CHINESE SMUGGLING

Collector of Customs and Other Officers Arrested at Nogales.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.-Treasury officials have unearthed what they allege is a wide conspiracy at Nogales, Arizona, to admit Chinese to the United States.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 24.-William M. Hoey, arrested at Nogales, in connection with the Chinese frauds, was appointed from Muncie, Indiana. He is a former man in a steel mill. His appointment was regarded as a recognition of labor interest.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.-A number of Chinamen, who bought their way into the United States through the alleged connivance of Nogales officials is not known, but it is believed to be large.

Tariff on Porto Rican Goods.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.-Commissioner of Internal Revenue York has issued an amended regulation as to the treatment of goods imported from Porto Rico, in the course of which all he calls special attention to the fact that as articles of merchandise received from Porto Rico are not entitled to entry in customs bonded warehouses, and that temporary storage of such articles is for the purpose only of detaining the articles until the internal revenue tax due thereon has been paid.

Where distraint for such taxes becomes necessary, the Collector will, however, before distraint on such articles notify the Commissioner of Internal Revenue in order that proper instruction may issue to the Collector of Customs for the release of the goods for that purpose.

CUBAN POLITICS

Palma Asked to Express His Ideas of a Presidential Policy.

HAYAKA, Aug. 24.-The committee recently appointed by prominent revolutionary leaders to address a letter to Thomas Estrada Palma asking for a more specific statement from him regarding the program he would follow if elected President of the Cuban republic designated Juan Gualberto Gomez to draft the communication.

Referring to the matter Senator Gomez said the letter was private but was in the nature of advice to Senator Palma suggesting that he should make declarations on certain points of policy.

"The letter suggests to Senator Palma," continued Senator Gomez, "that he should declare that some clauses of the Platt amendment are objectionable to the Cubans and should be pledged himself, in case an opportunity arises, to work toward changing the same in harmony with the United States Government."

"In reference to the payment of the Cuban army the letter advises Senator Palma to declare that all claims will be thoroughly examined before they are recognized."

"He is also invited to declare that Cuba cannot afford to grant very liberal tariff concessions to the United States for some time as she needs the customs revenue, being at present to raise the internal taxes."

Teachers From Cuba. NEW YORK, Aug. 24.-The party of Cuban teachers who have been students at the Harvard University summer school since July 18, have come to the United States upon the invitation of the Harvard authorities, have arrived in New York by steamer Boston.

Howison Sustained. WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.-Acting Secretary Hackett today received a reply from Admiral Schley to the letter recently submitted to him by the Department declining a question. Rear Admiral Howison as to the authenticity of the alleged interview with him reflecting upon Admiral Schley. The reply was sent to Captain Lemley, Judge Advocate General of inquiry.

Brigham Young's Widow. HELENA, Mont., Aug. 24.-Mrs. Zona Young, first wife of the late Mormon apostle Brigham Young, passed through Helena today on her way to Salt Lake. Mrs. Young is dying from a stroke of paralysis. It is doubtful if she will be able to reach Salt Lake City alive.

A Royal Actress Coming. NEW YORK, Aug. 24.-It is announced that the Baroness Kathie Schrafft of the Holburn Theater in Vienna will appear at one of the Broadway theaters in this city during the coming season. The Baroness, besides being a prominent German actress, has come into consideration recently by reason of the report that she had contracted a morganatic marriage with the Austrian Emperor Franz Joseph.

Niggers Must Go. SAVANNAH, Ga., Aug. 24.-The citizens committee decided that all negroes out of the Creek blood must leave Sapulpa by 3 p. m., Monday next. Notices to this effect were posted today. The Negroes will probably respect the edict. A local banker has taken up the cause. The committee's order is the result of an influx of negroes from other towns, and two felonious assaults by negroes.
