SECRET OF ODELL'S SUCCESS

He Runs the Great State of New York on Strictly Business Basis.

The most remarkable thing about Governor Odell is that up to the time he became governor he was known only as a machine politician and not a very scrupulous one at that. But as governor he has proved himself a strong, thorough, clean and fearless executive, and has won respect and confidence of the people, regardless of party affiliations.

Roosevelt went into the governorship with many promises of reform, and raised expectation high, but accomplished nothing. Odell promised nothing and has accomplished very much.

He has not only defied Platt, who was so long absolute in his control of the republican party of New York, but has made him a "back number."

He has smashed the corrupt schemes of politicians, stripped the bosses of their patronage, thrown down the gauntlet to corporations which formerly had things their own way, and placed the state administration on a business basis.

The secret of his success and influence is that he is a business governor. He applies the same principle to the management of the state's affairs that a business man would apply to the direction of his own interest.

The Wheat Supply.
 There are no evidences of a short world's wheat crop, nor of much higher prices for the cereal. The heat and drought in the East and in Russia has not affected the supply to any material extent. There will be a slight shortage in Europe, but not enough to create any considerable extra demand.

For instance in France the wheat crop this year will amount to 304,000,000 bushels, slightly less than the crop of last year. The annual consumption in France is about 340,000,000 bushels, so the shortage is about 36,000,000 bushels, all old wheat being almost entirely disposed of.

The government reports from Washington estimate a crop in the United States of 600,000,000 bushels, which is more than an average supply. In 1900 the yield was 522,000,000 bushels. It is expected that the two Dakotas and Minnesota will have an exceptional by large yield, probably 200,000,000 bushels. Last year it was only 100,000,000. In all parts of the country the yield will be as large as last year and in some parts larger, so there are no reasons for great expectations in regard to an exceptional demand or higher prices for wheat during the next six months or a year.

In the Combine.
 EAST ORANGE, N. J., July 26.—The stockholders of the National Steel Co. met here today and voted to lease their property as a whole to the Carnegie Steel Co. The terms of the lease have not been made public.

 DENVER, July 26.—Kid Broad will box "Young Corbett" this evening ten rounds. From this place Broad will go to San Francisco to stir up Pacific coast featherweights.

Representatives of the White Mountain Oil Company at Work.

Mr. McFarland, secretary of the White Mountain Oil Company, informs a reporter that he and Mr. Chapel are meeting with very much encouragement from the citizens of Salem in the way of subscriptions for stock in his Company, and predicts that it will not take long to raise the amount necessary to commence operations on the land leased by the Company in Polk county. This is nothing more than what should be. If the citizens of Salem could only realize what the discovery of oil in this vicinity means to them it is believed that they would not hesitate very long in coming forward with the necessary funds to drill a well or two.

The Company is not asking for donations for this purpose, but are asking the people to subscribe for their stock at 25 cents per share. Every dollar derived from the sale of stock will be used in the development of the Polk county lease.

Let everybody who has a few dollars to spare take a hand in this matter and have it to say that he assisted in the discovery of oil in this part of the country. Should oil be struck, stock would in all probability go up to \$5 per share, perhaps \$20. Who can tell?
