EDITORIAL

Milt Miller, who dispenses Pink Pills, Peruna and debility tablets at his Lebanon drug store, is lovingly mentioned by Democratic papers as a candidate for Governor. As all the sorrel-top and buffalo-chip politicians in the Republican party have decided that Geer is not a fit man to hold the place for another term, it is well to consider the possibilities of a soda-water statesman of different political persuasion. As we size it up, Geer is a goner, as far as the Republican party is concerned. He has all his life labored as a Democrat and Populist as fly-up-the-creeks generally, so that he need expect no nomination from them. The Hi Plimmer wing of the Republican party has got it in for him so bitter, that if they can't beat him for nomination they will defeat him for election. Geer seems to have nothing but the respectable (?) elements of the party to fall back on, and the chances seem to strongly favor the Hi Plimmer wing assuming its rightful control or burning down the State House in the attempt. So the people might as well look forward to the possibility of being governed by the enlarged wisdom gained in a country drug store. The Republicans ought to like it, for Milt everlastingly disgusted the Democrats when, dressed with a little brief authority, he acted as body guard and chief master of ceremonies for Bryan at Lebanon. He kept people at a distance of several rods from Mr. Bryan so successfully that scores of old wheel horses had to be glad they could ride on the same railroad with the Great Commoner, to say nothing of getting onto the same train. A reporter found a couple of good Democratic ladies begging and imploring the Lordly Milton for a glimpse of their hero. But he was firm as iron that no one should get within a stone's throw of the man he had stowed away in a back bedroom, and who was never known to refuse to see anybody when he was awake. He escorted the ladies around to the back alley, got them through a barn and into a back door when one of Milt's guards wasn't looking, knocked at Bryan's door and he received the ladies in the most cordial and pleasant manner in his shirt sleeves, with the democratic simplicity of a true Western gentleman. The ladies were delighted and no one was hurt, but those were the only ladies that were permitted to see him that day, and it took reportorial strategy to bring that about. What this state needs is a Governor who will stand on his dignity and not let the common herd get at him whenever they take a notion. A Governor who isn't the least bit exclusive and doesn't have a conception of when some one catches him in his office with his coat off, or in the back yard sawing wood, is not really to be compared with a dealer in eye-water who can stand people off at their proper distance. If it hadn't been for him placating a kind of Swiss Guard around Bryan some old woman might have rushed in and kissed him on the northwest corner of that Platte river mouth of his, and then it would have been all day with the presidency. By all means, let us have a dignified dispenser of paregoric for Governor.

Nebraska Populists did good work as long as they confined themselves to cleaning out the dungheap of Republican boodles, that had accumulated for twenty years of unbroken rule, so as to almost hide the dome of the State House at Lincoln out of sight. They removed some corrupt men from the supreme court and cleaned up the mismanagement of the school funds of that state. They took up nearly a million dollars of floating warrants and invested what idle school funds had not been stolen by the school land ring. They convicted republican officials and sent them to the penitentiary for defalcations of hundreds of thousands of dollars in state and county affairs. All this was good work and was well done and their grip on the state could not have been broken but for the ambition of Bryan, Allen et al. to shine in national affairs.

Allen had senatorial dimensions and Bryan, in the absence of a great leader, was able to take charge of the Democratic organization. Disgrace at the unsavory elements that took charge of the Republican party, when there was a president to elect, led many Republicans to support Bryan who would not have supported him on free silver alone. If all the Democrats and Populists had supported Bryan either time he ran he would have been elected, but there seems to be always enough men in any minority party who desert when victory is in sight to defeat its aspirations. Actual performances of the Reform forces in Nebraska would have given them the Presidency after one term of McKinleyism had succeeded Cleveland. The people would have seen that a Republican capitalism enthroned at Washington was no better than Democratic capitalism. In place of merely taking advantage of the tide and letting their good works speak for themselves, the Nebraska leaders had to get up three sets of parties with three sets of platforms and with enough irrational and not-understandable isms in them to sink a drydock. They had to assail all the conservative organizations in Christendom. The result is history. Instead of advancing reform in administration, which is really all the American people want, they have lost Nebraska to the Republicans and set back the hands of the clock of progress in national reforms. It is the old story of the dog crossing a bridge and losing the hunk of meat he had in his mouth by snapping at the shadow in the water.

Lord Rosebery's tactics in running the Liberal party shows a great deal of political sagacity and stamps him the leader who will overthrow the present Tory-Conservative-Union administration in England. He was not too fool enough to take sides against his country when it went to war against the South Africa republics. He thought the war was wrong, and he would not have got into the disagreeable business, but he said, uphold the nation right or wrong when a foreign war is on. He was opposed to putting his party in the attitude of Pro-Boer sympathizers. He took the same ground as the Douglas Democrats in the War of the Rebellion. They did not favor the war that rent the nation in twain, but they could not see the wisdom of northern Democrats arraying themselves as Pro-Slavery men. They said, let the South assume the responsibility of the war, but let us not be open to the charge of disloyalty to the nation. So the Douglas Democrats went to war and fought under the banner of freedom with a President they did not vote for, but indirectly helped to elect. Rosebery said: I did not bring on this war. The Conservatives must shoulder the responsibility but I am not going against my country when her life and prestige and existence are at stake. If Bryan had gone ahead and sustained McKinley in the war with Spain, and all that followed, and had dropped the political game until that war and all the great issues growing out of it had been settled in some way in favor of our country, his position would have been far stronger. But he tried to make an issue against his country and the country had to vote him and Aguinaldo out or sustain McKinley, Mark Hanna, Trusts and corruption enough to have retired the Republicans. The issue was nationality and the country has not suffered in the eyes of the world by standing for the national existence. Time will show that Rosebery's tactics are right. There is sufficient for political parties to divide over questions of administration ordinarily. But there is not enough margin to divide when the national existence and sovereignty is pitted against even such a breechcloth and bolomen aggregation as Aguinaldo represented. If we were an Englishman we would stand by England in her fight in South Africa. As an American we stand by the Boer Republics and believe they should not be wiped out of existence, because the principle of republican institutions is involved. Time will show that they will not be wiped out, and if men were free to follow their feeling, ten men would spring to arms to fight for the Boers every time one of them is killed by the power of wealth and overwhelming numbers. South Africa should remain free land and open to the world.

He had splendid ability as a lawyer but never got rid of the mistaken theory that any success at the bar was justified by the end-winning a large fee. He had also the weakness of relying on membership in fraternal orders helping to achieve what real manhood and personal integrity alone could accomplish. When disappointments came, and artificial props proved futile, he took his life and abandoned what might have been a career of usefulness and respectability and satisfaction to his family and friends, had he relied upon things more real in hours of adversity. What is a career in Congress compared to happiness in one's home circle, or the respect and fidelity of friends compared to the treacheries of politics? A congressman is after all but an errand boy for a quarter of a million more or less thankful people who think they place a man under lasting and even pecuniary obligation by voting for him. A congressman from Oregon must be able to get his state \$100 in appropriations for every dollar he gets out of the job, and he must spend his salary to get the nomination and election before he ever gets a cent of pay for surrendering his business and leaving his home and family. One term in congress is not worth having, and the congressman no sooner takes his seat before he must begin wipewiping and scheming to get another term.
