RUSSIAN CREDIT GOOD

LONDON, Sept. 21.—The Vienna correspondent of the Times quotes an article in the St. Petersburg Rossvia, which declares that Russia requires neither French nor English money. Her credit, says the article, enables her to place loans without difficulty in the international market.

Financial operations, the Rossvia declares, did not form the basis for the Franco-Russian alliance and it was not founded on political speculation on the part of either France or Russia. The alliance was formed by genuine friendship of the two great nations who assumed the task of co-operation in order to promote high moral purposes. The two powers would not refuse the friendship of any country ready to promote their great aim, which is to prevent a sanguinary collision between the peoples of the earth.

Starving Russians.
LONDON, Sept. 21.—A dispatch from Odessa to the Times in commenting on the failure of crops and absolute destitution of the people in Bessarabia (South-west Russia) during the last two seasons, owing to the dilatory and ineffective assistance given by the Russian government, says it is asserted that the government intends to thoroughly reorganize the local board system of rural Russia. Proposals with this object in view are said to be before the council of state at the present time.

"It is certain, anyhow," says the dispatch, "that until the local government boards are brought under the direct control of a central authority at St. Petersburg there can be little improvement."

SALEM MAN HONORED

Judge Wm. Ramsey of this city has been chosen as a delegate to the triennial convention of the Episcopal church held at San Francisco in October. There are four delegates from each diocese and this is an honor highly appreciated. Bishop Wistar Morris, the third oldest bishop in point of consecration in the United States, preaches the convocation sermon. Another honor for Oregon.

NORTHERN PACIFIC COLLISION

TACOMA, Sept. 21.—By the collision of two sections of a train, on the Northern Pacific line at Lake, yesterday morning, a number of persons were injured, one seriously. The cause assigned for the accident, is the failure of air brakes to work.

EDITORIAL.

There is a John Robertson who writes a great deal for the Sacramento Bee who ought to be suppressed as a public news paper correspondent. He takes an amount of space altogether out of proportion to the right of any person who does not want to assume the responsibilities of a newspaper publisher, and has written enough to have exiled him from any other government almost. In Russia he would certainly long since have gone to Siberia. But in this land of free speech and free press he has to be put up with and there seems to be no remedy for the John Robertsons, who are after all a kind of fictitious signature under which people write when they want to say things that they do not want people to attribute to a real person. Let us hope this is the case with our present Robertson, when he says: "The capitalist class is a parasitical class, a bloodsucking incubus on society, and must not own the means by which honest men make their living." Now we could put the words "parasitical" and "bloodsucking incubus" in capital letters and raise the hair of many timid people by pointing out what Mr. Robertson really means by "must not own the means." The plain truth is this Robertson has not analyzed his own words. He has not thought out his own thoughts to a conclusion. We will not strain the mind of the reader with a lot of political economy on what capital is or is not. But let us get right down to a practical application of what this man B. says and what he really is reaching. Suppose a capitalist, and any man or woman having \$500 of money that do not need for their immediate support is a capitalist, loans another that money to go into business, or improve a farm, or take a course in college. With that money the borrower, who has made the loan from the "blood-sucking incubus" succeeds in business, gets rich on the farm or gets an educa-

CONTEMPT OF COURT

Leads to Arrest of a Member of the Oregon Legislature.

Hon. G. W. Holcomb, Populist Citizens member of the last legislature, and Ralph Nachand, his night watchman were arrested Friday on a warrant issued out of Judge E. P. Boise's department of the State Circuit Court for Marion county. The defendants are charged with contempt of court, it being alleged that they violated an order, by Judge Boise on the 10th day of the present month, restraining the Oregon Packing Co., a corporation, from in any way interfering with the operation, by O. V. and W. K. Allen, of the fruit dryer and evaporator, belonging to said Alien Packing Co. and located on the corner of Twelfth and Trade streets, in this city.

On Tuesday last it was found that the piston had been removed from the stationary engine in the evaporator building. A search warrant was issued out of the Salem Justice Court and placed in the hands of Sheriff F. W. Durbin, and that officer found the missing property in the building occupied by the Alien Packing Co. It is alleged that the piston was removed by Ralph Nachand, the night watchman at the building, acting under the order of G. W. Holcomb, manager of the Oregon Packing Co. This being in direct violation of the injunction issued by Judge Boise, the defendants were arrested and placed under \$200 bonds each, to appear before the court next Monday at 11 a. m.

Later Judge Boise modified his order allowing Mr. Holcomb to go on his own recognizance, while Mr. Nachand gave bonds in the sum of \$200, with Mr. Holcomb as the surety.

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
