EDITORIAL

WHAT IS THE REAL BUSINESS SITUATION.

There are some local conditions in all parts of the country that are unfavorable. For instance, in Oregon the prairie crops are at a very low figure. Wheat all over the country brings the bottom price. But there are enough other products bringing good prices to make up more than average season of prosperity. Farmers are getting good prices for sheep, wool, cattle, dairy and poultry products, fuel, feed and all side products. Horses keep pretty well up. Money is cheap and plenty. Taxes are still abnormally high, and salaries of public officials are increasing all over the country out of all proportion to other increase of wages. Appropriations by congress and increasing nepotism and officialism are becoming a larger and larger burden, and it is to be hoped that the new President is not so devoted to another term as to smother all warfare

on the enormous accretion of the salaried bourgeoisie. He has all his life been among that class of people and the chances are he will not disturb their feasts that are getting pretty close to the vitals of self government. For instance, while stocks and bonds and all fictitious devices of wealth have advanced in the past few years, city property and farming lands are a drag on the market, because they have to stand the whole brunt of taxation in the final analysis. There is not a state in the Union but would have just as good a state government if its salary list were cut in two and its legislature blocked on fifty per cent of its expenditures. There would be more real public spirit and private enterprise among the people. The taxpayer citizen is not going to put forth his best efforts to push business and build new industries, when his neighbor lives in affluence on the state or community.

A New York financial firm says of the situation:—"At the moment of the most unfavorable feature in the market is the foreign situation. The European markets are in an exceedingly sensitive state owing to well understood causes, and with another British loan in prospect American stocks are quite likely to be sold for shipment to the United States in an advancing market. This of course would not be favorable to the foreign exchange. The cotton movement, however, has been backward for a period, and increased exports of this staple would tend to discourage gold shipments. The local money market is not entirely free of danger, but reserve being low and the return of currency from the South being tardy, owing to the backward movement of the cotton crop. Some relief will be afforded by Secretary Gage's offer to buy

bonds and by the increase of money in circulation; but the Treasury is still a disturbing factor, looking up funds collected by excessive taxation. Congress seems likely to do little during the coming session; it could at least earn the good will of all parties by cutting off superfluous taxes."

A Big Fire—New Diggings Show up Well.

Dawson, Nov. 1.—(Delayed in transmission.)—Fire destroyed the third floor of the McDonald hotel, yesterday. This is the largest hotel building in the north. The loss is \$20,000. This includes \$5,000 on baggage of guests and about \$5,000 on furniture. While the lower stories are flooded with water and otherwise damaged, it is believed they may be repaired. There was no insurance on anything. The firemen made a gallant fight against great odds, the temperature being 10 degrees below zero.

The last steamer out left October 29 and the last one in arrived the following day. No mail is expected now for four weeks.
