Preparing for Work for the Forthcoming Year--Delegates to the State Federation.

How Cross-Roads Clubs and Country Women are Doing Good Work.

The Salem Woman's Club will soon take up its active work, and will do so under the most promising circumstances. The membership will include about twenty-five names, the departments are well organized, and the officers are competent. The members are decidedly enthusiastic over their work. Next week a club room will be selected and fitted up, all to be completed by the time for the first meeting, the second week in October.

The State Federation of Women's Clubs meets in Portland next month, and the delegates from Salem are Mrs. A. N. Bush and Mrs. K. S. Bean. Mrs. Dibble and Mrs. J. F. Calbreath were named as alternates.

The calendar committee completed its work several weeks ago, and all is in readiness, after the club rooms are secured, for the ensuing year's work.

There is scarcely a woman's club, especially in the smaller towns, but has done practical beautifying work through its civic or village improvement committees. There are plans too numerous to mention, specifically where trees have been planted along the thoroughfares, parks kept freshened with grass and flowers, and even cemeteries improved with drives and trees.

It is even more impressive to mention four state federations, at least, which have been instrumental in preparing the natural attractions of the country. There are the California club women who saved a bunch of big trees from the mercenary hand of the lumbermen. Colorado club women have just succeeded in leasing from the Indians a group of cliff dwellings and setting them aside as a state reservation. The palisades of the Hudson river have been rescued from the quarrymen by New York and New Jersey club women, and finally the

GOTHAM LETTER

New York Correspondent Discusses Yacht Races and Public Events.

New York, Sept. 13.—In spite of the fact that the approaching races for the America's cup is looked forward to eagerly by sportsmen, the contest is demeaned by fashionable hostesses who consider that Sir Thomas Lipton and his countrymen have upset their autumn social plans, and they freely express the hope that he will take back to England the "ugly little bit of silver" and put a stop, for a while at least, to these intrusions. Society's plans everywhere are based upon the contests, and the true little statement "barring the week of the cup races," is found upon all invitations to house parties, as well as upon replies.

Among the many men brought prominently before the public as the nominee for the New York City Mayorality this fall is Seth Low, president of Columbia College. Mr. Low has long been prominent in politics, particularly those connected directly with the metropolis, and stands a probable chance of becoming Gotham's next Mayor. Said a prominent lawyer a few days ago: "When ever I hear Seth Low spoken of as a Mayorality candidate, I always recall an incident of his school days. It was a commencement night of the Brooklyn Polytechnic in the Brooklyn Academy of Music and Seth had just been graduated at the head of his class, taking the valedictory. After the exercises were over, he came out of the stage door and stood looking up and down the street for a moment before joining his family. An old man came by and glanced curiously at the lighted building and the crowd coming out of it. Then he stepped up to Seth and said:

"My boy, do you go to the Polytechnic?"

"Seth drew himself up very proudly and answered: 'I did once.'"

Resolved never again to enter the ring, a failure at saloonkeeping, John L. Sullivan has begun his career as a book-maker, in partnership with Tom Castello. When asked how he liked it, the famous ex-champion replied:

"It's a good game so long as the guys don't beat you. Just tell me friends I ain't looking for a benefit, but if they think they kin beat me at this game, they can come to me as long as I get a cent. Tell them that your truly, John L. Sullivan, is on the level and a good fellow."

There are members of almost every known race working upon the great subway tunnel whose completion New Yorkers look forward to with mingled anxiety and pride; and there is no love lost between the different laborers. Visitors to the already famous passage were amazed the other day by the actions of an Irishman who had been placed at work with five Italians in a narrow trench. The quintette chattered in their own language incessantly. Plainly the Irishman, a big fellow with red hair and usually rascally face, was trying to understand them. For a minute he would drop his pick, lean forward, gaze at his fellow-laborers, then go back to work again with a ferocious frown. Gradually his impatience increased until he reached the limit. He then threw down the pick and rushed from the trench. In reply to the foreman's inquiries, with much gestulation and profanity Pat announced that he would not work with the "guineas" any longer. The foreman—who, incidentally, happened to be an Irishman, also—saw to it that the complainant was transferred.

It is rumored that William K. Vanderbilt, Sr., is in negotiation for the purchase of one of the most beautiful country seats in England. The place selected, according to the report, is in Hampshire, which will have the two-fold advantage of being within easy reach of the Solent and not too far from Blenheim, the palace of the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough, the latter of whom Mr. Vanderbilt's daughter, where Mr. Vanderbilt is always a particularly welcome guest.

Mr. Andrew Carnegie is not exempt from having record made of his obligations in New York County, by the lavish expenditure of his millions. A lien has been filed against his new mansion at Fifth avenue and Ninety-first street, by a company whose specialty is the beautifying of grounds, who allege that they have a claim on the property amounting to \$160,000 for materials and labor furnished in converting part of the Carnegie grounds into a miniature forest.

Park Commissioner Clausen, famous for his association with the paid park chair movement in Gotham, is much disappointed over the failure in his efforts to secure for the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the American Museum of Natural History exemption from the charter provisions which require heads of departments and others who handle money appropriated by the city to contract for supplies at public letting when the sum exceeds \$1,000.

One of the questions to be taken up by the New York Branch of the American Federation of Labor when meets in Syracuse next month, will be that of incorporating trades unions, as a result of the steel workers' and machinists' bodies. The unions of these trades broke agreements with the employers by striking, which they could not have done had they been incorporated.
