Articles so stored, therefore, will not be entitled to withdrawal in bond for export or for transfer to another district, and no al-lowance can be made for leakage, shrinkage or other loss; nor will permit be issued for the sampling of articles so held. In case of failure of the owner or consignee to pay the tax due, the Collector in whose district the goods are stored will report such tax for assessment, and will proceed to collect the same as in the case of other assessed


