BRITISH WAR OFFICE IS NOW ON DEFENSIVE

Lord Rosebury May Become a Mediator for South Africa.

AMERICAN ARRESTED AND HELD UNDER MISTAKEN IDENTITY

The Yellow Press of France Seems Determined to Force the Country Into a War With England—British Navy Surveying the French Coast.

New York, July 13.—Lord Kitchener's views respecting war correspondents are well known, says a London dispatch to the Tribune and his general idea as shown in his latest cablegram that a campaign of skirmishes should be minimized so far as possible, meets with general approval in England but the Daily Mail has the united support of the press in condemning the vagaries of censorship and the War Office is now on the defensive whenever fresh questions are asked respecting the atrocities which occurred at Vlakfontein and the denials of plain statements made by correspondents.

New York, July 13.—According to the Tribune's London correspondent, the reported engagement of Lord Rosebury and the Duke of Albany is not credited by his intimate friends. Those who ordinarily have his confidence decline to believe that he will ever marry again. Another rumor which also needs corroborative evidence assigns to Lord Rosebury the role of peacemaker in South Africa. It is asserted that Mr. Kruger and the advisers in touch with him in Holland have offered to negotiate peace with Lord Rosebury but not with either Mr. Chamberlain or Lord Milner. It is hardly credible that Lord Salisbury will seriously entertain proposals derogatory to the dignity of his own government. Mr. Chamberlain and Sir Alfred Milner are the only possible peacemakers on the British side.

New York, July 13.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London says: Charles Lillywhite is endeavoring to induce the American Government to take up his case for damages for arrest and seven months imprisonment. His papers show that, while he was born in London, he was naturalized in Chicago and was a resident of Tacoma, before he went to New Zealand, where he was arrested and sent to Colchester on a charge of murder and arson. He intends to return to New Zealand now that his innocence has been established, but hopes to hold the British authorities responsible for this case of mistaken identity as he lived in New Zealand several years before his arrest and deportation in iron. The bearings of his American naturalization are uncertain.

New York, July 13.—A dispatch to the Herald from Paris says that a circular published by a local paper at Avanches, a town on the coast of Brittany, informs boatmen and fishermen that one of his Britannic Majesty's vessels will be occupied in observing the direction and speed of currents near the channel islands from the middle of May to the end of August and boatmen and fishermen are warned against approaching closer to

MOBS ARE CHASING NEGROES

KANSAS CITY, Mo. July 13.—The mob which made a demonstration last night against the County Jail, where Frank Holland and Joe Robertson, negroes, charged with an assault upon Miss Grace Davis are confined, broke up this morning into disorderly groups which chased and assaulted dozens of negroes who had given no offense. At 3 o'clock this morning gangs of men were still hanging about the north of town talking of the Davis outrage and threatening the negroes. An attack on the jail, if attempted, would have been repulsed, the police say.

LITTLE SLOOP ALL RIGHT

GALVESTON, July 13.—Captain Woods of the British steamer Mohawk which has arrived here, reports having spoken the little sloop Great Republic, bound from Boston to Lisbon in mid-ocean, in latitude 40.27 north, longitude 41.6 west. The sole occupant of the little sloop asked to be reported "all well."

EXCURSION BOAT IS BLOWN UP

SANBURY, Pa. July 13.—An excursion boat anchored in the Susquehanna river blew up with terrific force today, killing two boys and injuring a dozen other persons, two fatally. One man is missing, and may have been killed. The dead are: Allen and Artie Peter, aged 14 and 12 respectively. Missing: George Frymire, pilot. Injured: Keller aged 12, will die. Frank Keller, aged 8, will die. Several others injured but not seriously. The boys killed and injured were fishing on a near-by wharf when the explosion occurred.

ITALIAN WRECK VICTIMS

A Train Smash-up in Indiana as Bad as the Lake Labish Affair.

CHICAGO, July 13.—The Tribune says: Acting Consul from Austrian and Italian subjects injured recently in the train wreck at Cass, Ind., on the Wabash Railroad. The men are being cared for in the Wabash Hospital and when representatives of the Austrian and Italian Consuls called to see them they were refused admission on "humanitarian grounds." Mr. Schwegel will be accompanied by Mr. Malatta, who has represented the Italian and Austrian Consulates in their efforts to reach the injured men and by Dr. Anton Biankina.

Should the hospital authorities again refuse to permit the injured men to be seen of the grounds that their condition would afford, Mr. Schwegel will protest in the name of his own and the Italian Governments and will ask that his physician be permitted to be the judge of the degree of illness.

The Wabash officials already have agreed to admit the visitors to the presence of such sufferers as in the judgment of the hospital authorities should be visited.

Count Rozwadowski, the Italian Consul said: "When Mr. Malatta, my representative, went to see the injured men and the hospital officials denied him admission, I called the attention of the Italian Embassy to the action and through a representative. It was taken up with the State Department which in turn referred it to Governor Durbin.

PIONEER RESIDENCE BURNED

E. J. Farnham, a neighbor, brought the news to the city today of the burning of the McKinney residence on the old family homestead about 4 miles above Turner. Friday afternoon when only Mrs. Mayor McKinney and two children were at home fire was discovered, and before help could be secured the building was gutted with flames and nearly all the contents were consumed. Only a piano, a sewing machine and some bedding were rescued. It was the old home of Mrs. McKinney, who resided there with her son's family. The building when new cost about \$7,000 and with it was burned the household effects of Mrs. McKinney, and those of her son Mayor, and E. E. McKinney, the latter having his goods stored in the old home for the time being. It is understood that the insurance had not been renewed, and that it is a total loss, estimated all the way from \$5,000 to \$8,000. The fire is supposed to have caught from a defective chimney, as it was first discovered there.

ANOTHER ORIENTAL FUNERAL

The remains of Lee Chung, the Salem Chinaman who died in Vancouver, B.C., July 6th, arrived here last night, and the funeral was held today at the undertaking parlors of Rigdon & Clough. About six months ago he left here for China and while there was married, but his wife did not return with him. He was about 40 years of age and was held in great esteem by the Chinese of this city. He died at a Chinese hospital at Vancouver.

PLANING MILLS SOLD

The Planing Mills plant and Sash and Door factory of Hansen & Landon of this city was today sold to Mr. John Stout a manufacturer of church furniture and sash and doors at Bonaville, Ind., until recently, when he removed to Salem.

MODERN WARS ARE COMMERCIAL

The Issues Will Be Fought Out on the High Seas.

AUSTRIANS ANGRY OVER INCREASING AMERICAN COMPETITION

Morgan, Hanna, et al Engineering a Deal the Combine Lake Steamers, Railroads and Ocean Steamship Lines Under One System of Management.

New York, July 13.—Senator Chauncey M. Depew who is in Paris is quoted in a Journal and Advertiser dispatch as saying: "The basis of future wars is commercial. Commercial competition excites the passions as competition progress in other departments. Germany is now our most hostile competitor. The conclusion is obvious. The issue is to be fought out on the sea; hence the newspapers that are advocating a mighty navy are doing most patriotic work. Continental Europe entertains hostility against the United States. England does not, but we do not reciprocate her sympathetic feeling. Notwithstanding commercial competition all classes there believe that if the country were in jeopardy we would come to its assistance.

"France will not become very hostile, for most of her products are consumed by her own people. Austria seeks a market for her surplus and is influenced by her allies. Italy will stand with her allies. The difficulty with Russia will be settled by our administration.

The hostility against us in the various countries of Continental Europe differs only in degree. Nevertheless an industrial alliance against is impossible. The countries can't agree as to percentages. We are their best customers and could retaliate."

New York, July 13.—The rumor that the Continental powers intended to combine the boycott American goods when the commercial treaties expire is regarded in England, a Tribune dispatch from London says, is merely a suggestion by angry Vienna's tradesmen who expect to be undersold.

The Speculator points out that statesmen are only too well aware that unless Great Britain were included in a tariff war American goods would be simply purchased by Englishmen and sent out at a nominal increase in prices. Besides, trade is not one sided and the stoppage of all American purchases would be more felt on the continent than in America.

New York, July 13.—A Herald special from Philadelphia says that a combination of the Pennsylvania Railroad, the American Line, the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad, a fleet of ocean steamers sailing from Newport News and the majority of the shipping of the great lakes is said to be the object behind the conference recently held in New York, which was attended by J. P. Morgan, M. A. Hanna, C. M. Griscom, A. D. Cassatt and P. A. B. Widener.

A combination of interests thus formed in conjunction with the Leyland line deal would give to the promoter and to the new combine the transportation of the lakes and the West practically to Europe.

If the American line should come into the reported deal its vessels and those of the Leyland line would form a fleet that would be a formidable rival to the Cunard, White Star and German lines.

GRAND LODGE OF ELKS

PORTLAND, July 13.—Portland will make a bid for the grand lodge of Elks in 1905. The Portland lodge has begun to whom it up this early, and preliminary steps were taken last night by the appointment of a committee. DUTCH HARBOR ALASKA

SAN FRANCISCO, July 13.—The steamer Homer has arrived direct from Dutch Harbor, Alaska. The vessel sailed from here last spring with supplies for the sealing stations at Dutch Harbor and in St. Paul and St. George Islands in the Pribyloff group. Thirty deaths from measles have occurred at St. Paul's and 17 at St. George's during the past winter. On the day of her departure for this port, July 3, the only vessel at Dutch Harbor was the United States gunboat Concord from Manila, which had been in port about two weeks and was to sail July 3 for Point Barrow with supplies to assist the revenue fleet. The Concord may take a herd of reindeer from Siberia to various points on the Alaskan Coast. All steamers bound for Nome had left Dutch Harbor, including the transport Warren, which left the harbor about the middle of June. Dr. Newhall, a medical missionary, who with his wife has been stationed among the Aleuts for several years has requested General Randall in command of the military station at Nome to have the Warren call at Unalakleet Island on her way to this port and take on board about 30 Aleut children who are to be sent to the Indian school at Carlisle, Pa.

COPELAND WAS A DEFENDER

OMAHA, Neb., July 13.—Hartley Copeland, who shot and killed A. P. Rogers on a Union Pacific train near Rawlins, Wyoming, was teller in the Nebraska National Bank, of this city for 10 years prior to August 1890. He left the city at that time ostensibly for a summer vacation, and has not since been heard from. A month after his departure the Burlington railroad account at the bank showed a shortage of \$10,000. Copeland was being traced by a detective agency.
