ADJOURNED SESSION OF CIRCUIT COURT

Several Petitions Granted and New Orders Were Filed.

The case of E. J. Cornell, plaintiff, versus G. W. Pearmain, defendant, set for hearing in Justice O'Donald's court at nine o'clock this morning, an action to recover damages for the removal of a partition fence, was transferred to the circuit court after a hearing of the pleadings, on the ground that the title of real property was involved.

At an adjourned session of department two of the circuit court Saturday afternoon, in the case of Tibbon Ford, executor, plaintiff, versus A. T. Gilbert et al, defendants, W. T. Lively & Co., by their attorneys, W. T. Slater, filed a petition for an order of the court upon Claud Gatch, receiver of Gilbert Bros. bank, requiring him to credit the account of T. A. Lively & Co. with Gilbert Bros. with \$981.96 as of April 25, 1901 and \$298.22 as of April 30, 1901. The petitioners allege that they were indebted to Gilbert Bros. to a large amount, and that on the dates named drafts were executed to the Branch county Savings bank of Cold Water, Mich., correspondents of Gilbert Bros. on the American Banking Co., of Pittsburgh, Pa., and to the Dubuque Brewing Co., of Dubuque, Iowa, on the same company, and that said drafts were honored and placed to the credit of Gilbert Bros., and that each of said amounts are retained by said company.

The receiver, Claud Gatch, demurred to the petition on the grounds that insufficient facts were stated to entitle the petitioner to the relief prayed for. After the arguments of the respective counsel, Judge Boise granted the petition of the plaintiffs.

In the same case, Olive A. Slater, through W. T. Slater, petitioned for an order of the court upon Claud Gatch, requiring him to pay out of the funds now in his hands belonging to the said estate the sum of \$80, the same having been paid by her agent, W. T. Slater for a draft on the First National Bank of Portland just prior to the closing of Gilbert's bank, and payment thereof was refused by said First National Bank. A stipulation of the facts was filed by W. T. Slater and by Claud Gatch. The petition was granted.

The application of Jean Morley to open the court's decree made one year ago, granting a divorce to Walter Morley, then plaintiff in the case in which Jean Morley was defendant, was denied.

G. M. Fry, plaintiff, versus Geo. E. Dorval, defendant, is a title of a foreclosure suit filed Saturday. Carson & Adams are counsel for the plaintiff.

In the case of D. L. Rowntree and H. Temple, plaintiffs, versus John J. Coughlin, defendant, the court made an order authorizing H. T. Bruce, receiver of Rowntree, Temple & Co., to sell the property belonging to said company, to E. S. Lamport, for \$450, in accordance with a petition filed by receiver.

A notice of appeal to the circuit court from an order and decree of the county court made June 27, 1901, was filed by Mrs. Minnie Stephens in the matter of the estate of W. A. Stephens, deceased. The order and decree denied the petition of the plaintiff for the appointment of administratrix of said estate.

In the case of Robert G. Morrow versus G. P. Gregory, et al, foreclosure, leave was granted to amend the complaint, by striking out the name of G. P. Gregory and adding allegations.

FRUIT PACKERS VERY ACTIVE

Peach Plum and Apple Shipments Now in Progress—Fruit Dryers Getting Ready.

The fruit packing and commission houses are generally busy this week, some shipping fruit and others making preparations for the large crops this fall. At the Kurtz warehouse, appointments for the fruit dryer are being made. The dryer has a capacity for five hundred bushels daily and a supply of drying trays is now being prepared.

J. G. Wright & Co. have just received a large shipment of Lord watermelons from California, which are in demand. They will begin packing peach plums tomorrow for shipment to British Columbia.

Gill & Co. are packing peach plums this afternoon, and will probably handle them the greater part of this week, for shipment to Denver. They shipped a car of apples to Texas today, but the supply in this line is not large this early in the season.

SALEM MILITARY BAND CONCERT.

Special Features to be Introduced as Each Entertainment.

The Salem Military band will give concerts at Savage's grove adjoining the Asylum grounds next Wednesday and Friday evenings beginning at about 7:30. Albert Shaw, the well known buglist, will do trick riding, as a special feature of the entertainments. Following this an electric stereopticon will exhibit a varied collection of views, including pictures of the Paris exposition, the battle of Manila, the sinking of the battleship Maine and views of Alaskan scenery. On Sunday afternoon from two until five o'clock the band will give sacred concerts.

SOUTHERN REPUBLICS GROWING AMICABLE

Measures for Suspension of Martial Law Being Generally Agreed to

New York, July 29.—A dispatch to Herald from Buenos Ayres says: The Senate has approved the proposal of Senator Pelligrini for the suspension of martial law and the chamber will undoubtedly agree to it at once. The government is in no way opposed to the motion.

The Peruvian Minister has conferred with the Minister of Foreign Affairs. It is understood that the Peruvian Minister declared Peru would follow whatever policy Argentina might adopt. A dispatch from the Herald's correspondent in Santiago de Chile says the Chilean postal administration has declared that Argentina's diplomatic correspondence will be sent to the Argentine legation offices and not by the Chilean postal authorities. The Minister of War has directed the Argentine Legation in Washington to send here a thousand pairs of boots because of the defects in the boots sold by the Argentine manufacturers for the use of the army.

The Herald's correspondent in Rio Janeiro sends word that Rear Admiral Crowther has given an entertainment on board the cruiser Atlanta. There were present the president of the Republic, Ministers of the diplomatic corps, numerous officers of the Brazilian army and navy and many families of the highest social standing.

BROOKLYN BRIDGE ALL SAFE AGAIN

New York, July 29.—Full traffic and car service has been resumed on the Brooklyn bridge. Crowded bridge trains and surface cars passed over all day Sunday and the scene seems to have made a lasting impression on the public mind. Plans for a new truss for the structure are now under consideration by the department of bridges.

The World says it learns from the highest authority that the plans for the new truss have been drawn and that prior to the finding of the break the attention of the department was to have been called to the fact that if the bridge was to continue to be used as at present and was to receive the loads in the future, a new truss would be an absolute necessity.

HORSES DYING OF GRIPPE.

A Large Number Disabled and Measures Taken to Prevent an Epidemic.

Chicago, July 29.—The Chronicle says: A large number of the horses in Chicago are said to be afflicted with the grippe and the disease has taken such a severe form in some localities that it has been necessary for owners to stop using their horses and put them under the care of veterinary surgeons. Thus far the disease has not been fatal to an alarming degree, but it is said that the utmost care is necessary to prevent other complications setting in, which would place the horse beyond the power of human aid.

The disease has been raging in the east and there have been cases of it in Chicago but it did not become epidemic until a few days ago.

FEUD ENDS IN TWO DEATHS.

TRINIDAD, Colo., July 29.—Phil McWilliams, a ranchman living a few miles below Fort Collins, was shot and killed by Paerce and his son Charles Paerce. In the fight that occurred at least a dozen or more shots were exchanged, the Paerces shooting McWilliams' horse under him. The shooting is the outcome of an old feud.

CONNECTICUT PEACHES.

HARTFORD, Conn., July 29.—Today begins the harvesting of the Connecticut peach crop, which is a very favorable one as to quality and quantity. It is estimated that the yield will be 1,000,000 16-quart baskets, worth about \$2,000,000. The greater yield is in Hartford, New Haven, Middletown and Fairfield counties.

BUFFALO, July 29.—Elks are conspicuous here today for their numbers. It is stated that more are gathered for the Pan-American than ever got together before. A most elaborate programme of entertainment has been arranged.
