**SOUTH CHICAGO MEN REJECT SHAFFER'S ORDER**  
Their Agreement With the Steel Company Requires Notice.  
**PRESIDENT GOMPERS MEETS MORGAN TO ARRANGE TERMS**

And it is Claimed That a Settlement is More Than Probable at an Early Date—Other Combinations of Capital Being Made.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 21.—The strike situation has not materially changed today. The promised break at the Carnegie property has not yet come.

CHICAGO, Aug. 21.—A statement addressed to labor organizations and to the public signed by 14 men who claim to represent the members of the Amalgamated Association employed in the steel works at South Chicago has been issued.

The statement is an extended argument in justification of the refusal of the South Chicago Company men to violate their contract with the Illinois Steel Company, which specifically provides that the wage agreement can be broken under no circumstances except by either party to the agreement giving three months notice of its intention, the notice to be given previous to October 1.

In conclusion, the statement says: "The principles of the union labor are as dear to us as any men in the country who earn their living by honest toil, but we do not think we should be expected to violate every rule of business integrity and personal honor for a matter of sentiment, for this is a time when we must not let our sympathy get away with our better judgment."

"It may not be generally known but the fact is we are supported by our district vice-president in our action in refusing to strike."

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, it was said in labor circles last night, expected in New York today and it was confidently asserted that Mr. Gompers either already had an appointment to meet Mr. Morgan or that he did not apprehend any trouble in making one. Terms of peace it is thought may be arranged at this meeting.

NEW YORK, 21.—A controlling interest in the structural iron and steel company of Baltimore has been purchased, says a special to the Tribune, by capitalists identified with the United Fruit Company of Boston. It is proposed to establish a shipyard in connection with the iron works. William T. Stillwell is the president of the Company.

**WINTERS GETS 15 YEARS**  
In the Penitentiary for Confessed Robbery of Selby Smelter.

MARTINEZ, Calif., Aug. 21.—Jack Winters, who got away with the \$320,000 in gold bullion from the Selby Smelting Works, and afterwards confessed, was sentenced today to 15 years at Folsom penitentiary. This action in view of the fact that Winters was promised immunity from punishment and a reward besides is causing much comment. Many consider this treachery in trapping Winters as a greater crime than the stealing of the gold.

**OIL FIRE GROWING**  
More Explosions and Flames Penetrating Everything.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 21.—The big oil fire of the Atlantic Refining Company Works of Point Breeze, is burning more fiercely today than at any time since the explosion occurred. This morning another tank exploded, the force of the explosion causing a big tank to careen, oil ran into a sewer which empties into the Schuylkill river. The flames will probably soon find their way to the river surface. All police boats have left, so they will not be caught by the burning oil when it flows into the river.

The Philippine Commission arrived at Laoag, North Luzon, yesterday and received an unusual reception, some of the delegates welcoming them having traveled 40 miles through a mountainous country. There are no signs of hostility to the American in the province.

The inhabitants have been struggling with the most tangled politics.

The military authorities advocated the appointment of an American for Governor of the province but they were opposed by a number of the delegates, who urged the appointment of a native. Among those supporting the contention for a native Governor was a faction led by Ex-Bishop Aglipay.

The commission appointed the candidate of the military authorities, but all the other officials appointed are natives with the exception of Lieutenant Curie, who was appointed Treasurer. A typhoon is threatening and the commission therefore shortened its session and is making haste to reach Aparri, Province of Cagayan, by sea before the storm breaks.

**MACHINE TICKET**  
Nominated According to State by the Pennsylvania Republicans.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Aug. 21.—Republican state convention met here today to nominate Judge Wm. Potter, of Pittsburg, for supreme court judge, and state representative Frank G. Harris, of Clearfield, for state treasurer. It was understood that the ticket would be dominated by acclimation. The platform commends the last legislature; concedes the right of labor and capital to organize and denounces "Yellow Journalism."

**COLOMBIA GUNBOAT IS SUNK**

COLOMBIA, Aug. 21.—News just received from Cartagena says that an open boat containing 9 men had arrived there and reported the Colombia gunboat Lapopa sank on leaving Savilla for Cartagena. Steam launches were dispatched to search for the Lapopa, but no trace of her was found.

**HEAD-END COLLISION KILLS FIVE**

JACKSONVILLE, Ill., Aug. 21.—The Chicago and Alton, "Hummer" from Chicago, was wrecked by a head-end collision with a way freight in the railroad yards at Prentice this morning killing five persons and injuring six others. The dead are: Conductor Sheehan, engineer John Adams, fireman and three unknown men who were on the tender.

A special train from this city took physicians to the wreck. The passenger engine and baggage car wrecked and the other coaches were derailed.

**AMERICAN ENGINES**

KINSTON, Jamaica, Aug. 21.—Another heavy test of the respective merits of English and American locomotives on the railroad here have resulted in a great victory for the latter.

**FRANCE CUTS OFF DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS WITH TURKEY**

Constantinople, Aug. 21.—French ambassador M. Constant, has notified the Sultan's first secretary that all diplomatic relations between France and Turkey are broken off, and the ambassador has informed his government to this effect. The ambassador justifies his action on the ground that the Sultan broke his promise given Thursday regarding the purchase of quays and the settlement of disputed French claims.

**CHINESE ROYALTY**  
Refuse to Come to Peking Because Foreign Troops Are Still There.

PEKING, Aug. 21.—The British troops who have been here since last year are leaving and are being relieved by new commands. Three companies of the Fourteenth Sikhs and a battalion of the Sixth Burma has arrived. Colonel Carey replaces Colonel Alexander as commander in Peking.

The failure of the British to evacuate Peking annoys the Chinese officials. They alone refuse to permit Yuan Shih Kai's troops to enter Peking, though only two of the 12 proposed posts are within the former British section.

Chinese officials congress that the reason given for the court's delay in returning to Peking is a mere pretext. The excuse offered recently has been the bad condition of the roads, the heat, the infirmity of the Empress Dowager and the desire to celebrate her birthday at Kailang Fu. The real reasons are that the powers still retain supremacy in Peking and vicinity, and evacuation has not been accomplished.

Chinese censors are becoming obstructive. They have sent several memorials to the throne, especially denouncing the Chinese for assisting foreigners who thought their aid necessary in the administration of affairs in Peking.

**HAWKEYE DEMOCRATS**  
Hard up for a Candidate and Divided on Issues.

DES MOINES, Iowa, Aug. 21.—When the democratic state convention opened today, the name of a man to head the ticket was just as much a mystery as ever. The delegations called upon Cato Sels this morning, requesting that he reconsider his refusal to accept the nomination, but he declined to do so. To all appearances the question of re-affirming the Kansas City platform in the resolutions will be fought out on the floor of the convention. E. M. Sharon, of Scott county, was temporary chairman of the convention. In his address he said:

"Imperialism and trusts are the two great dominant evils of our national life. They produce two great issues which the democratic party must meet."

The committee on permanent organization selected ex-Mayor John Redmond, of Cedar Rapids, as permanent chairman.

**ALASKAN CABLES**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Colonel Dunwoodie, acting signal officer has received a dispatch from Captain Green at St. Michaels, Alaska, reporting upon the conditions of the Alaskan cable between St. Michaels and Nome City. It appears that this cable has been broken in several places and parts of it lost and destroyed. Captain Green says it would be wholly inexpedient for the government to spend money in repairing or to rent a new cable at this place.
