MARION COUNTY COURT

Takes up Matter of Stayton River Channel and County Roads.

In the matter of the petition of A. D. Gardner et al for the building of a dam in the Stayton river for the protection of the Stayton bridge, the court agreed to prevent damage to the bridge by changing the channel of said river by putting in a dam and making a cut whereby the water of the stream will run in the old channel. Judge Scott was instructed to confer with the Linn county court with a view to getting that county to pay one-third of the expenses, and if they agree to do so, to advertise for bids for the work.

W. J. Culver, the county road master has been instructed to make cuts and fills in the county roads at the following named places: At the point known as Beckner's Hill, and the second hill west of Lake Lahab on the Howell Prairie and Brooks road, the hill to be cut down and the bridge at the foot of the hill shortened. Also a fill to be made at the first bridge east of Win. M. G. Callister's grist mill, the bridge shortened and fill made.

All bridge and road matters are turned over to County Engineer and county road master.

SILVERTON MOTOR LINE

Fifty Year Franchise On the County Road Asked For

In the Marion county commissioners court this morning a petition was filed with the signatures of business men of this city and farmers of the vicinity, asking for the Oregon City Southern Railway company a franchise for a right of way to be upon the most northern and westerly 20 feet of the side of the county road known as the Wire road, extending from the limits of the city of Salem to the limits of the city of Silverton, for the purpose of constructing and operating thereon an electric railway for the transportation of freight and passengers. The franchise is asked for a period of 50 years, and the right to the said railway company to construct said road with all necessary side tracks and turnouts and to erect poles and string wires for the transportation of power between these points.

The franchise is to be conditioned upon the completion of the said railroad within one year from the date of granting the franchise. The terms of the charter are not yet known, and may not be acted upon this month.

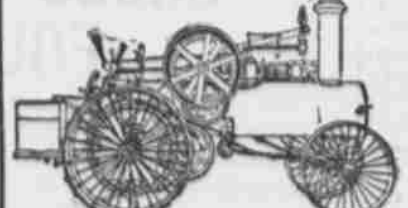
