COUNTY JUDGE ABSENT

What Should be Done to Pro-
vide for Such Temporary
Vacancy.

A Correspondent Suggests
Several Alternatives for
the Dilemma.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—County Judge
Scott is again ill, and it is stated by his
friends that he will not be able to hold
court before October first. This is a most
unfortunate circumstance, in which Mr.
Scott has the sincerest sympathy of his
friends and the public generally.

There is a feature about his absence
from the court house that interests the
whole community, and in fact the whole
state. During the absence of a county
judge from the county seat, whether
caused by sickness or any other circum-
stance, no business can be transacted in
the probate department, and the com-
missioner's court is badly hampered.

Many are of the opinion that the legis-
lature should provide that either the
circuit judge or county clerk could act in
his stead in probate and other matters
during the absence of a county judge in
any county, and such a provision would
not doubt be a great convenience to the
public, as well as a fortunate thing for
the county government.

For instance this week there was a
joint meeting of the Marion and Linn
county courts to consider the Stayton
and Jefferson bridges. This meeting
had been advertised before the absence
of Judge Scott, and when the day came
for the meeting he was unavoidably de-
layed by sickness. Thus it became nec-
essary for the two commissioners to
meet along with the entire court of Linn
county, giving the latter three votes to
two. Had there been any occasion for
contesting a point, and there was a
large sum of money appropriated by
that joint meeting, our court would
have been in a helpless minority.

The suggestion that the county clerk
performs these duties in the absence of
the judge meets with a few objections,
inasmuch as that official upon some oc-
casions acts in conjunction with the
judge, as in the board of equalization,
and for this reason it is believed that
the services of a circuit judge should
be required for the work. There is also
an objection to that, inasmuch as a
circuit judge serves for a number of
counties, and in some instances under
such circumstances he would not be
serving for his own or home county.

These points are simply given for the
consideration of the public, and for the
purpose of pointing out the necessity of
some relief to counties under such cir-
cumstances. REPUBLICAN.

NEW YORK MARKETS

Reported by Latest Circular
of Henry Clews & Co.

Immense Exports of Past
Year and Good Outlook for
Farmers.

The stock market is under the control of very conflicting influences. Owing to developments, such as the strike and corn crop failure, which were entirely beyond human foresight the bull movement received a setback from which it has not yet fully recovered. Prices soared to sky-rocket altitudes in May and June, and the recessions which have since followed have not brought securities down to near the bargain level, not a few favorite stocks still being quoted at very high figures from the investment point of view. Values continue under the influence of the community of interest idea, which is one form or another is expected to make railroad securities safer and more profitable investments than heretofore. At present nothing but pure expectancy is sustaining certain stocks at a 300% per cent basis. When they come down to a 40% basis they will be nearer their true level.

The course of the money market from now on will be interesting. The surplus reserve last Saturday stood at \$18,421,900, compared with \$20,557,050 a year ago. The demand for crop purposes will soon assert itself, and we may look for a period of declining reserves until the end of October. The reduction of the corn crop will have little effect upon the demand for money, the higher prices for corn and the abundance of wheat offsetting the lessened inquiries from that source. General business promises to be fairly active; though it is questionable if it will exceed last year's volume. The loss from corn damage and the strike will inevitably cause some diminution of business in spots, even if the country as a whole does not suffer from these drawbacks. Bankers are generally anticipating a good demand for money at firm rates.

The most encouraging feature in the whole situation is the certainty of another good year of exports. Europe seems to have a shortage of 400,000,000 bushels of wheat and the United States a surplus of about 300,000,000 bushels. This insures us a good price for our wheat and a good haul for our railroads. It also strengthens the probability of gold imports, for Europe is comparatively bare of American stocks and cannot return them in considerable quantities.

We are still in the midst of a traders' market. The big holders and large operators are absent and seem content with keeping prices pegged at about the present level. Public buying is conspicuous for its absence, and the outlook is not for any special buoyancy until the monetary situation is more favorable. At the moment we advise profit taking on all sharp rallies.

The marvelous industrial development of the United States in recent years is not thoroughly appreciated by the average American as well as by Europeans, upon whom presses with irresistible force the expansion of our foreign commerce, as evidenced by the European press clamoring for protection against the invasion of even their home markets by American manufacturers and for combination tariff walls against us.

Some Big Oats.
Josh McDaniell, the veteran farmer of Polk county who has raised 57 crops of grain in Oregon, brought The Journal some six foot oats the other day which will probably thresh sixty bushels to the acre, and the editor has felt his oats ever since. This is no joke.
