PRISONER IN THE COUNTY JAIL

Losing His Mind as a Result of Long Confinement and Great Trouble.

A. T. Zumwalt is gradually losing his mind. He has been incarcerated in the county jail for the past four months, and is apparently the victim of adverse circumstances. He was arrested in March, of this year, on the charge of threatening to do his wife bodily harm. At the preliminary examination he was bound over to appear before the grand jury. At a previous examination on almost the same charge, the case was dismissed. Bail was furnished by Turner men, who after three weeks withdrew their bond and he was taken to jail. This position undoubtedly causes great unrest of mind, to be in jail on the charge of attempting to injure his wife and with no friends to furnish his bail. Yet it is thought by his physician and the jailer that his greatest trouble is the fact that he is suspected of the murder of Jas. Lyons, who was killed by an unknown party about 2 years ago, while sitting in his store at Lyons, the shot being fired through the window.

These two matters combined have caused him such mental anguish that his mind has almost failed. He is so weak that at times he falls down while walking the floor and he has often told his fellow prisoner that he will kill himself, that his life is a miserable failure, etc. Yesterday he asked that his wife be telegraphed to send him photographs of herself and children, as he wished to see them once more and had not long to live. Sheriff Durbin is of the opinion that unless relief is obtained very soon it will be necessary to have him examined for insanity. He is certainly in very bad condition, and should have early attention.

The reason he is being so long detained in jail is due to the fact that the jury before which he was tried at the June term of court failed to agree, but the panel had been discharged by Judge Barnett before the jury in the Zumwalt case in with its disagreement, hence the court set the new trial for the October term. This delay and consequent confinement has been most severe on the prisoner, and it is to be hoped that he may be afforded relief before his health is entirely ruined and his usefulness destroyed.

JUSTICE CASE DISMISSED

The assault and battery case set for hearing in Justice O'Donohue's court today was dismissed on motion of the prosecuting attorney. A warrant was issued yesterday evening for the arrest of John Jordan, of North Salem, on the charge of a man named Inman. An investigation proved that the man assaulted was trespassing at the time. It is only a neighborhood row and a trial would probably have brought no important results.

OUTDOOR CONCERT TONIGHT

The concert to be given at Eastwood park, Savage's grove, tonight will undoubtedly be the most entertaining of the season. The program prepared is elaborate and excellent throughout. It will begin at the usual time.

SALEM VISITED BY THUNDER SHOWERS.

This morning about seven o'clock the people of Salem awoke to the realization that they were enjoying what is a rare treat hereabouts—a real thunder shower. After a few ominous roars there was a gentle shower for an hour and it has remained cool and cloudy all day. It had been noticed by old timers that for several days past some light clouds were veiling in from the south, which is a sure sign of rain at this season. It is also generally recognized that where rains are accompanied by thunder, during the summer that they are of short duration.

An Idaho Fire.

SPOKANE, Aug. 7.—Fire last night destroyed nearly \$10,000 worth of property at Kellogg, Idaho. The stores burned were mostly branch houses of Wardner firms.

Klondike Shipments.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—The Sub-treasury today paid out \$1,200,000 in assay office checks for the account of Seattle, San Francisco and New York, representing the gold shipments from Klondike.

MEMBER NAVAL BOARD

Boston, Aug. 7.—Lieutenant-Commander Nathan Sargent, U. S. N., will soon receive orders detailing him from the command of the gunboat Machias, it is said, and requesting that he go to Washington to report to Admiral Dewey for service as a member of the general board of the navy of which the Admiral is president. Commander Sargent will, it is understood, be Admiral Dewey's aide. Commander Sargent's long sea service of 18 years and his excellent record during his connection with the navy, were considered when the appointment, it is said.

English Railways.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—According to the Tribune's London correspondent, with the exception of the Great Western, all the leading English railway companies have now issued their reports for the last half year and the results are about on the lines expected by those who have carefully watched trade conditions of the last six months. Industrial activity has contracted and there has consequently been a marked falling off in goods and mineral traffic. All lines show heavy declines in their dividends. Since 1895 the capital of British railways has increased by the sum of \$875,000,000, the greater part of which ought to have come out of the earnings. It is considered that the British railway managers and directors ought to follow the American system of not paying the last penny in dividends but at present the tendency is to borrow money for every small improvement.

Republican Convention.

Cedar Rapids, Ia., Aug. 7.—The Republican state convention met today. Contrary to the determination expressed yesterday, Cummins' men made a hot fight before the committee on credentials, and when the convention met the struggle was still on. The Lieutenant-governorship has become involved and as some dark horse may be sprung at the last moment by the Cummins' men, no accurate estimate can be made in advance of a vote on that proposition. The roll of congressional districts was called to secure the names of various committees and adjournment was taken until afternoon.

Anarchists Theater

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Large red placards were posted throughout Paterson, N. J., announcing that the "right of existence," group of anarchists will produce at the American Theater here on Sunday August 18, a grand tragedy called "The Assassination of King Humbert I." The play will depict Bresci drawing the fatal shot at a meeting of a group, his journey to Italy, the scene of assassination and Bresci's imprisonment and suicide.

Cut His Throat.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—John Hall, a professional singer cut his throat last night under the window of the young woman he had asked to be his wife and who rejected his suit. He had gone to the young woman's house to serenade her, but she ordered him away. He walked a few steps, sang a bar of the song "Because I Love You," and then slashed his throat with a razor. He will probably die.

Fosburg Mystery.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—William R. Hagen, ex-chief of the Federal Secret Service who is now employed by the Fosburg family in an effort to run down the murderer of May L. Fosburg in Pittsfield, is in the city holding a conference with Commissioner of Police Murphy. It was said that the two discussed a clue to the case, but both Mr. Murphy and Mr. Hagen declined to disclose anything.

Horses Burned.

PORTLAND, Aug. 7.—Fire early this morning destroyed the livery and feed stables at the corner of sixth and Couch streets, together with about 40 horses. Loss \$30,000.

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Mines Sold.

BAKER CITY, Aug. 7.—Today the Belcher group of mines, of the Alamo district, was sold by the former owners, Larsen, Denton & Stearns, to the Dalles Gold Mining and Milling Company, a composed of Eastern capitalists, for a consideration of \$80,000. The Belcher group is in the vicinity of Red Boy and has about 1000 feet of development work. Six claims are included in the group. It is the avowed purpose of the new management to inaugurate new development work and erect soon a plant for treating the ores of the property.

Student Missing.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Miss Amanda Gattlin of Nashville, Tenn., is missing and relatives are now in the city trying to find her. She came here for the purpose of completing her studies. Early in June it is said her baggage was sent to Greenwich, Conn., from the hotel where she had been staying, but up to the present time no trace of the young woman has been found at the Connecticut town.

Day's Last Races.

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 7.—Twenty-five thoroughbreds from the Bitter Root stock farm in the late Marcus Daly, will be shipped this week to Kentucky and Indiana for the last races ever to be run by the Daly horses under the Daly colors.

Alaska Gold Strike.

SEATTLE, Aug. 7.—A Russian correspondent tells of the discovery of a rich vein of copper ore twenty-five miles from Dawson. A new strike of gold is reported on Glenn Gulch on the American side near Kampt.

HOW IT WAS DONE

Officer of the Smelting Works Tells of the Stolen Gold Bars

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7.—A. J. Ralston, of the Selby Smelting Company works, stated this morning that he had heard nothing of a definite nature from the heads of the detective agencies having men at work on the robbery case. Ralston, stated that a reward of \$5,000 has been offered for the capture of the men.

An official of the Selby Smelting Works made the following statement to a representative of the Associated Press regarding the robbery:

"The robbers must have succeeded in entering the vault some time between the hours of midnight and 5 o'clock this morning. They got in through a hole about the size of a manhole in a boiler, and the indications are that the robbers had been working on the scheme for some time. Over 150 holes were bored in the bottom of the vault, and the workmanship shows that mechanics of more than usual ability superintended the job. The holes were bored to within a hair's breadth of the surface, and when the proper time came the plate was forced up, thus giving the robbers access to the treasure.

The plotters first excavated a hole alongside the building, directly in line with the vault. The work of excavating must have taken some time, and at the end of each night's work a cover of laths, rubber sheeting, and sacks was made, the whole being concealed with a layer of dirt. What became of the excavated dirt we have been unable to find. It must have been removed in sacks. The covering was not strong enough to hold a man, but the digging was done so close to the building that the men never walked over it. We are satisfied that the plotters were aided by some one thoroughly familiar with the system employed at the works, and one fully informed as to the construction of the vault.

Last night one of the watchmen employed at the premises heard noises inside the vault and informed his fellows that the devil or ghosts were inside the vault. They laughed at him and made no investigation, and thus the robbers were left unmolested at their work.

"Inside the vault were several sacks containing \$100,000, but these were not touched. It may have been that the men became alarmed. They also left two bars of great value on the beach in their haste to embark.

"It is impossible for us to say at this time what way the men went. If they used a steam launch to leave the scene of the robbery they could have gone in any direction, but if they escaped in a rowboat they would doubtless have taken the direction in which the tide was running.

"Several broken drills and an oil can, such as is used by cyclists, have been found in the hole.

The thieves had taken the precaution of fastening the door of the vault from the inside, so that it would be difficult to open from the outside in case they were interrupted in their work.

The robbers also sprinkled red pepper in the tunnel to make things as uncomfortable as possible for anyone who might attempt to pursue them.

Ralston stated that his Company would be responsible for every cent of the stolen bullion, and that a settlement with the consignees would be made as soon as the affairs of the Company could be adjusted. The Company is rated by commercial agencies as one of the strongest on the coast.

Consul Grafted.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—John V. Burr, of Putnam, N. Y., formerly Quartermaster on the steamer Meteor, has arrived here from Rio Janeiro on account of sickness. Burr says he will file a complaint with the department against the United States Consulate at Rio. He says that when he left the Meteor which was bound for San Francisco from Toledo, O., the Captain told him he had deposited \$25 with Deputy Consul General Hall. When he left the hospital, Burr says he applied for the money but only received \$47. With this he secured passage to this country and had only \$2 left when he landed in Brooklyn.
