THE LATE T. ORIN BARKER

T. Orin Barker deceased was one of the oldest natives sons of this community, and for his many virtues and noble qualities of character he deserves more than passing mention. Of his private life not many would be privileged to speak, for he was a man who went his way unobtrusively and preferred to attract no attention. But those who knew him closer than the writer can testify that he was loyal and devoted to his friends, and always true to those dependent upon him. What more can be said of any man? He was instinctively a gentleman, and prided himself on being well informed on all that pertains to the social interests and the little graces that enable men and women to move through this world in social contact without friction and with the largest share of individual enjoyment. He was an authority on many sports and on club management, having been one of the founders and on the first house committee of the Illihee Club of this city.

In his fraternal relations he was animated by a high sense of duty to the organization. His pride was in the welfare of the lodge, in its order and decorum, in its perfect recitation and financial honor, in its pure philanthropy and disinterested devotion to its fundamental principles. That such a man should be honored and respected is not strange, but it is the involuntary tribute of mankind to its princes and commanders.

In his political relations he was a republican from principle, but having accepted a trust or public service he knew no parties and no friends. More than once he might have profited by aiding to promote political combinations formed for the particular benefit of their projects. He always declined, and bore the acutest of a saint's integrity. Such men are the pillars of government upon whom the people call when all else in the way of attempts at reform have failed.

His latest relation to this community, as manager of the new opera house, brought him before the people in a new light. The lessee nor the lodge exacted of him any bond for the faithful performance of his duty. He gave it the same painstaking devotion that characterized all his career. He kept strictest watch upon himself in all matters, knowing that he that ruleth his own spirit is greater than he that taketh a city. To the end of his life, he was a kind, gentle and considerate. If he made a mistake he was first to acknowledge his error. His one fault was a virtue. Of no independent cast of mind was Orin Barker, that rather than give any cause to think he was catering to any living human being, he sometimes appeared brusque to people who did not know him. But a sweet nature was hidden beneath the burr of his exterior. He was in all respects a man this community may feel proud to have given the world.
