Doluge at the Penitentiary.
A new modern cow or dairy barn is
being put up on the road between the
penitentiary and the asylum. It is iso-
gon shape, about 60 feet in diameter and
25 feet high. It will contain two silos 9
feet in diameter and 26 feet high. It is
intended for 24 head of cows, with ample
storage capacity for a year's feed in the
way of hay, silage, milk feed, tubers, etc.
The work is being done by convict
labor and will cost about \$600 in ma-
terial, but would otherwise cost double
that amount.

About 25 acres of winter oats have
been cut, and will be put into sta-
ka forthwith. They also have about 25
acres of spring oats which will be cut
soon, and both lots will be threshed to-
gether.

About 800,000 brick have been moni-
ed, to be used for the state sewer. Our
