EDITORIAL.

Printing the statement, that judging from the catalog of the Eugene Divinity school, it was hard to tell whether it supplied a faculty to the State University or whether the State University supplied a faculty for the minister factory, has thrown the papers up there into a confusion fit. The party organ uses its usual last resort argument, that the writer who dares to criticize the Eugene established order is mentally defective, and as THE JOURNAL has a monopoly on pepper and salt it gets the coarsest articles hurled in its direction. Any smoothy who says yes, yes, to every skink in a literary genre, and is invited to address the students. The Guard is wiser in its way. It printed THE JOURNAL's dissection of having a lot of five-toed frog materialism worked off on a theological seminary, and damped it with headlines, and the faint praise of a censorious paragraph, in which it boldly asserted that none of the professors of the State University did any teaching at all in the Divinity school, advertised to be on the edge of the campus. It does not deny that Straub, Washburn, and other University professors are advertised as being THE faculty of the Divinity school, but it says they don't do any teaching. That is pretty rich when it is considered that the Divinity school turns out regular graduates in a theological course, and their diplomas authorizing them to preach must be signed up by this faculty or they are an empty form, null and void, binding in neither this world or any other.

The Register's reply is not to the spirit of the matter, but in effect that THE JOURNAL is crazy and as Dr. Palm, former superintendent of the asylum, is said to be a partner in the paper, it is no doubt true. The reply of the Guard is not logical and convincing as an argument. In fact, it gets in up to the neck and can't hold for help, when it says the faculty of the Divinity school don't teach classes in the Divinity school. They must teach them in the University proper, and that is contrary to the statute and the constitution of this state, which forbids such thing, but of course, with great educators and teachers of morals and divinity that is too small to count. The regents recently removed a Y. M. C. A. building scheme as a bone of contention, on the ground that state property could not quarter a religious institution, but it seems they have not yet butted in against the theological faculty. When they take up the matter they will probably not take the statement of the Eugene papers but of the Divinity college catalog, as to whether the Professors of the University are acting in the double role of the state educators and theological skin-grafters.

The sole issue raised by THE JOURNAL is this: Has the Divinity school at Eugene a legal right to advertise any attachment to the State University? That it does so advertise, its own pamphlet proves. Their leading card is that the Divinity school is connected, associated, affiliated, or some other old thing, with the State University. That is its strong suit card, and it has been played so strong that at the last commencement exercises held in the Campbellite church at Eugene the President of the State University rather ironically confessed that he could hardly

tell whether he was President of the University or of the Divinity school. Of course, this must be taken as playful humor, or it would be the last camel for the president and faculty of the University. THE JOURNAL has the highest regard, for their energy and executive ability, and this criticism is not directed against them personally but to save the state from harm, and to let no wrong be done through ignorance to the cause of education or the interests of religion, for under the constitution all are to be protected against charlatanism. Why should any denomination seek to hitch up in partnership with the state? It will only be to the detriment of both. Calling this paper a liar is poor argument from editors living under the shadow of a divinity school on the edge of a university campus.

NEWSPAPERS AND FRIENDSHIP

The Toledo (Ohio) Bee says there are many things about people that the newspapers don't know, and a great many that they know but don't publish. There are also many things about a newspaper that some people don't know. One thing many men do not seem to get through their heads is that a newspaper is not run on the lines of friendship, nor run as a medium through which an editor may abuse his enemies and protect his friends. The newspapers that permit such prostitution of its columns cannot retain public confidence, for it then becomes a partial judge and a prejudiced advocate.

Individuality is all right, but it should be individuality of the newspaper policy, not that of an editorial writer or news gatherer. The most important function of a newspaper is to publish the truth in the interest of the whole people. When it suppresses legitimate news to shield an individual, no matter who he may be, or colors comment for the purpose of warping public opinion, the newspaper is dishonest. And honesty is the best policy in this as in any other legitimate business.

Dr. Koch, the great German specialist has expressed the opinion that tuberculosis can not be transmitted from animal to man through dairy products, and this has set the medical fraternity by the ears. It is too bad to upset a theory which has been the source of so many exquisite thrills of terror on the part of nervous hypochondriacs. The dread of the deadly bacillus has worried many useless people into their graves. Why show it to have been all a mistake? The first thing we know some medical iconoclast will arise and say that the person who lives rightly and pays reasonable attention to the common-sense rules of health has little to fear from any microbe that ever wriggled its tail; that nature, if given a reasonable chance will combat most of the germs in which humanity fairly wallows from the cradle to the grave.

Report of Fire Chief.

I respectfully call your attention to the following matters relating to my department, and which I think deserving of your immediate consideration:

The black mare "Beas" of the hose-wagon service, is in a critical condition. She is 21 years old and has done about 13 years uninterrupted service. She is failing rapidly and can not be counted upon from one day to another: she is lame and stiff and cannot make an ordinary run except under the whip, a condition, in view of her long and faithful performance, that should not obtain her shoulders are badly affected, and her throat is becoming visibly worse, day by day, by reason of the increasing congestion of the glands. I recommend that she be sold and another animal be placed upon the wagon.

I also, respectfully recommend the purchase of 300 feet of fire hose, some of the oldest of the hose now in service, constantly giving out, section by section, three sections having burst at the drill on the evening of July 31st, last. This has been cut off and the couplings reset but it shortens and weakens the service of the hose.

I recommend the appointment of W. B. Landon to be hoseman in this department, vice Peter Graber, resigned.

New York, Aug. 7.—The United States Steel Corporation paid to its stockholders today a dividend of 1 1/4 per cent on its preferred stock. September 14 next it will pay a dividend of 2 per cent on the common stock.

The event has attracted politicians here from all parts of the state and the enthusiasm of these as well as the delegates in general is very expressive.
