State of Oregon County of Marion ss Salem, Ore, Aug 21, 1901

ANOTHER MASSACRE PREVENTED

Luzon Filipinos Plotting Against Us.

Twenty Five Filipinos Killed in a Fight in Samar.

Major H. C. Dawes, Artillery Corps, Dead in 'Frisco.

MANILA, Nov. 5.—A plot to massacre the American garrison at Moncada in the province of Tarlac on the island of Luzon has been revealed by the wife of a conspirator. Several town officials are implicated in the plot. The woman hid a detective beneath the house in which the leaders were meeting. Arrests followed and incriminating papers were seized. The plan was to fire the house and when the soldiers came out to assist in the extinguishing the flames one hundred and fifty conspirators armed with bolos were to rush on the guard, capture their arms and massacre the garrison. Commissioner Wright will be acting governor during the convalescence of Governor Taft. The United States Philippine commission today passed treason laws.

MANILA, Nov. 5.—Advices from Tacloban, Capital of the island of Leyte report that the residents of various towns in the island have waited upon Brigadier General Smith and complained to him that the people are unable to procure food because of the blockade that is maintained along the Strait of San Juanico. General Smith replied that the strictest kind of a blockade would be continued until the people of Leyte brought in their guns and gave the authorities full information concerning the insurgents who infest the country. All the arguments of the officials of the towns were unavailing. General Smith has ordered the deportation of the wife of General Luklan, leader of the Samar revolutionists. Four native police officers were killed and their horses captured yesterday at Baybay, Island of Leyte. Lieutenant Julien F. Canjot with a detachment of scouts, encountered a body of insurgents southeast of Calabogon, Samar Island and in the fight which followed 25 rebels were killed. One hundred and seventy five houses were burned and 5000 pounds of rice and two thousand of palay were captured.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—Major H. C. Dawes, Artillery Corps, U. S. A., died last night at the Presidio, from an affection of the kidneys. Major Dawes arrived ten days ago from Manila on the transport Meade. He served with credit during the Cuban campaign.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—Lieutenant Commander E. J. Dorn, who was left in charge of affairs at Pango-Pango by commander B. F. Tilley when the latter came to this country on a visit some months ago has arrived here on sick leave.

Redmond Is Being Feted

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Mr. and Mrs. T. St. John gave a dinner last night in honor of John E. Redmond, M. P., chairman of the Irish Parliamentary party, and Mrs. Redmond. Among those present were John D. Crimmins, Miss Dalton, Sydney, Australia; Montague White, diplomatic agent of the late South African Republic; Mrs. Henry B. Plant, Admiral H. F. Grinnell, James J. Roche, of Boston, and John E. Mulholland, Miss Humphreys and William McAdoo, former assistant secretary of the navy.

SCHLEY ARGUMENTS CONTINUED

The Coal Supply, the Blockade Were Hanna's Themes.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Mr. Hanna continued the argument at the Schley court of inquiry this morning. He took up the question of the coal supply of the flying squadron and from that entered upon a discussion of the blockade of Santiago and the reconnaissance of May 31, when the Spanish Colon was bombarded in the harbor of Santiago. Hanna spoke generally contenting himself with outlining his conception of the purpose of the testimony. Capt. Parker addressed the court this afternoon in support of Schley. He had not concluded when at 4 p. m. the court adjourned.

BOERS GOT AWAY WITH THE GUNS

By Employing a Remarkably Clever Ruse

LONDON, Nov. 5.—Lord Kitchener in reporting further details of the recent engagement near Brakelagte, Eastern Transvaal, between Col. Benson's column and the Boers says: The Boers were unable to remove the guns they captured until a British ambulance went out when under cover of the ambulance the bargainers carried them off. The Boer losses were undoubtedly heavy but no correct estimate is obtainable. Commander Oppman was killed, and Chris Botha wounded. The Boers are reported to have behaved badly to the British wounded. Kitchener further reports that Cape Colony eastward of the Western railway is cleared of Boers with the exception of the Fouché Myberg Wessels command of 400 with which General French is dealing.

TWELFTH LOCKJAW VICTIM

St. Louis Anti-Toxin Has Cost Twelve Lives.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 5.—The twelfth death from telegrams resulting from the treatment of diphtheritic patients with anti-toxin supplied by the city occurred today when little Mamie Keenan succumbed. Three other children are in a critical condition.

Heavy Fog In London

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—According to the Tribune's London correspondent the return of November fogs in their blackest and most impenetrable form has increased public impatience over the delays in working out a system of electric transit underground. While the two-penny tube, the Waterloo and City and South London lines are liberally patronized in such weather, the suburban train service is more or less blocked, and a large section of the central belt of the metropolis has no other resource than the District and Metropolitan smoke tunnels. Meanwhile the wrangle over the best method of electric traction on the underground circuit drags along interminably.

EASTERN ELECTION REPORTS

Show Only Average Polling in the East

President Roosevelt Voted at Oyster Bay

Full Percentage of Colored Vote in the South

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—President Roosevelt voted at Oyster Bay today and then returned to this city.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 5.—The election reports indicate an average "off year" vote.

NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 5.—The election is proceeding quietly here. Both Republicans and Democrats are confident of success.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—A drizzling rain was falling this morning and a chill wind swept the streets. The early vote was seriously affected.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 5.—The new election laws do not appear to have proved a drawback as the usual percentage of colored votes are being cast.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 5.—Heavy vote was reported during the early hours of the polling. All indications point to rain.

BOSTON, Nov. 5.—With crisp fall weather the vote here during the early hours of today was hardly above average. Although registration was unusually heavy, reports indicate that in many districts the vote will be light.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 5.—Republican leaders concede the city to their opponents by 5000.

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 5.—Only county officers are being elected in Colorado. Interest is centering in this county, where Republicans and Democrats have waged a bitter contest. Both sides charge fraud, and both claim victory. Several scrimmages have occurred but no serious trouble. Several arrests have been made for illegal voting.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—The weather today is clear and cool here. It is expected that nearly the entire registered vote of 65,000 will be voted before 3 o'clock.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 5.—In this city and throughout the state the ordinary off year vote is being polled.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Scores of arrests for alleged irregular registration and non-observance of election laws were made during the day at the request of the state election deputies, but the majority of the men were discharged for lack of prosecution.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 5.—Indications are that the Democrats have made such gains as to insure the election of a majority of their candidates for the legislature which means the re-election of Governor as United States senator.

BOSTON, Nov. 5.—The first five towns reporting election returns gave a total of 580 for Crane, (Rep.) and 173 for Quayle, (Dem.) The same towns last year gave Crane, (Rep.) 595 and Quayle, (Dem.) 263. This shows a net Democratic gain of 23 per cent.

BURGLARS MAKE A BIG HAUL

They Get \$20,000 Worth of Diamonds in Cincinnati.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 5.—Early this morning burglars broke the show window of Duhaime Jewelry Co's store on Fourth street, and stole about \$20,000 worth of diamonds. In their flight they left a trail of diamonds indicating the direction they took.

CAILLARD WILL SEIZE MITYLENE

French Government Will Collect Its Bill by Customs.

PARIS, Nov. 5.—An official dispatch announces the arrival of Admiral Caillard's squadron this morning off the island of Mytilene. The squadron arrived

off the island of Mytilene yesterday, and received definite instructions from the French government to proceed to Mytilene, and to seize the customs' tolls of Mytilene and another port.

LATER—Admiral Caillard has occupied the three principal ports of the island of Mytilene.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—It is learned from a reliable source that France has not, up to the present, informed the triple alliance of any contemplated naval action in Turkey, says the Herald's Berlin correspondent.

The Tagblatt compares the attitude of M. Delcasse to that of Napoleon III in 1870. Like the Sultan, King William of Prussia had already yielded when France by arguing pressing new claims, critically embittered the situation.

MISS STONE IS ALIVE AND WELL

Was Seen Within Two Days by American Emissaries

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—A dispatch to the World from Samokov, Bulgaria says: Miss Ellen M. Stone and Mme. Telika have been seen within the last two days by emissaries sent by American Diplomatic Agent Dickinson from Sofia to treat with the brigands who abducted the missionaries about a ransom for the American woman. Both captives are well. It is expected that their release will be arranged soon.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—The State Department has received telegraphic advice from its agents in Turkey and Bulgaria who express the opinion that both Miss Stone and Mme. Telika were alive and well a few days ago.

A BODY WITHOUT A HEAD

Discovered in a Flour Barrel Near Chicago.

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—The body of a man whose head had been almost severed from his body was discovered in a flour barrel on a strip of prairie near Western Avenue today, and identified as Antonio Napoli, who with 25 other Italian laborers reached Chicago last night from Iowa Center, Iowa. Chief of Police O'Neil suggested that the man had been the victim of the vendetta.

BRITAIN ACCEPTS PROPOSAL

Or United States for the Hay-Pauncotote Treaty.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Ambassador Choate called upon Secretary Hay today, and had a long talk about the projected Hay-Pauncotote treaty. Lord Pauncotote the British Ambassador has notified Secretary Hay formally that the British Government accepts the American proposition relative to Clayton Bulwer treaty as a basis for new treaty.

RISEN FROM THE DEAD

Peter Maher Again Aspires to Pugilistic Fame.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Peter Maher has signed articles to box Jim J. Fords, of California next Friday night. Before the Eureka Athletic Club, Baltimore, in a ten round contest. About a month ago J. Fords and Maher met at Lancaster, Pa., for six rounds and the result was a draw. If Maher defeats J. Fords he states he will issue a challenge to box the winner of the J. Fries-Ruhlin fight.

ANOTHER SCRAP IS BREWING

Authorities of Panama are Now Exercised.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—A dispatch to the Herald from Panama says: General Alban, governor of Panama, has arrested Casar Fernandez del Rio, a native of Cuba and setting agent for the Pacific Mail Steamship Company. General Alban had learned, it is said, that compromising letters had been

A GREAT SAILING CONTEST Rival Boats Will Race for 3600 Miles.
