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EDITORIAL.

Here's the editor's idea of a nerve restorer—no patent:

Letting in the orchards.
Lolling on the grass.
Letting world and worries
To oblivion pass.

The biology and bacteriology cranks are preparing to reap a harvest out of so-called intelligent people who read newspapers. The big three-ring circus tent dailies are filled with Dr. Koch's latest discovery that humans can't get consumption from animals, but they now claim that you get it from the bacilli in the desiccated sputum, and the sputum is something out of sight, floating in the air. The great Dr. Koch is also the father of another discovery, that the human sputum can give tuberculosis to birds, guinea pigs and rabbits but hardly ever to dogs, but they haven't found out yet that they can give it to vegetables, so the cabbage and sauerkraut are safe articles of diet yet awhile. All the biologists are calling in question Koch's latest discovery, that we can't catch consumption from cows or other animals. Most of these fellow don't believe anything but are continually supplying the rest of the world with beliefs that cost them a pile of money, make no end of trouble and expense and then are later on discovered to be false. For twenty years the world has been asked to believe that we were in constant danger of getting bacilli and microbes that were the direct cause of consumption from the milk we drank, and these wasn't even any kind of cheese, perfectly immune unless it was Limburger, and that had its own class of inhabitants whose rich flavor drove out all the other bugs and could be eaten with impunity. Thousands of head of dairy cows were killed on the order of some veterinary, who is now told it was all a mistake and that by no possibility can we catch tuberculosis from cattle. The great divines who erected a wall between animals and humans, that can never be crossed by any sort of scientific quackery, looked after this matter of bacilli. While the alleged scientists have been following a theory that these little microbes were transmissible from beasts to people, and that rats carried the plague, and the "harmless necessary cat" was a walking storage battery for diphtheria, and the mosquito retailed malaria germs. The Almighty who created the universe, and made man but little lower than the angels, knew better all the time, and if they had consulted spiritual wisdom instead of Dr. Koch any of them might have known the truth about the matter. Now Koch has discovered his discovery and they have got to chase after him in the opposite direction and get up some new way to skin the public on the biological theorem. Koch's latest discovery is about equal in point of importance to that of a man who had been planting onion sets wrong end up for twenty years and then filled the newspapers with accounts of how he had got it through his head at last it was all a mistake. We have been catching bovine tuberculosis for twenty years that we couldn't catch, and yet there is no apology, no reparation, no paying the bill for cattle killed or human lives lost on the part of the profession, and the state will go on paying a professor of Biology \$3000 a year to help along this fraud. Much as is said by material scientists about the charlatanism of Mrs. Eddy, if she had turned square around in twenty years on so vital a matter as Koch's bacilli theory, all these professional men would vote to send her to the nearest electrocutionist and they would be right. But the bacteriologists and biologists and etiologists and all the other money-making nigger in the woodpile professions of so called natural sciences, which are little more than discoveries that some previous discovery was a mistake, will chase after some new shadow-picture to hunt the people, they pretend to doubt Koch's latest discovery, that animal tuberculosis is not transmissible to humans, and say the "question of immunity is hedged about my subtle conditions," to leave you hanging in the air and leave some excuse for the cow-doctors to kill fine herds for the fees there is in it. In the meantime the public can read the controversy that will rage columns pro and con in the big dailies until the readers won't know whether they belong to the race of Adam and Eve or to the cattle of the field.

Binger Hermann is opposed to forest reserves. Cap. Ormsby is opposed to forest reserves. Hermann reports against them. Ormsby never recommended one to be enlarged. The whole Oregon push is against these big timber land frauds, as anyone might know. They always have been against anything that could be jumped up by anybody who had a mind of his own and could state the matter clearly enough for the comprehension of Siwash politicians. All you've got to do is let these fellows know what you are against and if they can understand you they will agree with you. But they are against forest reserves like the lawyer who went to heaven—not enough to interfere with the steal going on. So Cap. Ormsby told the Oregonian reporter the other day that he had never recommended the enlargement of the Cascade forest reserve, and if he had, in accordance with his own printed reports, Binger Hermann never would have endorsed it and would like as not have discharged him instantly. But it seems the Oregonian reporter at Salem has powers of observation that are strictly home-made, and dug up Mr. Ormsby's plain recommendation that twenty-three townships be added to the western end of the reserve. Of course, the report of Hermann, the Wizard, wouldn't lie about a little matter like 629,920 acres of public land, and his Superintendent of forest reserves at Salem wouldn't say he had fought like a tiger to keep that much more of the public domain from going into the grand bunco game called "protecting the sources of water supply," in a country where there is water enough to float Noah's ark a great share of the time, when he had written a letter urging that it put into the grand jackpot for the benefit on non-resident corporations and timber-land thieves. For twenty years this same gang of federal office-holders that elects senators and manages the people's politics in Oregon have been stringing the suckers in managing the public lands in the interest of syndicates and have been a kind of an aid society to encourage wholesale perjury. Going down the line mentally of our dear saviours of the people, at from three five thousand a year per save, where is there one that has ever laid a straw, not one poor little old last year's rotten straw even, that has ever registered the smallest baby mosquito kick, at the whole robbery of our public lands? No one has ever peeped effectively, but when you jump them up where it don't count they are dead with you, against the whole rotten business and their displays of royal flush indignation nearly reaches the boiling point until some newspaper man who isn't under the hypnotic influence of blind notices calls their bluff. This whole prickly proposition is kept out of the campaigns and all the tiddledown journalists bow their heads in silence while the grand steal of Oregon's best timber lands goes on. Nothing but the words of the palmist can do justice to such public servants who forget all about the people except when they are giving them newspaper spiel and think they won't be caught. They are described in the 6th and 7th Psalm: "For there is no faithfulness in their mouth, their inward part is very wickedness; they flatter their throat as an open sepulchre; they flatter with their tongue." And again: "Behold, he travaileth with iniquity, and hath conceived mischief, and brought forth a falsehood." Let the decent newspapers keep up their look for the wind blows chill across the moor for the whole aggregation of do-little windmill statesmen, and let the next senator elected from Oregon be a man with brains and the courage to expose this triple robbery of the state, the school fund, and the genuine homestead.

A New Play GARRETT O'MAGH.
