NEGRO SUSPECTS IN LOUISIANA ARE SURROUNDED BY A MOB

Who Threaten to Do Some Lynching But Fear to Proceed Before They Capture the Man Who Fired the Fatal Shot—Blood Will Be Shed.

LAMBERTON, MINN., June 13.—Reports are received that during the storm Tuesday in Redwood County, the granary of Fred Schultz, in which large party of young people were enjoying a social dance, was demolished and five dancers severely injured. The granary was lifted from its foundations and hurled against a barn, demolishing both buildings.

SHREVEPORT, La., June 13.—Latest reports from the Foster plantation, where John G. Foster was murdered yesterday, say that a dozen or more frightened negroes are still cowering in the Kennelworth store surrounded by an armed mob which threatens every moment to lynch the whole party. Prince Edwards, the colored man who fired the fatal shot, however, has not been apprehended and it is the desire to get him that has restrained the mob thus far.

The Foster suspects, with the exception of Edwards, the murderer, who is still at large, are held prisoners in a frame store about two miles from Shreveport on the banks of Red River. Ostensibly they are in the hands of officers of the law; actually they are in the custody of armed civilians. Men from every walk of life, from the farm hand to the city merchant, constitute this mob.

The crowd gathered immediately after the murder and pistols, Winchester and shot guns seemed to be the walking accompaniments of the mob, quickly did they spring up on every side. At 3 a. m. the mob drew a cordon around the temporary jail for the purpose of preventing any attempt on the part of the officials to move the men and women to a place of safety. Numerous threats of lynching are made by the members of the mob.

The negroes who are corralled at Shreveport were taken from Houston during the winter by a negro preacher calling himself "Elijah the Prophet." He created a great furor among ignorant blacks by predicting disaster and finally persuaded about 200 of them to go to Louisiana in order to avoid death in the prophesied destruction of Houston. STONE BRUISED HEEL

And Took Commando Out of a Ten Thousand Dollar Race.

NEW YORK, June 13.—Commando, James R. Keene's great colt, stepped on a stone while galloping Monday and bruised one of his heels so badly that he will not start in the Brooklyn derby today. While the accident is not considered serious at present, his trainer, James Rowe is not willing to take any chances of permanently injuring him. The Brooklyn derby is worth \$10,000 and he race seemed to be at his mercy. But rather than start him and so aggravate his troubles it has been decided to give him a rest and let the \$10,000 go to some other owner.

The stone bruised Commando's heel severely and he was returned to his stable. The usual remedies were applied but without quick results.

A week ago a similar accident occurred to Conroy, the Brooklyn handicap winner. A complete rest brought him around all right and he is now taking exercises regularly. Similar tactics will be pursued in regard to Commando.

SEIZED SLUGGED ROBBED

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13.—Lieut. Commander Tilley, Governor of the American part of the Samoan Islands, last night started out for a stroll, intending to view the water front. When in an unfamiliar part of the city he was passed by two men who turned suddenly and seized him from behind. A struggle ensued during which he was struck over the head and across the mouth, rendering him unconscious. His assailants made good their escape and relieved him of a gold watch and about \$25.

SLAUGHTER HOUSE THEORY

Buys Prosperity for a Country at Too Dear a Price.

NEW YORK, June 13.—In the course of the commencement exercises of the Brooklyn Polytechnic College, St. Clair McKelway called attention to dangers which he sees in the present American industrial expansion. He said in part: "Because we are citizens of the United States, we are citizens of the World. These are days when we are told that our locomotive makers and our bridge makers are injuring England; that our manufacturers of machinery and of small wares are hurting Germany; that our ocean carriers and our bargain makers are crowding Russia, Italy and France even out of their markets at

home and out of nearly all of them abroad.

"Why should we want to injure anybody? Superiority is desirable. But if even it is to be purchased at the price of impoverishment or of distress, it will be too dearly bought. Life is a competition, but the earth is not a slaughter-house."

LUZON STILL FIGHTING

Pacification of the Insurgents Still an Unfinished Task

MANILA, June 13.—General Sumner, has returned and reported the failure of the negotiations for the surrender of Calles the insurgent leader in Laguna province. The Filipino apparently believes he can hold out now that rainy season has begun.

Disappointment is left at the backward conditions in Southern Luzon. Some insurgent camps have been discovered and destroyed. Lieut. Cowen with a detachment of fifty men killed five insurgents near Jovelar.

MAKE MEAL OF MISSIONARIES

Two White Ministers and a Millionaire's Secretary are Eaten By Guinea Cannibals.

VICTORIA, B. C. June 13.—The following news was brought by the steamship Miowara, which arrived today: From Guinea the news was received of the massacre of Revs James Chalmers and B. F. Tompkins and 14 native teachers by cannibals. The bodies of the whites were eaten.

The scene of the cannibal orgy was seen by the troops sent to investigate the massacre, and a portion of jaw and thigh bones of the missionaries were found.

HARVEY LIBEL SUIT

Lane County Man Wants \$25,000 and Costs.

EDMUND, June 13.—B. F. Harvey, by his attorneys, A. C. Woodcock and L. Blyen, has filed a suit against the Portland Oregonian, asking damages in the sum of \$25,000, at the June term of the Lane county circuit court.

The complaint alleges that plaintiff is a married man and has been a resident of Lane county for 10 years; that Hugh Patterson was arrested and convicted at Roseburg of the crime of rape upon Winnie Thorne and sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. That by the publication of an article in said Oregonian of Dec. 2, 1900, the said defendant maliciously composed, printed and published said Harvey in said newspaper, said Sunday Oregonian, and extensively circulated and distributed in said Sunday Oregonian newspaper the false, malicious and libelous matter by and through said newspaper. (Here the article headed "A Sickening Tragedy Upon Justice" is set in full.)

Plaintiff alleges that the article is false, malicious, defamatory and libelous matter. That by reason of the premises said plaintiff, B. F. Harvey, is and has been greatly damaged in his good name and reputation in the sum of \$25,000. Therefore plaintiff demands judgment against the Oregonian for the sum of \$25,000 and for the costs and disbursements of this action.

This case will come up for trial in this city at the term of court beginning June 24, 1901.

Harvey was a brakeman on the S. P. R. R., and was accused of raping Winnie Thorne, of Cottage Grove, in connection with one Hugh Patterson. Harvey was acquitted while Patterson was convicted.

AMERICAN GOVERNMENT STILL OPPOSES INTERNATIONAL GUARANTY

British Government Will Levy Two Hundred and Fifty Millions on the Transvaal Mines to Pay Half the Cost of the South African War.

NEW YORK, June 13.—A dispatch to Herald from Peking says: At the meeting of the diplomatic corps, held yesterday, a reduction of the claims as proposed by America was definitely rejected. Secretary Hay's proposal to submit vouchers for the claims to the tribunal of The Hague was taken into consideration. If the Ministers voice the views of their government, there is a hope of its acceptance. Russia made a concession by withdrawing her opposition, which has been most pronounced.
