STATE SEWER

Plans for the Big Drainage System Being Perfected.

Contract to Be Let Soon for the Completion of Work.

The plans and specifications for the extension and completion of the State sewer up Center street are being rapidly completed by Hon. A. Geener, the engineer in charge, assisted by County Engineer J. W. Culver. The state has asked for bids, to be opened August 20, for the construction work. The state will furnish the necessary brick and superintend the work, which is to be pushed as far as possible this fall and completed by October 1, 1902.

The sewer is to be an egg shaped structure, made of brick with 45 inch walls, either 24x36 inches in size, according to bids, and is to be built from its present terminus north of the state house to a point midway between the asylum and penitentiary. The walls are to be cemented inside on the lower half and outside on the upper half. Under the sewer are to be laid two courses of four-inch drain tile, and there is to be a manhole at every intersection built on a concrete foundation. Where the sewer crosses Mill creek near Fourteenth street a steel pipe is to be used instead of brick, and the same is to be laid about four feet below the creek bed.

The securing of the right of way has been in the hands of A. O. Condit, who has completed his work. The private property crossed will be that of the Salem Flouring Mills Company, just east of Fourteenth street, and also that of Mrs. E. J. Colbath and Mrs. Conover to Eighteenth street. From this point the line follows Center street to Twenty-first street, where it enters upon the land of C. F. Royal. Thence it passes through Willamette Addition and across the land of E. M. Croisan to the state land.

RAILWAY FRANCHISE DISALLOWED

The petition for franchise for right of way for the establishment of the Oregon City Southern Railway Company was disallowed by the county commissioners on the ground that the county road is not the place for an electric railway.

The petition asks a franchise to the Oregon City Southern Railway Company for a right of way to be upon the most northerly and westerly twenty feet of the side of the county road known as the Wire road from the limits of the city of Salem to those of the city of Silverton for the purpose of constructing and operating thereon a railway for the transportation of freight and passengers. The franchise is to be for the term of 50 years and to grant to said railway company the right to construct said railway with all necessary side tracks and turnouts and to erect poles and string wires to transmit power. The franchise is to be conditioned upon the completion of the road in 2 years.

WEDNESDAY CONCERT AT EASTWOOD

Every number presented at the concert at Eastwood park Wednesday night was of great excellence and was thoroughly appreciated by the audience of several hundred people. The Asylum orchestra rendered some beautiful music, and the program throughout was much better than is usually heard at open air concerts. The Alpine Glee club, composed of the Messrs. Judd, Ekin, Snyder, Epley, Roth and Wenger, was an enjoyable feature, also the Stalwart Quartet, consisting of Messrs. Epley, Wenger, Snyder and Judd. Miss Raymond sang "Mid the Green Fields of Virginia" and the "Swanee River" quite well, and the illustrations were ably presented.

Albert Shaw's trick performances on the bicycle won great applause and admiration, some difficult feats being well presented. While everything on the program was good, the favorites were the trombone solo, "The Holy City" by Steelhammer, which is heard everywhere with delight, and the solos by Messrs. Snyder, Wenger and Epley. The ever popular selection, "Asleep in the Deep" was rendered by Mr. Snyder in a manner that elicited earnest applause. His rich baritone voice is perfectly adapted to this gem of song. The "Cuckoo Song" by Mr. Wenger was sung with an excellent expression and the coon melody by Dr. Epley was thoroughly ministered in the presentation.

First Load of Wheat.

SAINTS ROTTEN EGGED

Chicago, Aug. 8.—Battered with decayed eggs and pursued by a angry crowd, two followers of Dowie the faith healer fled through the streets of South Chicago last night and only by the aid of a friendly motorman of the Calumet line were allowed to escape. The supposed recognition by the crowd of one of the men as Henry Christensen, caused the hostile movement. It was Christensen's wife who died without medical assistance about two weeks ago from injuries received, the faith healers failing to save her. The throng rendered the published statements of her death bed sufferings, and they were in no humor to give the faith healers a cordial reception when they attempted to preach their doctrines on the street corners.

STRUCK BY BURNING TREE

Caused the Death of Abram Mosher Yesterday.

Abram Mosher was killed Wednesday evening near Halls Ferry by being struck on the head with a large piece of wood from a burning tree. He was hauling rails on the Dennes farm for E. B. Smith, who owns the place and was building a rail fence there. He stopped under a dry elder tree that was burning, to unload some rails, and a piece of burning wood about the size of a man's body fell from the top of the tree, a distance of at least twenty feet, striking him on the forehead and face. He was of course knocked down by the blow, but immediately arose and asked what had struck him, and soon after became unconscious, in which condition he remained until six o'clock when he died. He was struck at about 4:30. Dr. Butler of Independence was summoned, but only reached the place a few minutes before life was extinct, and could render no assistance. He pronounced the death due to concussion of the brain.

Mr. Mosher was about 74 years of age, and leaves an invalid wife and two sons and a daughter. They are Chas. Mosher of Oregon City, J. Mosher of Portland and Miss Bertha Mosher, residing with her parents. His two sons arrived here this morning, and at once went to the home near Halls Ferry. Funeral services will be conducted at Silverton Thursday at two o'clock. Deceased is an old soldier and a member of Sedgwick Post, G. A. R. of this city.

CHINESE BRIDE DEPORTED

HONOLULU, July 27, Via Victoria, B. C., Aug. 8.—A Chinese romance with which the United States exclusion laws cruelly interfered, will end tomorrow with the deportation of a young girl named Kam Yon on the order of United States Judge Estee. She arrived here from China three weeks ago claiming to be the bride of one Young Han, a wealthy Honolulu Chinese. At the trial of the case after she had been arrested for deportation, it developed that the wedding had been according to Chinese custom. The bride and groom had never seen each other and when the marriage took place she was in China and he in Honolulu. After arriving in Honolulu, Kam Yon managed to get an opportunity to marry Han again, this time in the regular way, but it was of no avail. Judge Estee decided that the Chinese marriage had not been completed and that he must decide the case according to the statutes, deciding that she was a single woman when she arrived in Honolulu. He ignored the subsequent marriage and ordered the woman deported and she was carried shrieking from the courtroom. Young Han decided to give up all his interest in Honolulu if necessary and take up his home in China with his bride.

AIRSHIP FAILURE

PARIS, Aug. 8.—M. Santos Dumont, the aeronaut, this morning again attempted to circle Eiffel tower. He succeeded in rounding the tower with difficulty. The balloon was then unable to make headway against strong winds and fell near a house in the vicinity, remaining suspended for some time. M. Santos Dumont was not injured.

A GOOD INDIAN

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 8.—A special to the Star from Lawrence Kas, says: Matthew P. Seattle, after whose grandfather the city of Seattle, Washington, was named, died here today of consumption. Seattle was an Indian, was a graduate of Haskell Institute, and was taking a course in law at the University of Kansas.

GALLOWES BUILT

SEATTLE, Aug. 8.—Murderer Nordstrom may not hang on the 23rd although the scaffold is being built. United States Judge Hannafor today modified his previously declined position and granted the motion of Nordstrom's counsel. The case is now just where it was two years ago.

RECORD BREAKER CRESCUS

New York, Aug. 8.—Interviewed at Poughkeepsie, N. Y., concerning Crescus and his chances, George H. Ketcham, of Toledo, O., owner and driver of the horse, said:

"Some people have a notion that I do not care to have him make fast time, but I am as anxious to have him break the record now as I have been heretofore. I do not think Crescus has reached his limit and if the conditions of weather and track are what they bid fair to be, I believe you will see a trotting record made here. The Hudson River track is fast and the rain has put it in excellent condition. It is a little soft near the pole, but that is to be all planned off before the race this afternoon. I weighed 174 pounds at Columbus last Friday, now I weigh 178, but expected to have reduced to 175 when I drive Crescus. The horse is in perfect physical condition and ready to do his utmost. I want a good, warm afternoon and an entire absence of winds."

Mr. Ketcham will receive \$1000 for this exhibition by Crescus. The horse will be shipped from here at once to Brighton Beach, where he will meet The Abbot in a special race August 15.

Confederates Reunion
SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Aug. 8.—Immense crowds are in attendance upon the annual reunion of the Confederate Veterans of Missouri, which will last three days. The exercises began at 1 o'clock this afternoon by a battery salute. The meeting was called to order immediately thereafter by Brigadier-General S. M. Kennard. Addresses of welcome will be delivered by Mayor Walker, Governor Doehery and Col. Hiram F., Phillips. Tomorrow there will be a grand military and civic parade. On the third day, which is the anniversary of the battle of Wilson's Creek, there will be an unveiling and dedication of a monument to the Confederate dead, erected by the Missouri Daughters of the Confederacy. The citizens of Springfield have been most generous in contributing to the expenses of the reunion and elaborate social functions are down on the programme.

Big Meeting.

UNION, S. C., Aug. 8.—A monster democratic meeting, being held here today and will continue through tomorrow. No less than eight counties are participating. Senators Tillman and McLaughlin a number of representatives in Congress and other distinguished men are present and are expected to speak. The two senators, who are not on speaking terms, have been notified that no personalities will be permitted, and it is expected that everything will go off in good order.

FREDERICK, Md., Aug. 8.—The colored people of Frederick and adjacent country are out in force today at Agricultural Park, to celebrate Emancipation day. Speeches and music are the features of the programme. Frederick colored people never fail to make a fête day of August 8, and this year they are eclipsing all previous efforts.
